Que 1.1. What is computer graphics ? Explain important applications of computer graphics.

Answer

1. Computer graphics is an art of drawing pictures on computer screens with the help of programming.
2. It involves computation, creation, manipulation of data.
3. Computer graphics is a rendering tool for the generation and manipulation of images.

Applications of computer graphics :

1. **Graphical User Interface (GUI)** : Computer graphics tools is used to make GUI.
2. **Computer arts** : Computer graphics are used in designing object shapes and specifying object such as cartoon drawing, logo design.
3. **Education and training** : Computer generated models of physical financial and economic systems are used as educational aids. Learning with visual aids is fast, easy to understand and cost effective.
4. **Entertainment** : Graphics and image processing techniques can be used to transform an object into another object.
5. **Visualization** : Visualization is used to convert large data value into patterns, charts, graphs, etc., with the help of computer graphics.
6. **Presentation graphics** : With the help of computer graphics large volumes of business data can be presented easily, making it attractive and useful.

Que 1.2. Discuss the various types of computer graphics.

Answer

Various types of computer graphics are :

1. **Passive (off-line) computer graphics :** The most common example of passive computer graphics is static website, where user has no control over the contents on the monitor. In this, development takes place independently in off-line mode.
2. **Interactive computer graphics :** In interactive computer graphics, user can interact with the machine as per his requirements. Videogames, dynamic websites, special effects in movies, cartoons are all making use of interactive computer graphic.

Computer graphics can be broadly divided into the following classes :

1. Business graphics or the broader category of presentation graphics, which refers to graphics, such as bar-charts (also called histograms), pie charts, pictograms (*i.e.*, scaled symbols), x - y charts, etc., used to present quantitative information to inform and convince the audience.
2. Scientific graphics, such as x - y plots, curve fitting, contour plots, system or program flowcharts etc.
3. Scaled drawing, such as architectural representations, drawing of buildings, bridges, and machines.
4. Cartoons and artwork, including advertisements.
5. Graphical User Interfaces (GUIs) which are the images that appear on almost all computer screens these days, designed to help the user utilize the software without having to refer to manuals or read a lot of text on the monitor.

Que 1.3. List some advantages and disadvantages of interactive computer graphics.

Answer

Advantages of interactive computer graphics :

1. It provides tools for producing pictures of concrete, 'real-world' objects.
2. It has an ability to show moving pictures, and thus it is possible to produce animations with interactive graphics.

Disadvantages of interactive computer graphics :

1. Requires technical skill to produce.
2. Must be updated daily to keep audience engaged.

Que 1.4. Explain raster scan display and random scan display device.

Differentiate between raster scan display and random scan display with example.

Answer**Raster scan display :**

1. In raster scan displays, screen is scanned in horizontal and vertical direction and the information is stored in a buffer called frame buffer.
2. The frame buffer is used to store intensity values of all screen points.
3. It is suitable for displaying realistic scenes containing either complex shades or colour patterns.
4. Simple black and white display require only one bit per pixel while colour display systems require multiple bits per pixel.
5. Refreshing on raster scan displays is carried out at the rate of 60 to 80 frames per second.

Random scan display :

1. In random scan display, the definition of picture is stored as a collection of line of commands in an area of memory called refresh buffer or display program.
2. Random scan display draw a picture on line at a time and for this reason is also referred to as vector displays.
3. It is basically designed for line drawing and not suitable for complex natural scenes.
4. It refreshes at a rate of 30 to 60 frames per second.

1.	It is well suited for the realistic display of scenes containing subtle shading and colour patterns.	It is designed for line drawing applications and cannot display realistic shaded scenes.

Answer

The advantages of raster scan display over random scan display :

1. Less memory costs than random scan display.
2. High degree of realism achieved in picture than random scan display.
3. It uses advanced shading and hidden surface technique.
4. Computer monitors and TVs use this method.
5. Less expensive than vector display.
6. Very efficient to represent full images.

Que 1.6. What is interlacing ?

Answer

1. Interlacing is a method of encoding a bitmap image such that a person who has partially received it, sees a degraded copy of the entire image.
2. When communicating over a slow communications link, this is often preferable to seeing a perfectly clear copy of one part of the image, as it

helps the viewer to decide more quickly whether to abort or continue the transmission.

3. It is also known as interleaving.

Que 1.7. Explain the working of Cathode Ray Tube (CRT).

Answer

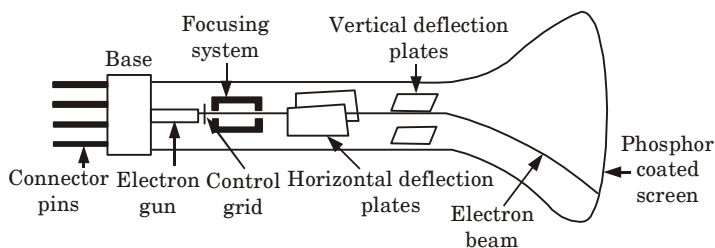


Fig. 1.7.1. CRT.

Working of CRT :

1. CRT is an evacuated glass tube equipped with various components as shown in Fig. 1.7.1.
2. A beam of electrons (cathode rays), emitted by an electron gun, passes through focusing and deflection systems hits on the phosphor coated screen to generate the desired picture.
3. The high speed electrons hit the phosphor coated screen to produce a spot of light controlled by a video controller.
4. The electron gun in the CRT is made up of a heated metal cathode and a control grid.
5. The cathode is heated by passing a current through a coil of wire, called the filament.
6. The electrons get boiled off the hot cathode surface and move in the form of electron beams passing through horizontal and vertical deflection plates.
7. The negatively charged electrons are accelerated towards the phosphor coating by a high positive voltage.
8. The accelerating voltage can be generated with a positively charged metal coating on the inside of the CRT or by an accelerating anode.
9. Spots of light are produced when high speed electrons in the electron beam collide with the phosphor coating and their kinetic energy is absorbed by the phosphor.
10. Part of the beam energy is converted by friction into heat energy and the remaining energy is used to move electrons in the phosphor atom into higher energy levels.

11. After a short span of time, these excited electrons come back to their stable ground state and give up their extra energy as a small quantum of light energy.
12. The colour of the light emitted by these electrons is proportional to the energy difference between the excited quantum state and the ground state.
13. The CRT screen can be coated with different kinds (color and persistence) of phosphor.
14. The light emitted by the phosphor fades very rapidly. To maintain the picture on the display, we need to redraw the picture repeatedly by quickly directing the electron beam back over the same points such a type of display is known as refresh CRT.

Answer

Various emissive display devices are :

i. Plasma panel :

- a. Plasma panels, also called gas discharge displays, are constructed by filling the region between two glass plates with a mixture of gases that usually includes neon.
- b. A series of vertical conducting ribbons is placed on one glass panel and a set of horizontal ribbons is built into the other glass panel.
- c. Firing voltages applied to a pair of horizontal and vertical conductors cause the gas at the intersection of the two conductors to break down into glowing plasma of electrons and ions.
- d. Picture definition is stored in a refresh buffer, and the firing voltages are applied to refresh the pixel positions (at the intersections of the conductors) 60 times per second.
- e. Alternating current methods are used to provide faster application of the firing voltages, and thus brighter displays. Separation between pixels is provided by the electric field of the conductors.

ii. Liquid Crystal Displays (LCDs) :

- a. LCDs are non-emissive devices which produce a picture by passing polarized light from the surroundings of an internal light source through a liquid crystal material.
- b. Liquid crystals are almost transparent substances, exhibiting the properties of both solid and liquid matter.
- c. Light passing through liquid crystals change their molecular alignment and consequently the way light passed through them.
- d. In LCDs, liquid crystals are sandwiched between thin polarized sheets that are used.
- e. Liquid crystal displays are used in miniature televisions and video cameras and monitors.

Que 1.10. What are the flat panel displays devices ?

Answer

1. Flat panel display is a display method that is designed to reduce the depth of the CRT display caused by the length of the tube.
2. The screens of these flat panel displays are made up of pairs of electrodes.
3. Each pair of electrodes is used to generate one picture element.
4. There are two types of flat panel displays :
 - a. **Emissive displays :**
 - i. The emissive displays (emitters) are devices that convert electrical energy into light.
 - ii. Plasma panels, light emitting diodes are examples of emissive displays.

b. Non-emissive displays :

- i. Non-emissive displays (non-emitters) use optical effects to convert sunlight or light from some other source into graphics pattern.
- ii. An example of a non-emissive flat panel display is a Liquid Crystal Device (LCD).

Que 1.11. How advantageous are flat panel displays ? Explain the functioning of LCD with suitable diagrams.

Answer**Advantages of flat panel displays are :**

1. It consumes very low power.
2. It has very thin display which occupies small volume.
3. Cost is low.
4. Used for long lifetime.
5. Good reliability and brightness.

Functioning of LCD :

1. The principle behind the LCD is that when an electrical current is applied to the liquid crystal molecule, the molecule tends to untwist.
2. This changes the angle of light which is passing through the molecule of the polarized glass and also cause a change in the angle of the top polarizing filter.
3. As a result a little light is allowed to pass the polarized glass through a particular area of the LCD.
4. Thus, that particular area will become dark compared to other.
5. The LCD works on the principle of blocking light. While constructing the LCD, a reflected mirror is arranged at the back.
6. An electrode plane is made of Indium Tin Oxide (ITO) which is kept on top and a polarized glass with a polarizing film added on the bottom of the device.
7. The complete region of the LCD has to be enclosed by a common electrode and liquid crystal matter should be above it.
8. When there is no current, the light passes through the front of the LCD that will be reflected by the mirror and bounced back.
9. As the electrode is connected to a battery the current from it will cause the liquid crystals between the common plane electrode and the electrode shaped like a rectangle to untwist.
10. Thus, the light is blocked from passing through and that particular rectangular area appears blank.

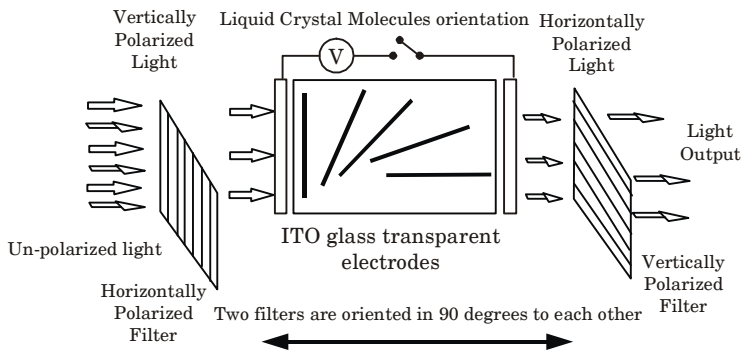

Que 1.12. Write merits and demerits of LCD (Liquid Crystal Display).

Answer

Merits of LCD :

- It produces very bright images due to high peak intensity.
- It produces lower electric, magnetic and electromagnetic fields than CRTs.
- It has no geometric distortion at the native resolution. Minor distortion can occur for other resolutions.
- It consumes less electricity than a CRT and produces little heat.

Demerits of LCD :

- The aspect ratio and resolution are fixed.
- It is not good at producing black and very dark grays levels.
- It has lower contrast than CRTs due to a poor black-level.
- Images are satisfactory, but not accurate as colour saturation is reduced at low intensity levels due to a poor black-level.

Que 1.13. Explain frame buffer and video basics. Also, explain the terms pixel, aspect ratio, resolution.

Answer**Frame buffer :**

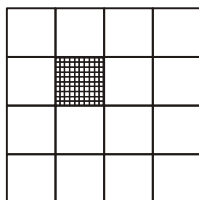
1. Frame buffer is a special area of memory in raster displays which is dedicated to graphics.
2. It holds the set of intensity values for all the screen points.
3. The stored intensity values are retrieved from frame buffer and displayed on the screen one row (scanline) at the time.
4. Each screen point is referred to as a pixel or pel (shortened forms of picture element).
5. Each pixel on the screen can be specified by its row and column number. Thus, by specifying row and column number we can specify the pixel position on the screen.

Video basics :

1. Video or moving image in general, is created from a sequence of small images called frames.
2. By recording and then playing back frames in quick succession, an illusion of movement is created.
3. Video can be edited by removing some frames and combining sequences of frames, called clips, together in a timeline.

Pixel :

1. Pixel is the smallest part of the screen.
2. Each pixel has its own intensity, name or address by which we can control it.

Aspect ratio :

1. An aspect ratio is an attribute that describes the relationship between the width and height of an image.
2. Aspect ratio is expressed by the symbolic notation *i.e.*, $x : y$.

Resolution :

1. Resolution is defined as the number of pixels on the horizontal axis and vertical axis.
2. The sharpness of the image on the display depends on the resolution and size of the monitor.

Que 1.14. Write a short note on video controller and display processor.

Answer**Video controller :**

1. Video controller is a key hardware component that allows computers to generate graphic information to any video display devices, such as a monitor or projector.
2. They are also known as graphics or video adapters that are directly integrated into the computer motherboard.
3. Their main function as an integrated circuit in a video signal generator is to produce television video signals in computers systems.
4. They also offer various functions beyond accelerated image rendering, such as TV output and the ability to hook up to several monitors.

Display processor :

1. Display processor (or graphics controller) converts the digital information from the CPU to analog values needed by the display devices.
2. The purpose of the display processor is to free the CPU from the graphics work.
3. In addition to the system memory, a separate display processor memory area is provided.
4. A major task of the display processor is digitizing a picture definition given in an application program into a set of pixel values for storage in the frame buffer.

Que 1.15. How much time is spent scanning across each row of pixels during a screen refresh of 1280×1024 at a refresh rate of 60 frames per second ?

Answer

Resolution = 1280×1024 .

Refresh rate = 60 frames/second.

Therefore, time taken by 1024 rows = $1/60$ sec.

Hence, time taken by each row of pixels to refresh

$$= 1/(60 \times 1024) = 0.0162 \times 10^{-3} \text{ sec.}$$

Que 1.16. Consider three different raster systems with resolutions 640×480 , 1024×1280 , and 2560×2048 . What will be the size of frame buffer required for each of these systems to store 12 bits per pixel? How much storage is required for full colours, that is, 24 bits per pixel?

Answer

Frame buffer size = (Number of pixel OR resolution $\times$ bits per pixel)/8 bytes.

Resolution	12-bit per pixel	24-bit per pixel
640×480	$= (640 \times 480 \times 12)/8$ $= 460800 \text{ bytes}$	$= (640 \times 480 \times 24)/8$ $= 921600 \text{ bytes}$
1024×1280	$= (1024 \times 1280 \times 12)/8$ $= 1966080 \text{ bytes}$	$= (1024 \times 1280 \times 24)/8$ $= 3932160 \text{ bytes}$

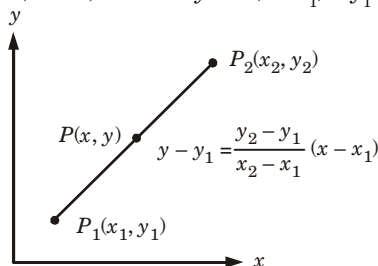

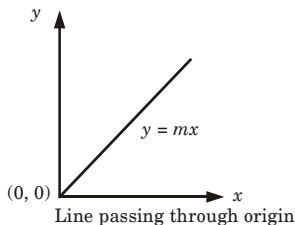

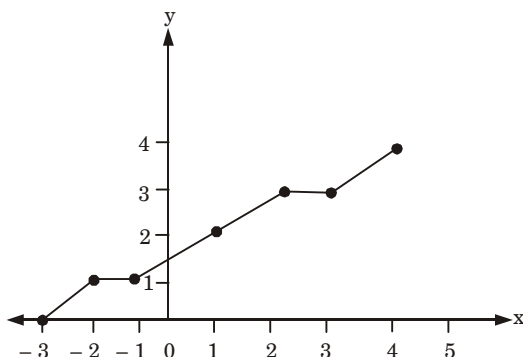

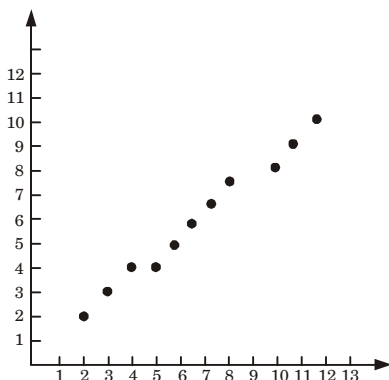

- b. The line density is proportional to the number of dots displayed divided by the length of the line.

4. **Line brightness independent of slope and line length :** This requires a high resolution of the device along with a high refresh rate.
5. **Lines should be drawn rapidly :** In interactive applications, lines should appear rapidly on the screen, that is, minimum computation is desired to draw the line.

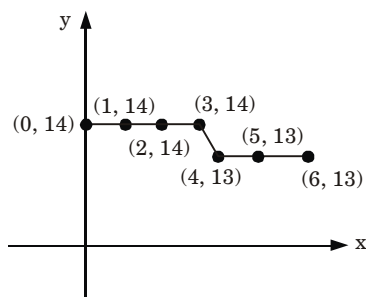

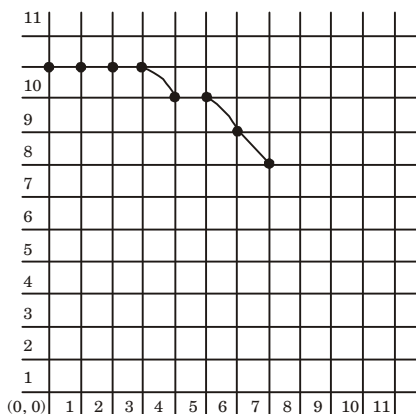

In the parallel version of line algorithm, pixel positions are calculated along a line path simultaneously by partitioning the computations among the various processors available. Methods for parallel version of line algorithm are :

1. Bresenham's line algorithm :

- Given n_p processors, a parallel Bresenham's line algorithm can be used by subdividing the line path into n_p partitions and simultaneously generating line segments in each of the sub-intervals.
- For a line with slope $0 < m < 1$ and left endpoint coordinate (x_0, y_0) , the line is partitioned along the positive x -direction.

- c. The distance between beginning x positions of adjacent partitions is calculated as :

$$\Delta x_p = \frac{\Delta x + n_p - 1}{n_p}$$

where Δx is the width of the line and the value for partition width Δx_p is computed using integer division.

- d. The starting x coordinate is calculated for the k th partition as :

$$x_k = x_0 + k\Delta x_p$$

- e. At the k th partition, the starting y coordinate is :

$$y_k = y_0 + \text{round}(k\Delta y_p)$$

- f. The initial decision parameter for Bresenham's algorithm at the start of the k th sub interval is :

$$p_k = (k\Delta x_p)(2\Delta y) - \text{round}(k\Delta y_p)(2\Delta x) + 2\Delta y - \Delta x$$

2. In raster scan system :

- a. In raster systems we assign each processor to a particular group of screen pixel.
- b. For lines with a positive slope greater than 1, we reverse the value of x and y . *i.e.*, we sample at unit y intervals ($\Delta y = 1$) and calculate each succeeding x value as

$$x_{k+1} = x_k + \frac{1}{m}$$

- c. Lines are to be processed from the left endpoint to the right endpoint. If this processing is reversed, so that the starting endpoint is at the right, then either we have $\Delta x = -1$ and

$$y_{k+1} = y_k + m$$

or (when the slope is greater than 1) we have $\Delta y = -1$ with

$$x_{k+1} = x_k + m$$

- d. Perpendicular distance d from the line in to pixel as shown in Fig. 1.31.1 with coordinates (x, y) is obtained with the calculation

$$d = Ax + By + C$$

where,

$$A = \frac{-\Delta y}{\text{linelength}}$$

$$B = \frac{\Delta x}{\text{linelength}}$$

$$C = \frac{x_0\Delta y - y_0\Delta x}{\text{linelength}}$$

$$\text{linelength} = \sqrt{\Delta x^2 + \Delta y^2}$$

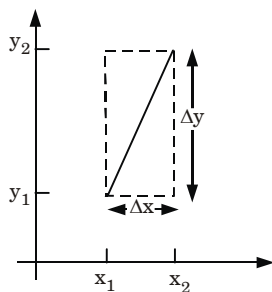

- Transformation is the process by which we can change the shape, position and direction of any object with respect to any coordinates system.
- Homogeneous coordinates allows us to express all transformation equations as matrix multiplication.

Que 2.1. What are the basic transformations ? Describe each with their matrix representation.

Answer

Transformations are the process by which we can change position, orientation or size of any coordinate system. Following are the various basic transformations :

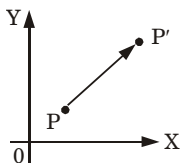
1. Translation :

- Translation is a process of changing the position of an object in a straight line path from one coordinate location to another.
- We can translate a two dimensional point by adding translation distances, t_x and t_y , to the original coordinate position (x, y) to move the point to a new position (x', y') , as shown in the Fig. 2.1.1.

$$x' = x + t_x \quad \dots(2.1.1)$$

$$y' = y + t_y \quad \dots(2.1.2)$$

- The translation distance pair (t_x, t_y) is called translation vector.
- Translation equation (2.1.1) and (2.1.2) can be represented in the form of matrix as :

**Fig. 2.1.1.**

$$P = \begin{bmatrix} x_1 \\ x_2 \end{bmatrix}$$

$$P' = \begin{bmatrix} x'_1 \\ x'_2 \end{bmatrix}$$

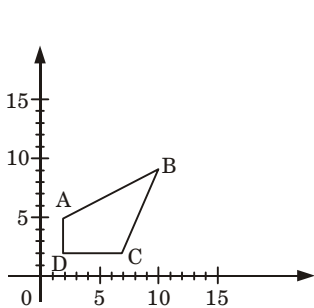
$$T = \begin{bmatrix} t_x \\ t_y \end{bmatrix}$$

Hence

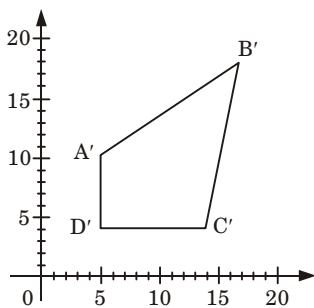
$$P' = P + T$$

2. Scaling :

- a. A scaling transformation changes the size of an object.



(a) Before scaling



(b) After scaling

Fig. 2.1.1.

- b. Scaling operation is carried out for polygon by multiplying the coordinate values (x, y) of each vertex by scaling factor s_x and s_y to produce the transformed coordinates (x', y') as

$$x' = x \cdot s_x$$

$$y' = y \cdot s_y$$

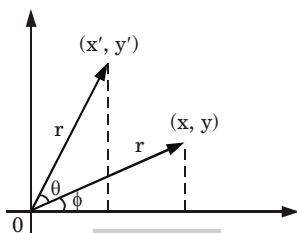
- c. Scaling factor s_x scales objects in the x -direction, while s_y scales objects in the y -direction.
- d. The transformation equation can also be written in the matrix form as :

$$\begin{bmatrix} x' \\ y' \end{bmatrix} = \begin{bmatrix} s_x & 0 \\ 0 & s_y \end{bmatrix} \begin{bmatrix} x \\ y \end{bmatrix}$$

- e. If the value of scaling factor is less than 1 then it reduces the size of objects otherwise it increases the size of object.

3. Rotation :

- Two dimensional rotation is applied to an object by rotating it along a circular path in the xy plane.
- To generate a rotation, we specify a rotation angle θ and the position (x_r, y_r) of the rotation point about which the object is to be rotated.
- Positive values for the rotation angle define counterclockwise rotations about the pivot point and negative values rotate object in clockwise direction.

**Fig. 2.1.2.**

Using standard trigonometric identities, we can express the transformed coordinates in terms of angle θ and ϕ as :

$$x' = r \cos (\phi + \theta) = r \cos \phi . \cos \theta - r \sin \phi . \sin \theta$$

$$y' = r \sin (\phi + \theta) = r \cos \phi . \sin \theta + r \sin \phi . \cos \theta \dots (2.1.3)$$

The original coordinates of the point in polar coordinates are given as :

$$x = r \cos \phi \text{ and } y = r \sin \phi \dots (2.1.4)$$

Putting equation (2.1.4) in equation (2.1.3), we get

$$x' = x \cos \theta - y \sin \theta$$

$$y' = x \sin \theta + y \cos \theta$$

We can write the rotation equation in matrix form as :

$$P' = PR$$

Where the rotation matrix is

$$R = \begin{bmatrix} \cos \theta & -\sin \theta \\ \sin \theta & \cos \theta \end{bmatrix}$$

$$P' = \begin{bmatrix} x' \\ y' \end{bmatrix}$$

$$P = \begin{bmatrix} x \\ y \end{bmatrix}$$

Que 2.2. What do you understand by homogeneous coordinate ?

Answer

1. Homogeneous coordinates are defined as the coordinates that represents all the geometric transformation equations as matrix multiplication.
2. Coordinates are represented with three element column vectors, and transformation operations are written as 3×3 matrices. For translation we have :

$$\begin{bmatrix} x' \\ y' \\ 1 \end{bmatrix} = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & t_x \\ 0 & 1 & t_y \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix} \begin{bmatrix} x \\ y \\ 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

Which we can write in the abbreviated form as :

$$P' = T(t_x, t_y) \cdot P$$

3. The inverse of translation matrix is obtained by replacing the translation parameters t_x and t_y with their negatives *i.e.*, $-t_x$ and $-t_y$.
4. Rotation transformation equations about the coordinate origin are now written as :

$$\begin{bmatrix} x' \\ y' \\ 1 \end{bmatrix} = \begin{bmatrix} \cos \theta & -\sin \theta & 0 \\ \sin \theta & \cos \theta & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix} \begin{bmatrix} x \\ y \\ 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

or as $P' = R(\theta) \cdot P$

We get the inverse of rotation matrix when θ is replaced with $-\theta$.

5. Finally a scaling transformation relative to the coordinate origin is now expressed as matrix multiplication.

$$\begin{bmatrix} x' \\ y' \\ 1 \end{bmatrix} = \begin{bmatrix} s_x & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & s_y & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix} \begin{bmatrix} x \\ y \\ 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

or as $P' = S(s_x, s_y) \cdot P$

Replacing these parameters with their multiplicative inverse ($1/s_x$ and $1/s_y$) yields the inverse scaling matrix.

Que 2.3. What do you mean by composite transformation ?
Explain with example.

Answer

- A composite transformation is two or more transformations performed one after the other.
- If a transformation of the plane T_1 is followed by a second plane transformation T_2 , then the result itself may be represented by a single transformation T which is the composition of T_1 and T_2 taken in that order and written as :

$$T = T_1.T_2$$

- Composite transformation can be achieved by concatenation of transformation matrices to obtain a combined transformation matrix.
- A combined matrix is given by :

$$[T][X] = [X][T_1][T_2][T_3][T_4]....[T_n]$$

- The change in the order of transformation would lead to different results, as in general matrix multiplication is not commutative, i.e., $[A].[B] \neq [B].[A]$ and the order of multiplication.

For example : Let us perform a counterclockwise 45° rotation of triangle $A(2, 3)$, $B(5, 5)$, $C(4, 3)$ about point $(1, 1)$ using composite transformation.

We know that the overall transformation matrix for a counterclockwise rotation by an angle θ about the point (x_p, y_p) is given as :

$$T_1 \cdot R \cdot T_2 = \begin{bmatrix} \cos \theta & \sin \theta & 0 \\ -\sin \theta & \cos \theta & 0 \\ -x_p \cos \theta + y_p \sin \theta + x_p & -x_p \sin \theta - y_p \cos \theta + y_p & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

Here, $\theta = 45^\circ$, $x_p = 1$ and $y_p = 1$. Substituting values we get

$$T_1 \cdot R \cdot T_2 = \begin{bmatrix} 1/\sqrt{2} & 1/\sqrt{2} & 0 \\ -1/\sqrt{2} & 1/\sqrt{2} & 0 \\ 1 & -\sqrt{2} + 1 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

$$\therefore \begin{bmatrix} A' \\ B' \\ C' \end{bmatrix} = \begin{bmatrix} 2 & 3 & 1 \\ 5 & 5 & 1 \\ 4 & 3 & 1 \end{bmatrix} \begin{bmatrix} 1/\sqrt{2} & 1/\sqrt{2} & 0 \\ -1/\sqrt{2} & 1/\sqrt{2} & 0 \\ 1 & -\sqrt{2} + 1 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

$$= \begin{bmatrix} -\frac{1}{\sqrt{2}} + 1 & \frac{3}{\sqrt{2}} + 1 & 1 \\ 1 & \frac{8}{\sqrt{2}} + 1 & 1 \\ \frac{1}{\sqrt{2}} + 1 & \frac{5}{\sqrt{2}} + 1 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

What do you understand by the term “Concatenation of transformations”? What are its advantages? If A and B are two different transformations, illustrate with suitable example that $A \cdot B \neq B \cdot A$.

Answer

Concatenation of transformation : Refer Q. 2.3, Page 2-6C, Unit-2.

Advantages of concatenation of transformation :

More complex geometric and coordinate transformation are formed through process of concatenation of function.

Example :

$$A = \begin{pmatrix} s & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & s & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{pmatrix} \quad B = \begin{pmatrix} 1 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 1 & 0 \\ h & k & 1 \end{pmatrix}$$

$$A \cdot B = \begin{pmatrix} s & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & s & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{pmatrix} \begin{pmatrix} 1 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 1 & 0 \\ h & k & 1 \end{pmatrix} = \begin{pmatrix} s & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & s & 0 \\ h & k & 1 \end{pmatrix}$$

$$B \cdot A = \begin{pmatrix} 1 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 1 & 0 \\ h & k & 1 \end{pmatrix} \begin{pmatrix} s & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & s & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{pmatrix} = \begin{pmatrix} s & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & s & 0 \\ hs & ks & 1 \end{pmatrix}$$

$$A \cdot B \neq B \cdot A$$

Que 2.5. Show that uniform scaling and rotation make a commutative pair, but in general scaling and rotation are not commutative.

Answer

For a two dimensional transformation :

$$\text{General scaling, } S = \begin{bmatrix} s_x & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & s_y & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

$$\text{Rotation, } R = \begin{bmatrix} \cos \theta & -\sin \theta & 0 \\ \sin \theta & \cos \theta & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

According to commutative property,

$$SR = RS$$

Now, Taking L.H.S

$$\begin{aligned} SR &= \begin{bmatrix} s_x & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & s_y & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix} \begin{bmatrix} \cos \theta & -\sin \theta & 0 \\ \sin \theta & \cos \theta & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix} \\ &= \begin{bmatrix} s_x \cos \theta & -s_x \sin \theta & 0 \\ s_y \sin \theta & s_y \cos \theta & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix} \end{aligned}$$

Taking R.H.S

$$RS = \begin{bmatrix} \cos \theta & -\sin \theta & 0 \\ \sin \theta & \cos \theta & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix} \begin{bmatrix} s_x & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & s_y & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

$$= \begin{bmatrix} s_x \cos \theta & -s_y \sin \theta & 0 \\ s_x \sin \theta & s_y \cos \theta & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

Using general scaling, commutative property is not satisfied.

When s_x and s_y are assigned the same value, a uniform scaling is produced.

Let $s_x = s_y = 1$

then $SR = RS$

$$\begin{bmatrix} \cos \theta & -\sin \theta & 0 \\ \sin \theta & \cos \theta & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix} = \begin{bmatrix} \cos \theta & -\sin \theta & 0 \\ \sin \theta & \cos \theta & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

Hence, commutative property is satisfied for uniform scaling.

- Let line $L(y = mx + b)$ have a y -intercept $(0, b)$ and an angle θ with respect to x -axis.
- The steps involved in reflection transformation are as follows :
 - Translate the intersection point B to the origin.

- Rotate by $-\theta^\circ$ so that the line L aligns with the x -axis.
- Mirror reflect about the x -axis.
- Rotate back by θ° .
- Translate B back to $(0, b)$.

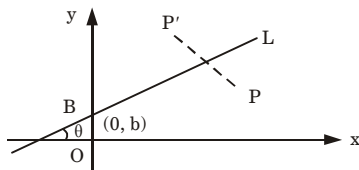


Fig. 2.6.1. Reflection of point P about line L .

Therefore, we have

$$M_L = T_V \cdot R_\theta \cdot M_x \cdot R_{-\theta} \cdot T_{-V}$$

Where

$$V = bJ$$

$$T_V = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 1 & b \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

$$T_{-V} = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 1 & -b \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

$$R_\theta = \begin{bmatrix} \cos \theta & -\sin \theta & 0 \\ \sin \theta & \cos \theta & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

$$R_{-\theta} = \begin{bmatrix} \cos \theta & \sin \theta & 0 \\ -\sin \theta & \cos \theta & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

$$M_x = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & -1 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

Slope,

$$m = \tan \theta$$

Therefore,

$$\sin \theta = \frac{m}{\sqrt{m^2 + 1}}$$

$$\cos \theta = \frac{1}{\sqrt{m^2 + 1}}$$

After multiplication of all basic matrix, we get

$$M_L = \begin{bmatrix} \frac{1-m^2}{m^2+1} & \frac{2m}{m^2+1} & \frac{-2bm}{m^2+1} \\ \frac{2m}{m^2+1} & \frac{m^2-1}{m^2+1} & \frac{2b}{m^2+1} \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

Que 2.7. Write a procedure for rotation. Derive reflection metrics for reflection about X-axis.

Answer

Procedure for rotation : Rotation can be done in the following order :

Step 1 : Translate the object or body at the origin (translation).

Step 2 : Rotate by any angle as given (rotation).

Step 3 : Translate back to its original location (inverse translation).

In matrix form, it can be shown as

$$[T] = [T_R] [R_\theta] [T_R]^{-1}$$

where

$T_R \rightarrow$ Translation matrix

$R_\theta \rightarrow$ Rotation matrix by an angle θ°

$[T_R]^{-1} \rightarrow$ Inverse translation matrix

Reflection metrics : For reflection about x -axis, x coordinate is not changed and sign of y coordinate is changed. Thus if we reflect point (x, y) in the x -axis, we get $(x, -y)$

i.e.,

$$x' = x$$

$$y' = -y$$

So, the transformation matrix for reflection about x -axis or $y = 0$ axis is,

$$\begin{pmatrix} 1 & 0 \\ 0 & -1 \end{pmatrix}$$

and the transformation is represented as

$$\begin{pmatrix} x' \\ y' \end{pmatrix} = \begin{pmatrix} 1 & 0 \\ 0 & -1 \end{pmatrix} \begin{pmatrix} x \\ y \end{pmatrix}$$

Que 2.8. Show that the reflection about the line $y = -x$ is equivalent to a reflection relative to the y -axis followed by an anticlockwise rotation of 90° .

Answer

Reflection matrix about the line $y = -x$

$$\begin{pmatrix} 0 & -1 & 0 \\ -1 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{pmatrix}$$

Reflection matrix about the y -axis $\begin{pmatrix} -1 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 1 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{pmatrix}$

$$\text{Rotation matrix } \begin{pmatrix} \cos 90 & -\sin 90 & 0 \\ \sin 90 & \cos 90 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{pmatrix} = \begin{pmatrix} 0 & -1 & 0 \\ 1 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{pmatrix}$$

Reflection then rotation composite matrix is

$$\begin{pmatrix} 0 & -1 & 0 \\ 1 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{pmatrix} \begin{pmatrix} -1 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 1 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{pmatrix} = \begin{pmatrix} 0 & -1 & 0 \\ -1 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{pmatrix}$$

which is equal to the transformation matrix for reflection about the line $y = -x$.

Polygon is represented by homogeneous coordinates matrix as :

$$V = [ABCD] \begin{bmatrix} -1 & 0 & 1 \\ 0 & -2 & 1 \\ 1 & 0 & 1 \\ 0 & 2 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

i. Horizontal line $Y = 2 : Y = 2$

On comparing with $y = mx + c$

$$m = 0, c = 2$$

$$\theta = \tan^{-1}(m) = \tan^{-1}(0) = 0$$

The operation of reflection through an arbitrary line (not passing through origin) is required to follow the following procedures :

$$[T] = [T_{\text{trans}}] [R_{\theta}] [R_{\text{ref}}] [R_{\theta}]^{-1} [T_{\text{trans}}]^{-1}$$

$$[T_{\text{trans}}] = \text{Translation matrix}$$

$$[R_{\theta}] = \text{Rotation matrix}$$

$$[R_{\text{ref}}] = \text{Reflection matrix}$$

$$[R_{\theta}]^{-1} = \text{Inverse rotation matrix}$$

$$[T_{\text{trans}}]^{-1} = \text{Inverse translation matrix}$$

$$[T_{\text{trans}}] = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 1 & 0 \\ 0 & -c & 0 \end{bmatrix} = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 1 & 0 \\ 0 & -2 & 0 \end{bmatrix}$$

Now coordinates of polygon is, $(-1, 2)$, $(0, 4)$, $(1, 2)$ and $(0, 0)$.

ii. Vertical line $X = 2$:

$$X = 2$$

$$y = mx + c$$

$$\text{On comparing with } x = \frac{y}{m} - \frac{c}{m}$$

$$m = \infty, c = -2$$

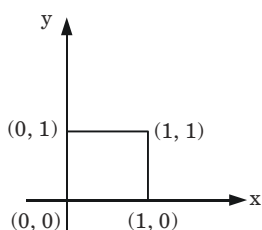

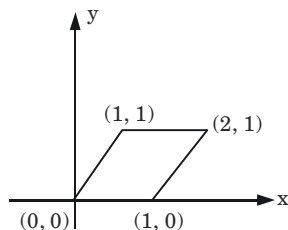

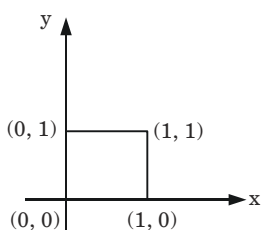

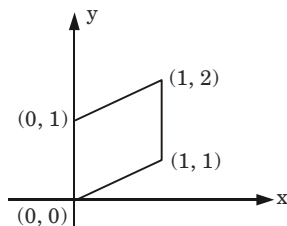

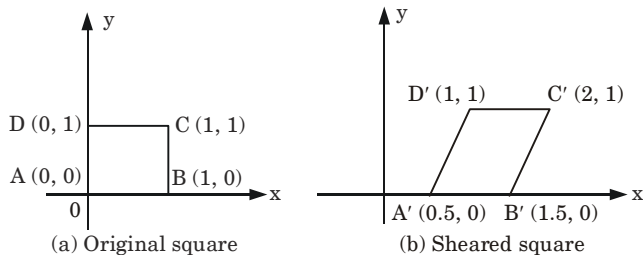

Shearing in the x -direction and then the y -direction =

As equation (2.11.1) $\neq$ (2.11.2), hence, simultaneous shearing in both directions is not equal to the composition of pure shear along x -axis followed by pure shear along y -axis.

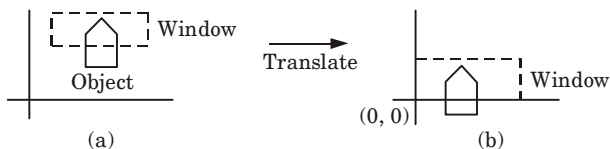

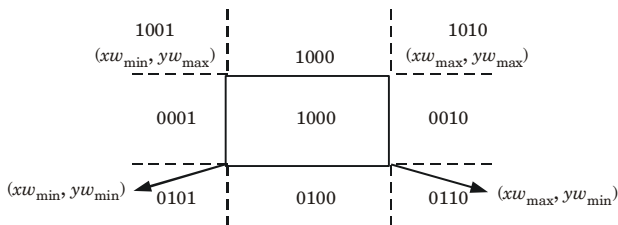

2. Every line end point is assigned a 4-digit binary code (region code) that identifies the location of the point corresponding to the boundaries of the clipping window.

 code = 0;
 else
 code = 1;
 - b. **For bit 2**

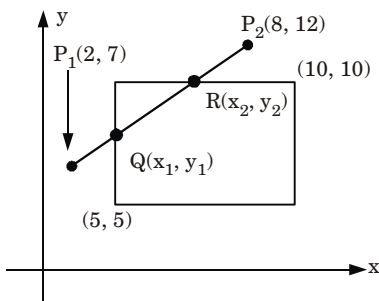

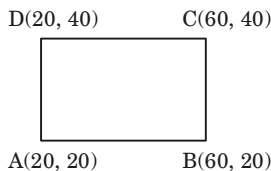

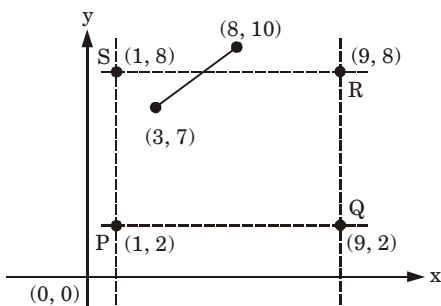

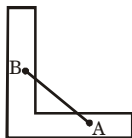
Que 2.20. What do you understand by polygon ? Define convex and concave polygon.

Answer**Polygon :**

1. A polygon may be represented as a number of line segments connected end to end to form a closed figure.
2. It may be represented as the points where minimum three vertices and three edges are connected to form a closed figure.
3. Polygons can be divided into following two classes :
 - i. **Convex polygon :** A polygon is called convex if the line joining any two interior points of the polygon lie completely inside the polygon.

- ii. **Concave polygon :** A non-convex polygon is said to be concave.

Que 2.21. How inside test are performed using odd-parity rules or winding number methods ?

Answer

1. Inside-outside test states, "How can we determine whether or not a point is inside of a polygon".
2. Following are the two methods to identify this :
 - a. **Odd-parity methods :**
 - i. Following is a simple idea to check whether a point is inside or outside.
 1. Draw a horizontal line to the right of each point and extend it to infinity.
 2. Count the number of times the line intersects with polygon edges.

3. A point is inside the polygon if either count of intersections is odd or point lies on an edge of polygon. If none of the conditions is true, then point lies outside.

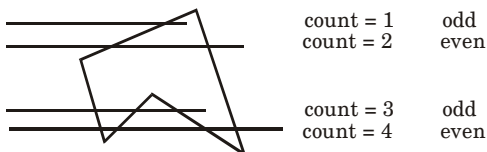

- ii. If the point of intersection is also the vertex where two sides met then to handle this case we must look at the other endpoints of the two segments which meet at this vertex.
- iii. If these points lie on the same side of the constructed line, then the point in question counts as an even number of intersection.
- iv. If they lie opposite side of the constructed line, then the point is counted as a single intersection.

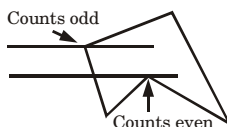

b. Winding number method :

- i. In this method every point has a winding number, and the interior points of a two dimensional object are defined to be those that have a nonzero value for the winding number :
 1. Initializing the winding number to 0.
 2. Imagine a line drawn from any position P to a distant point beyond the coordinate extents of the object.
 3. Count the number of edges that cross the line in each direction.
 4. We add 1 to the winding number every time we intersect a polygon edge that crosses the line from right to left, and we subtract 1 every time we intersect an edge that crosses from left to right.
 5. If the winding number is non-zero then point P is inside otherwise P is outside the polygon.

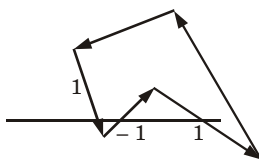

Que 2.22. What are the steps required to fill a polygon using flood-fill or boundary fill ?

OR

Write the algorithm for filling polygons and explain it with a suitable example.

Answer

Filling is the process of 'coloring in' a fixed area or region. Following are the various algorithm used to fill the area :

1. Boundary-fill algorithm :

- An approach to area filling is to start at a point inside a region and point the interior outward toward boundary.
- If the boundary is specified in a single color, the fill algorithm proceeds outward pixel by pixel until the boundary color is encountered.
- It is particularly useful in interactive painting packages, where interior points are easily selected.
- A boundary fill procedure accepts as input the coordinates of an interior points (x, y) a fill color, and a boundary color.
- The following procedure illustrate a recursive method for filling 4-connected with an intensity specified in parameter fill up to boundary specified with parameter boundary.

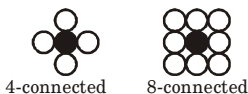

2. Flood-fill algorithm :

- It is used to fill the area that is not defined within a single color boundary.
- We can paint such areas by replacing a specified interior color.
- We start from a specified interior point (x,y) and reassign all pixels values that are currently set to a given interior color with the desired fill color.
- The following procedure flood fills a 4-connected region recursively, starting from the input position.

Que 2.23. Discuss Weiler-Atherton algorithm.

Answer

1. The Weiler-Atherton is an algorithm which is used where clipping of polygon is needed.
2. It allows clipping of a subject or candidate polygon by an arbitrarily shaped clipping polygon/area/region.
3. It is generally applicable only in 2D. However, it can be used in 3D through visible surface determination and with improved efficiency through z -ordering.
4. Consider a polygon A as the clipping region and polygon B as the subject polygon to be clipped, the algorithm consists of the following steps :
 - a. List the vertices of the clipping-region polygon A and those of the subject polygon B .
 - b. Label the listed vertices of subject polygon B as either inside or outside of clipping region A .
 - c. Find all the polygon intersections and insert them into both lists, linking the lists at the intersections.
 - d. Generate a list of inbound intersections *i.e.*, the intersections where the vector from the intersection to the subsequent vertex of subject polygon B begins inside the clipping region.
 - e. At occurrence of leaving intersection the algorithm follows the clip polygon vertex list from leaving vertex in downward direction.
 - f. At occurrence of entering intersection the algorithm follows subject polygon vertex list from the entering intersection vertex. This process is repeated till we get the starting vertex.
 - g. This process has to be repeated for all remaining entering intersections which are not included in the previous traversing of vertex list.
5. This algorithm is used for clipping concave polygons. Here V_1, V_2, V_3, V_4, V_5 are the vertices of the polygon. C_1, C_2, C_3, C_4 are the vertices of the clip polygon and I_1, I_2, I_3, I_4 are the intersection points of polygon and clip polygon.
6. In this algorithm we take a starting vertex like I_1 and traverse the polygon like I_1, V_3, I_2 .
7. Since I_3 is not included in first traverse, hence, we start the second traversal from I_3 .

Therefore, first traversal gives polygon as : I_1, V_3, I_2, I_1 and second traversal gives polygon as : I_3, V_5, I_4, I_3 .

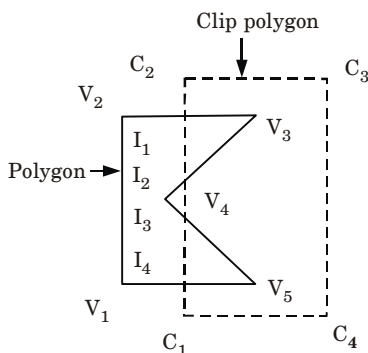

Que 2.24. Write the Sutherland-Hodgeman polygon clipping algorithm. Explain the modification given by Weiler and Atherton for a concave polygon.

Answer

Sutherland-Hodgeman polygon clipping algorithm :

1. Read coordinates of all vertices of the polygon.
2. Read coordinates of the clipping window.
3. Consider the left edge of the window.
4. Compare the vertices of each edge of the polygon, individually with the clipping plane.
5. Save the resulting intersections and vertices in the new list of vertices according to four possible cases between the edge and the clipping boundary.
6. Repeat the step 4 and 5 for remaining edges of the clipping window. Each time the resultant list of vertices is successively passed, move the process to the next edge of the clipping window.
7. Stop.

Weiler-Atherton polygon clipping :

1. In this algorithm, the vertex processing procedure is modified so that the concave polygons are displayed correctly.
2. This algorithm depends on identifying surfaces as shown in Fig. 2.24.1.
3. There are two directions (clockwise or anticlockwise) that exist to process the polygon vertices.

4. For clockwise processing of polygon vertices, we use the following rules :
- For an outside to inside pair of vertices, follow the polygon boundary.
 - For an inside to outside pair of vertices, follow the window boundary in a clockwise direction.

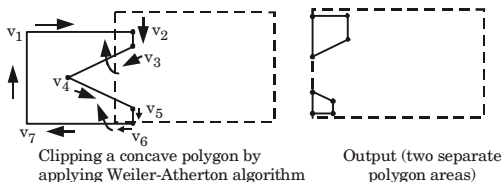

Curve Clipping, Text Clipping.

CONCEPT OUTLINE

- In curve clipping, we clip a curved object against a general polygon clip region.
- Text clipping is a clipping in which whole character or only part of it is clipped.

Que 2.25. Write a short note on curve clipping and text clipping.

Answer

Curve clipping :

- Curve clipping procedures will involve non-linear equations, however, this requires more processing than for objects with linear boundaries.
- The bounding rectangle for a circle or other curved object can be used first to test for overlap with a rectangular clip window.

- iii. If the bounding rectangle for the object is completely inside the window, we save the object.
- iv. If the bounding rectangle is determined to be completely outside the window, we discard the object.
- v. This procedure can be applied when clipping a curved object against a general polygon clip region. On the first pass, we can clip the bounding rectangle of the object against the bounding rectangle of the clip region.
- vi. If the two regions overlap, we will need to solve the simultaneous line-curve equations to obtain the clipping intersection points.

Text clipping :

- i. Text clipping is a clipping in which we clip the whole character or only part of it and depends on the requirement of the application.
- ii. Following are the various text clipping methods :

a. All-or-none string clipping method :

1. In this method, if all of the string is inside a clip window, we keep it. Otherwise, the string is discarded.
2. This method is implemented by considering a bounding rectangle around the text pattern.
3. The boundary positions of the rectangle are then compared to the window boundaries, and the string is rejected if there is any overlap.
4. This method produces the fastest text clipping.

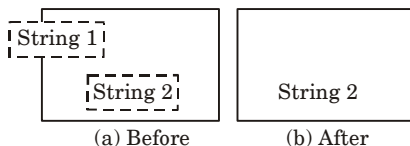


Fig. 2.25.1. All-or-none string clipping method.

b. All-or-none character clipping method :

1. In this method, we keep the character of the strings which lies inside clip window, otherwise, discard it.
2. In this case, the boundary limits of individual characters are compared to the window.

- 3. Any character that either overlaps or is outside a window boundary is clipped.

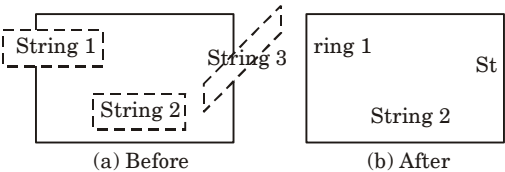


Fig. 2.25.2. All-or-none character clipping method.

Que 3.1. What do you mean by geometric primitives ? Discuss.

Answer

Geometric primitives are the basic geometrical shapes used to construct computer graphics scenes and the resulting final images.

Commonly used 3D geometric primitives include :

1. **Points** : A point is an exact position or location on a plane surface.
2. **Line** : A line is a straight curve. When geometry is used to model the real world, lines are used to represent straight objects with negligible width and height.
3. **Line segments** : A line segment is a part of a line that is bounded by two end points, and contains every point on the line between its end points.
4. **Planes** : A plane is the two dimensional analogue of a point (zero-dimensions), a line (one-dimension) and a space (three-dimensions).
5. **Circles** : A circle is a simple shape of Euclidean geometry consisting of those points in a plane which is equidistant from a given point called the centre.
6. **Ellipses** : Ellipses are closed curves and are the bounded case of the conic sections, the curves that result from the intersection of a circular cone and a plane that does not pass through its apex.
7. **Triangles** : A polygon with three corners or vertices and three sides or edges which are line segments is called a triangle.
8. **Polygons** : A polygon is traditionally a plane figure that is bounded by a closed path or circuit, composed of a finite sequence of straight line segments.

9. **Spline** : A spline is a special function defined piecewise by polynomials and preferred to polynomial interpolation.
10. **Spheres** : A sphere is a perfectly round geometrical object in three dimensional space, such as the shape of a round ball.

Que 3.2. Discuss 3D representation of objects.

Answer

To represent a 3D object we have categorised the object into some model representation :

1. Polygon and quadric surfaces provide precise descriptions for simple Euclidean objects such as polyhedrons and ellipsoids.
2. Spline surfaces and construction techniques are useful for designing aircraft wings, gears, and other engineering structures with curved surfaces.
3. Procedural methods, such as fractal constructions and particle systems, allow us to give accurate representations for clouds, clumps of grass, and other natural objects.
4. Physically based modeling methods using systems of interacting forces can be used to describe the non-rigid behavior of a piece of cloth.
5. Visualization techniques are applied to three dimensional discrete data sets to obtain visual representations of the data.
6. Representation schemes for solid objects are often divided into two broad categories :
 - a. Boundary representations (B-reps) describe a three dimensional object as a set of surfaces that separate the object interior from the environment.
 - a. Space partitioning representations are used to describe interior properties, by partitioning the spatial region containing an object into a set of small, non-overlapping, contiguous solids (usually cubes).

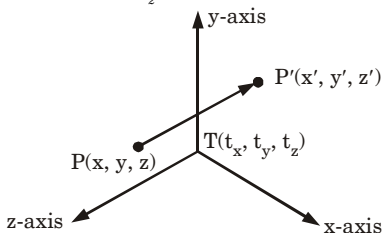

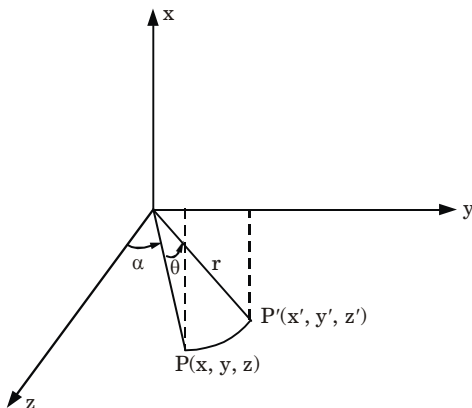


Fig. 3.4.1. Rotation when axis of rotation is x-axis.

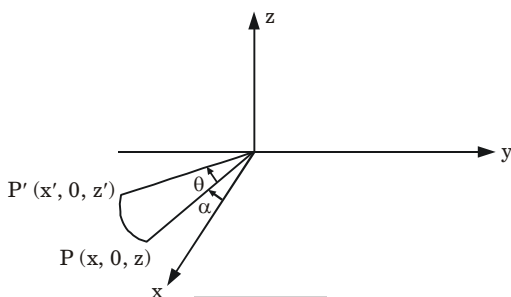

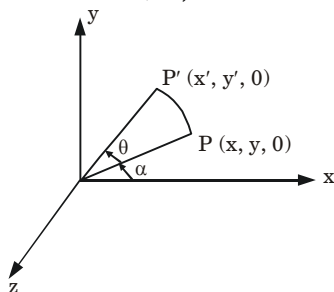

Write the steps involved in constructing 3D viewing transformation.

Answer

The steps involved in constructing 3D viewing transformations :

The complete three dimensional viewing process (without hidden surface removal) is described by the following steps :

1. Transform coordinates from world coordinates to normalized viewing coordinates by applying the transformation N_{par} or N_{per} .
2. Clip in normalized viewing coordinates against the canonical clipping volumes.
3. Project onto the screen projection plane using the projections Par or Per .
4. Apply the appropriate (two dimensional) viewing transformation.

In terms of transformations, we can describe the above process in terms of a viewing transformation V_T , where

$$V_T = V_2 \text{ Par } CL N_{\text{par}} \text{ or } V_T = V_2 \text{ Per } CL N_{\text{per}}$$

Here CL and V_2 refer to the appropriate clipping operations and two dimensional viewing transformations.

- Projection is a process of representing a three dimensional object or scene into two dimensional medium *i.e.*, projection is a shadow of the object.

Que 3.6. What do you mean by projection ? Explain the types of projection differentiate between parallel and perspective projection.

Answer**Projection :**

1. Projection is a process of representing a three dimensional object or scene into two dimensional medium *i.e.*, projection is a shadow of the object.
2. Projections transform points in a coordinate system of dimension ' n ' into points in a coordinate system of dimension less than n .

Types of projections :**1. Parallel projection :**

- a. In a parallel projection, coordinate positions are transformed to the view plane along parallel lines.
- b. These are linear transforms that are useful in blueprints to produce scale drawings of three dimensional objects.

2. Perspective projection :

- a. In a perspective projection, object positions are transformed to the view plane along lines that converge to a point called the center of projection.
- b. The projected view of an object is determined by calculating the intersection of the projection lines with the view plane.

Difference between parallel and perspective projection :

S. No.	Parallel projection	Perspective projection
1.	In parallel projection, parallel lines from each vertex on the object are extended until they intersect the view plane.	Perspective projection produces realistic view.
2.	Lines of projection are parallel.	Lines of projection are not parallel.
3.	These are linear transform.	These are non-linear transform.
4.	In parallel projection, the center of projection is at infinity.	In perspective projections, the center of projection is at a point.

Que 3.7. What do you understand by parallel projection ? Also describe orthographic and oblique projection.

Answer

Parallel projection : Refer Q. 3.6, Page 3-9C, Unit-3.

Orthographic projection :

1. It is a part of the parallel projection in which the center of projection lies at infinity.
2. In orthographic projection, the projectors are perpendicular to the projection plane and hence true size and shape of a single plane face of object is obtained.
3. Orthographic projections do not change the length of line segments which are parallel to projection plane and other lines are projected with reduced length.
4. It is the projection on one of the coordinate planes *i.e.*,

$$x = 0, \quad y = 0 \quad \text{or} \quad z = 0$$

5. The matrix for projection onto the $x = 0, y = 0$ and $z = 0$ plane is

$$P_x = \begin{bmatrix} 0 & 0 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 1 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

$$P_y = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix} \quad \text{and} \quad P_z = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 1 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

Oblique projection :

1. An oblique projection is obtained by projecting points along parallel lines that are not perpendicular to the projection plane.
2. In this projection angle between the projectors and the plane of projection is not equal to 90° i.e., projection are non-perpendicular to view plane.
3. This type of projection is seen in form of shadow of any object due to sunlight.
4. Transformation matrix for oblique projection is given as

$$M = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & L_1 \cos \theta & 0 \\ 0 & 1 & L_1 \sin \theta & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

where, L_1 is the length of line.

Que 3.8. Derive perspective projection transformation matrix.

Also define anomalies of perspective projection.

Answer

Transformation matrix of perspective projection :

1. A perspective transformation is determined by prescribing a center of projection and a view plane.
2. The view plane is determined by its view reference point R_0 and view plane normal N .
3. The object point p is located in world coordinates at (x, y, z) . The problem is to determine the image point coordinates $p'(x', y', z')$.
4. The standard perspective projection is shown in Fig. 3.8.1. Here the view plane is the xy -plane and center of projection is taken as the point $C(0, 0, -d)$ on negative z -axis.

$$x' = \frac{d \cdot x}{z + d}, y' = \frac{d \cdot y}{z + d}, z' = 0$$

5. The perspective projection transformation between object and image point is non-linear and so cannot be represented as 3×3 matrix transformation.
6. If we use homogeneous coordinate, the perspective transformation can be represented as 4×4 matrix :

$$\begin{bmatrix} x' \\ y' \\ z' \\ 1 \end{bmatrix} = \begin{bmatrix} d \cdot x \\ d \cdot y \\ 0 \\ z + d \end{bmatrix} = \begin{bmatrix} d & 0 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & d & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 & d \end{bmatrix} \begin{bmatrix} x \\ y \\ z \\ 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

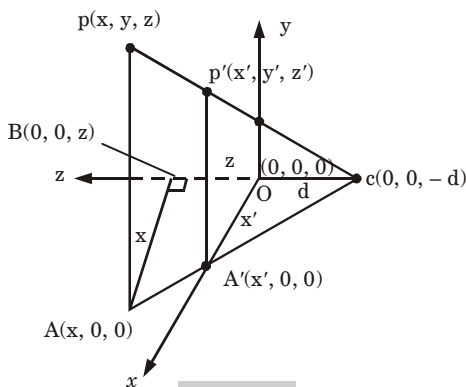

Perspective projection anomalies :

- 1. Perspective foreshortening :** The farther an object is from the center of projection, the smaller it appears.

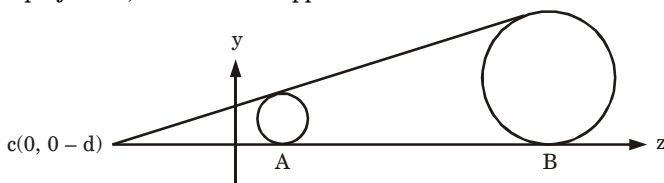

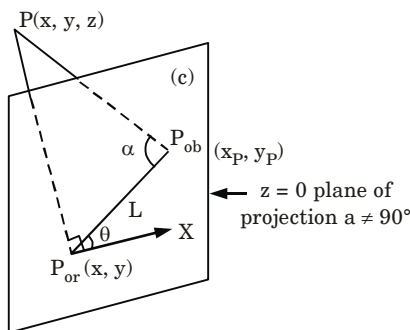
- 2. Vanishing point :** Projections of lines that are not parallel to the view plane appear to meet at some point on the view plane.
- 3. View confusion :** Objects behind the center of projection are projected upside down and backward onto the view plane.

Que 3.9. Derive oblique parallel projection and perspective projection matrices.

Answer**Derivation of oblique parallel projection :**

- An oblique projection is obtained by projecting points along parallel lines that are not perpendicular to the projection plane.
- An oblique projection of a point $P(x, y, z)$ on the $z = 0$ plane is shown in Fig. 3.9.1.
- $P_{ob}(x_p, y_p)$ is oblique projection of the point P and $P_{or}(x, y)$ is the orthographic projection of P on the $z = 0$ plane.
- Let L be the length of the line joining points $P_{ob}(x_p, y_p)$ and $P_{or}(x, y)$, θ be the angle made by the line L with x -axis.

**Fig. 3.9.1.**

5. We can express the projection coordinates in terms of x, y, L and θ as

$$x_p = x + L \cos \theta$$

$$y_p = y + L \sin \theta$$

6. Length L depends on the angle α and the Z coordinate of the point to be projected

$$\tan \alpha = \frac{Z}{L} \Rightarrow L = \frac{Z}{\tan \alpha} = ZL_1 \quad \left(\text{where } L_1 = \frac{1}{\tan \alpha} \right)$$

when

$$Z = 1, L = L_1$$

7. Now, we can write the oblique projection as

$$x_p = x + Z(L_1 \cos \theta)$$

$$y_p = y + Z(L_1 \sin \theta)$$

8. Considering $Z_p = 0$, we get

$$\begin{bmatrix} x_p \\ y_p \\ z_p \\ 1 \end{bmatrix} = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & L_1 \cos \theta & 0 \\ 0 & 1 & L_1 \sin \theta & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix} \begin{bmatrix} x \\ y \\ z \\ 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

Derivation of perspective projection matrix :

1. Let us consider the center of projection is at (x_c, y_c, z_c) and the point on object is (x_1, y_1, z_1) , then the parametric equation for the line containing these points can be given as

$$x_2 = x_c + (x_1 - x_c)u$$

$$y_2 = y_c + (y_1 - y_c)u$$

$$z_2 = z_c + (z_1 - z_c)u$$

where u is the parameter

2. For projected point z_2 is 0, therefore, the third equation can be written as

$$0 = z_c + (z_1 - z_c)u$$

$$\therefore u = -\frac{z_c}{(z_1 - z_c)}$$

3. Put this value of u in first two equations, we get

$$\begin{aligned} x_2 &= x_c - \frac{z_c}{(z_1 - z_c)} (x_1 - x_c) \\ &= \frac{x_c z_1 - x_c z_c - x_1 z_c + x_c z_c}{(z_1 - z_c)} \end{aligned}$$

$$\therefore x_2 = \frac{x_c z_1 - x_1 z_c}{(z_1 - z_c)}$$

and

$$\begin{aligned} y_2 &= y_c - \frac{z_c}{(z_1 - z_c)} (y_1 - y_c) \\ &= \frac{y_c z_1 - y_c z_c - y_1 z_c + y_c z_c}{(z_1 - z_c)} \end{aligned}$$

$$y_2 = \frac{y_c z_1 - y_1 z_c}{(z_1 - z_c)}$$

4. So, the homogeneous matrix can be written as

$$\begin{bmatrix} x_2 & y_2 & z_2 & 1 \end{bmatrix} = \begin{bmatrix} x_1 & y_1 & z_1 & 1 \end{bmatrix} \begin{bmatrix} -z_c & 0 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & -z_c & 0 & 0 \\ x_c & y_c & 0 & 1 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & -z_c \end{bmatrix}$$

Types of parallel projection :

i. **Orthographic projection :** Refer Q. 3.7, Page 3–10C, Unit-3.

ii. **Oblique projection :** Refer Q. 3.7, Page 3–10C, Unit-3.

Perspective projection : Refer Q. 3.6, Page 3–9C, Unit-3.

Different types of perspective projection are :

- Single-point perspective transformation :** One-point perspective projection occurs when only one principal axis intersects the plane of projection.
- Two-point perspective transformation :** Two-point or two principal vanishing point perspective projection occurs when the plane of projection intersects exactly two of the principal axis.

- 3. Three-point perspective transformation :** Three-point projection is obtained when the projection plane intersects all three of the principal axis *i.e.*, none of the principal axis is parallel to the projection plane.

Depth cueing projection :

1. In depth cueing, we include the depth information in the displayed object.
2. The depth of an object can be represented by the intensity of the image.
3. Depth cueing is applied by choosing maximum and minimum intensity values.
4. The parts of the objects closest to the viewing position are displayed with the highest intensities and objects farther away are displayed with decreasing intensities.
5. Reason to use depth cueing projection for 3D display method:
 - a. To create realistic view of an object.
 - b. To easily identify the particular viewing direction of displayed object.
6. A simple method for indicating depth is using wireframe display.

Que 3.11. Explain the matrix for perspective projection for three vanishing points.

Answer

Matrix for perspective projection for three vanishing point :

1. Three vanishing point projection occurs when the projection plane intersects all three of the principal axis *i.e.*, none of the principal axis is parallel to the projection plane.
2. The need of three vanishing point perspective transformation is to reconstruct the shape of a 3D object.
3. The matrix representation of three vanishing point perspective transformation is

$$\begin{aligned}
 & \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & 0 & p \\ 0 & 1 & 0 & q \\ 0 & 0 & 1 & r \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix} \\
 [x' \ y' \ z' \ 1] &= [x \ y \ z \ 1] \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & 0 & p \\ 0 & 1 & 0 & q \\ 0 & 0 & 1 & r \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix} \\
 &= [x \ y \ z \ (px + qy + rz + 1)] \\
 &= \left[\frac{x}{(px + qy + rz + 1)} \ \frac{y}{(px + qy + rz + 1)} \ \frac{z}{(px + qy + rz + 1)} \ 1 \right]
 \end{aligned}$$

- It has three center of projections, one on x -axis at $[-1/p, 0, 0, 1]$, second on y -axis at $[0, -1/q, 0, 1]$ and third on z -axis at $[0, 0, -1/r, 1]$.
- It also has three vanishing points, one on x -axis $[1/p, 0, 0, 1]$, one on y -axis at $[0, 1/q, 0, 1]$ and third on z -axis at $[0, 0, 1/r, 1]$.

Que 3.12. Find the perspective projection onto the view plane $z = d$ where the centre of projection is the origin $(0, 0, 0)$.

Answer

The plane $z = d$ is parallel to the xy plane. Thus the view plane normal vector N is the same as the normal vector K to the xy plane, i.e., $N = K$. Select view reference point as $R_0(0, 0, d)$, then

$$N(n_1, n_2, n_3) = (0, 0, 1)$$

$$R_0(x_0, y_0, z_0) = (0, 0, d)$$

$$d_0 = n_1x_0 + n_2y_0 + n_3z_0 = d$$

then projection matrix is

$$\text{Per}_{k, R_0} = \begin{bmatrix} d & 0 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & d & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & d & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 & 0 \end{bmatrix}$$

Que 3.13. Find the general form of an oblique projection onto the xy plane.

Answer

- Oblique projection can be specified by a number f and an angle θ . The number f prescribes the ratio that any line L perpendicular to the xy plane will be foreshortened after projection.
- The angle θ is the angle that the projection of any line perpendicular to the xy plane makes with the x -axis.

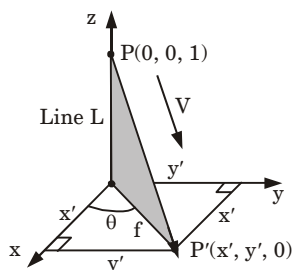


Fig. 3.13.1.

3. To determine the projection transformation, we need to find the direction vector V . From above figure we have line L of length 1, we see that vector $\overline{P'P}$ has the same direction on V .

$$V = \overline{P'P} = x'\hat{i} + y'\hat{j} - \hat{k} = a\hat{i} + b\hat{j} + c\hat{k}$$

$$a = x' = f \cos \theta, b = y' = f \sin \theta$$

$$c = -1$$

$$\text{Par}_V = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & f \cos \theta & 0 \\ 0 & 1 & f \sin \theta & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

Que 3.14. Find the transformation for (a) cavalier with $\theta = 45^\circ$ and (b) cabinet projection with $\theta = 30^\circ$.

Answer

- a. A cavalier projection is an oblique projection where there is no foreshortening of line perpendicular to the xy plane. We then see for $f = 1$, with $\theta = 45^\circ$, we have

$$\text{Par}_{V_1} = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & \frac{\sqrt{2}}{2} & 0 \\ 0 & 1 & \frac{\sqrt{2}}{2} & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

- b. A cabinet projection is an oblique projection with $f = \frac{1}{2}$, with $\theta = 30^\circ$, we have

$$\text{Par}_{V_2} = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & \frac{\sqrt{3}}{4} & 0 \\ 0 & 1 & \frac{1}{4} & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

Que 3.15. What do you mean by 3D clipping ? Discuss in detail.

Answer

1. Clipping in three dimensions can be accomplished using extensions of two dimensional clipping methods.
2. In 3D clipping we clip the objects against the boundary planes of the view volume.
3. To clip a line segment against the view volume, we would need to test the relative position of the line using the view volume's boundary plane equations.
4. By substituting the line endpoint coordinates into the plane equation of each boundary which determines whether the endpoint is inside or outside that boundary.
 - a. An endpoint (x, y, z) of a line segment is outside a boundary plane if $Ax + By + Cz + D > 0$
 - b. Similarly, the point is inside the boundary if $Ax + By + Cz + D < 0$.
 - c. Lines with both endpoints outside a boundary plane are discarded, and those with both endpoints inside all boundary planes are saved.
5. The intersection of a line with a boundary is found using the line equations along with the plane equation.

6. Intersection coordinates (x_1, y_1, z_1) are values that are on the line and that satisfy the plane equation $Ax_1 + By_1 + Cz_1 + D = 0$, where A, B, C , and D are the plane parameters for that boundary.

Que 3.16. Write 3D line clipping algorithm for Cohen-Sutherland region code method.

OR

Establish and write Cohen and Sutherland 3D line clipping algorithm.

Answer

1. The Cohen Sutherland algorithm extends easily to 3D. It extends the 3D clipping window boundaries to define 27 regions. Assign a 6 bit code to each region, that is, for each point (x, y, z) .
2. Suppose the bands for cuboid view volume are $(X_{vmin}, X_{vmax}), (Y_{vmin}, Y_{vmax})$ and (Z_{vmin}, Z_{vmax}) where the subscript vmin and vmax stands for view volume minlimit and view volume maxlimit (front and back end planes).
3. We assign bit codes to any point (x, y, z) as :

Bit1 = 1 if $x < X_{min}$

Bit 2 = 1 if $x > X_{max}$

Bit 3 = 1 if $y < Y_{min}$

Bit 4 = 1 if $y > Y_{max}$

Bit 5 = 1 if $z < Z_{min}$

Bit 6 = 1 if $z > Z_{max}$.

Otherwise bits are set to 0 (zero).

4. A point is inside if the region code is 000000. Therefore a line is visible if both ends are 000000.
5. A line is invisible if it lies entirely to one side of the clipping region, that is, if logical AND operation on the bit codes of the end points is non-zero.

Que 3.17. Establish and write Cyrus-Beck 3D line clipping algorithm.

Answer

1. Cyrus-Beck algorithm is applicable to an arbitrary convex region.
2. This algorithm uses a parametric equation of line segment to find the intersection points of a line with the clipping edges.

3. The parametric equation of a line segment from P_1 to P_2 is

$$P(t) = P_1 + (P_2 - P_1)t, 0 \leq t \leq 1$$

where t is a parameter, $t = 0$ at P_1 and $t = 1$ at P_2 .

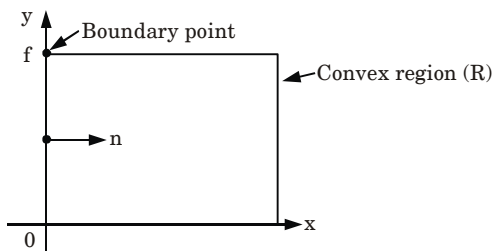


Fig. 3.17.1. Convex region, boundary point and inner normal.

4. Consider a convex clipping region R , f is a boundary point of the convex region R and n is an inner normal for one of its boundaries, as shown in Fig. 3.17.1.

5. We evaluate the dot product $n \cdot [P(t) - f]$, and check the following condition as :

- a. If dot product is negative, i.e.,

$$n \cdot [P(t) - f] < 0$$

Then the vector $P(t) - f$ is pointed away from the interior of R .

- b. If dot product is zero, i.e.,

$$n \cdot [P(t) - f] = 0$$

Then $P(t) - f$ is pointed parallel to the plane containing f and perpendicular to the normal.

- c. If dot product is positive, i.e.,

$$n \cdot [P(t) - f] > 0$$

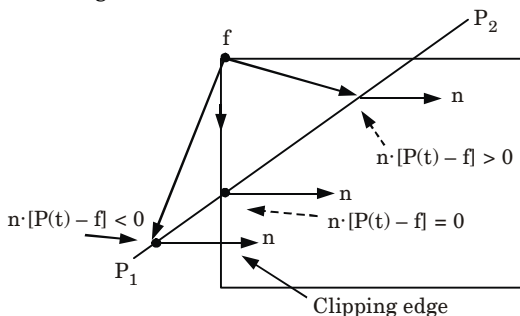


Fig. 3.17.2. Dot product for three inside, outside and on the boundary of the clipping region.

Then the vector $P(t) - f$ is pointed towards the interior of R , as shown in Fig. 3.17.2.

Cyrus-Beck line clipping algorithm :

1. Read two endpoints of the line, P_1 and P_2 .
2. Read vertex coordinates of the clipping window.
3. Calculate $D = P_2 - P_1$.
4. Assign boundary point (f) with particular edge.
5. Find inner normal vector for corresponding edge.
6. Calculate $D \cdot n$ and $W = P_1 - f$.
7. If $D \cdot n > 0$.

$$t_L = - \frac{W \cdot n}{D \cdot n}$$

else

$$t_U = - \frac{W \cdot n}{D \cdot n}$$

end if

8. Repeat steps 4 to 7 for each edge of the clipping window.
9. Find maximum lower limit and minimum upper limit.
10. If maximum lower limit and minimum upper limit do not satisfy condition $0 \leq t \leq 1$ then ignore the line.
11. Calculate the intersection points by substituting values of maximum lower limit and minimum upper limit in the parametric equation of the line $P_1 P_2$.
12. Draw the line segment $P(t_L)$ to $P(t_U)$.
13. Stop.

Que 3.18. Consider the line from $P_1(-2, 1)$ to $P_2(8, 4)$ clipped to the rectangular region R as shown in the Fig. 3.18.1. The line $P_1 P_2$ intersects the window. Calculate the intersection points.

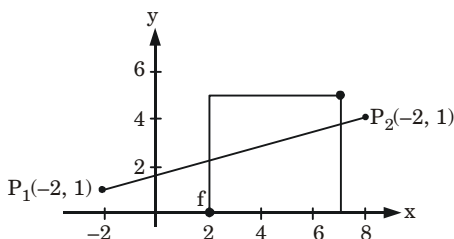


Fig. 3.18.1.

Answer

1. The parametric representation of the line P_1P_2 is

$$\begin{aligned} P(t) &= P_1 + (P_2 - P_1)t = [-2 \ 1] + [10 \ 3] t \\ &= (10t - 2) i + (3t + 1) j \quad 0 \leq t \leq 1 \end{aligned}$$

where i and j are the unit vectors in the x and y directions, respectively.

2. The four inner normal's are given as

$$\text{Left :} \quad n_L = i$$

$$\text{Right :} \quad n_R = -i$$

$$\text{Bottom :} \quad n_B = j$$

$$\text{Top :} \quad n_T = -j$$

3. Choosing $f(2, 0)$ for the left edge gives

$$\begin{aligned} P(t) - f &= (10t - 4) i + (3t + 1) j \quad \text{and} \\ n_L \cdot [P(t) - f] &= 10t - 4 = 0 \\ \therefore \quad t &= 2/5 \end{aligned}$$

4. Substituting value of t in parametric equation we get,

$$\begin{aligned} P(2/5) &= [-2 \ 1] + [10 \ 3] (2/5) \\ &= [-2 \ 1] + [4 \ 6/5] \\ &= [2 \ 2.2] \end{aligned}$$

5. Choosing $f(7, 5)$ for the right edge gives

$$\begin{aligned} P(t) - f &= (10t - 9) i + (3t - 4) j \quad \text{and} \\ n_R \cdot [P(t) - f] &= -(10t - 9) = 0 \\ t &= 9/10 \end{aligned}$$

6. Substituting value of t in parametric equation we get,

$$\begin{aligned} P(9/10) &= [-2 \ 1] + [10 \ 3] (9/10) \\ &= [-2 \ 1] + [9 \ 27/10] \\ &= [7 \ 37/10] = [7 \ 3.7] \end{aligned}$$

7. Using $f(2, 0)$ for the bottom edge gives

$$\begin{aligned} n_B \cdot [P(t) - f] &= 3t + 1 = 0 \\ \therefore \quad t &= -1/3 \end{aligned}$$

8. This value of t is outside the range of $0 \leq t \leq 1$ and hence it is rejected. Using $f(7, 5)$ for the top edge gives

$$n_T \cdot [P(t) - f] = -(3t - 4) = 0$$

$$\therefore t = 4/3$$

9. This value of t is outside the range of $0 \leq t \leq 1$ and hence it is rejected.

Thus, we get two intersection points (2, 2.2) and (7, 3.7) with left edge and right edge, respectively.

Answer

Various types of quadratic surfaces :

1. Sphere :

- a. A sphere with a radius r is defined as the set of points (x, y, z) that satisfies the following equations :

$$x^2 + y^2 + z^2 = r^2$$

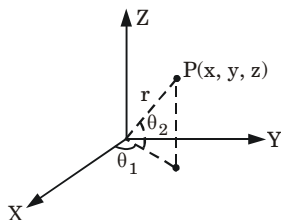


Fig. 4.1.1. Parametric coordinate position (r, θ_1, θ_2) on the surface of a sphere.

- b. The parametric equations for spherical surfaces are :
- $$x = r \cos \theta_1 \cos \theta_2$$

$$y = r \sin \theta_1 \cos \theta_2$$

$$z = r \sin \theta_2$$

where, $-\frac{\pi}{2} \leq \theta_2 \leq \frac{\pi}{2}$ and $-\pi \leq \theta_1 \leq \pi$

2. Ellipsoid :

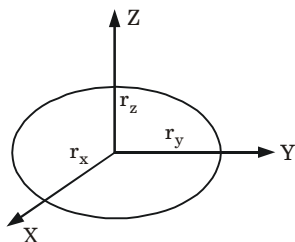


Fig. 4.1.2. An ellipsoid with three mutually perpendicular radii r_x , r_y and r_z , centered on the coordinate origin.

- a. An ellipsoid surface is the extension of a spherical surface. There are three mutually perpendicular radii that have different values as shown in Fig. 4.1.2.

- b. In the cartesian coordinate system, the ellipsoid centered at the origin can be defined as :

$$\left(\frac{x}{r_x}\right)^2 + \left(\frac{y}{r_y}\right)^2 + \left(\frac{z}{r_z}\right)^2 = 1$$

- c. The parametric equations are :

$$x = r_x \cos \theta_1 \cos \theta_2$$

$$y = r_y \sin \theta_1 \cos \theta_2$$

$$z = r_z \sin \theta_2$$

where, $-\pi/2 \leq \theta_1 \leq \pi/2$ and $-\pi \leq \theta_2 \leq \pi$

3. Torus :

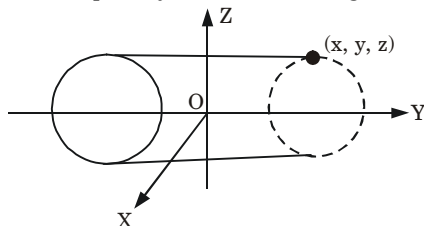


Fig. 4.1.3. Torus

- a. A doughnut-shaped object as shown in Fig. 4.1.3 is called a torus.

This can be generated by rotating a conic object like a circle about a specified axis.

- b. In cartesian coordinates, equations for points over the surface of a torus is given as

$$\left[r - \sqrt{\left(\frac{x}{r_x}\right)^2 + \left(\frac{y}{r_y}\right)^2} \right]^2 + \left(\frac{z}{r_z}\right)^2 = 1$$

c. The parametric representations for a torus can be given as

$$x = r_x(r + \cos\phi) \cos\theta, \quad -\pi \leq \phi \leq \pi$$

$$y = r_y(r + \cos\phi) \sin\theta, \quad -\pi \leq \theta \leq \pi$$

$$z = r_z \sin\phi$$

Bloppy objects :

1. Bloppy objects do not maintain a fixed shape and change their surface characteristics in certain motions or when they come in contact with other objects.
2. Molecular structures, melting objects, water droplets, muscle shapes in the human body, etc., are examples of bloppy objects.
3. As objects show a certain degree of fluidity and bloopiness, these objects are simply known as bloppy objects.



Fig. 4.1.4. Molecular bonding as two molecules move away from each other, the surface shape stretch, snap and finally contract into spheres.



Fig. 4.1.5. Bloppy muscle shape in the human arm.

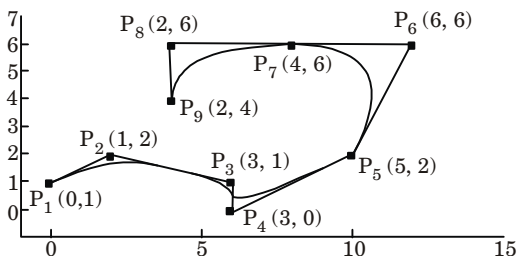
Que 4.2. Explain the B-spline curves. What are the properties of B-spline curve ?

OR

Write the properties of B-spline curves. Also write advantages of B-spline curves over Bezier curves.

Answer**B-spline curves :**

1. B-spline is basis spline function which contains a set of control points.
2. B-spline function is a combination of flexible band that passes through the number of control points and creates a smooth curve.
3. Each vertex affects the shape of the curve only over a range of parameter values where its associated basis function is non-zero.

**Fig. 4.2.1.**

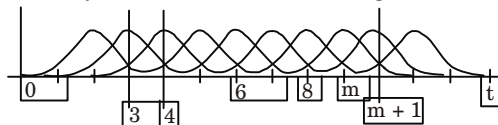
4. The B-spline is non-global because each vertex B_i is associated with a unique basis function.
5. If $P(u)$ be the position vectors along the curve as a function of the parameter u , a B-spline curve is given by

$$P(u) = \sum_{k=0}^n P_k B_{k,d}(u), \quad u_{\min} \leq u \leq u_{\max}$$

$$2 \leq d \leq n + 1$$

where the p_k is an input set of $n + 1$ control points.

Example : The unweighted spline set of 10 control points, 10 splines, 14 knots, and but only 7 intervals are shown is Fig. 4.2.2.

**Fig. 4.2.2.****Properties of B-splines curves :**

1. The polynomial curve has degree $d-1$ and C^{d-2} continuity over the range of u .
2. For $n + 1$ control points, the curve is described with $n + 1$ blending functions.
3. Each blending function $B_{k,d}$ is defined over d subintervals of the total range of u , starting at knot value u_k .

4. The range of parameter u is divided into $n + d$ subinterval by the $n + d + 1$ values specified in the knot vector.
5. Each section of spline curve is influenced by d control points.
6. Any one control point can affect the shape of atmost d curve sections.
7. For any value of u in the interval from knot value u_{d-1} to u_{n+1} the sum over all basic function is 1 :

$$\sum_{k=0}^n B_{k,d}(u) = 1$$

Advantages of B-spline curves over Bezier curves :

1. The degree of B-spline polynomial can be set independently of the number of control points.
2. B-spline allows local control over the shape of a spline curve or surface.
3. The trade-off is that B-splines are more complex than Bezier curves.

Que 4.3. What are the parametric continuity conditions in a spline representation ?

Answer

We imposed various continuity conditions at the connection points to ensure smooth transition from one section to the next section of the piecewise parametric curve. If the spline curve is described in terms of parametric coordinate form like

$$x = x(v), y = y(v), z = z(v)$$

Spline curve can be represented as :

1. **Zero-order parametric continuity :** When two pieces of the curve meet at a point, this is known as zero-order parametric continuity as shown in Fig. 4.3.1, and is represented by C^0 .



Fig. 4.3.1. Zero-order.

The values of x, y, z can be evaluated at v , for the first piece of curve and will be equal to the values of x, y, z evaluated at v , for the second curve.

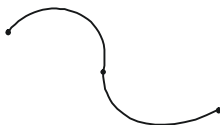


Fig. 4.3.2. First-order.

2. **First-order parametric continuity :** The first-order parametric continuity shows that the first derivatives of the coordinate function $x = x(v), y = y(v), z = z(v)$ for two successive pieces are equal at their joining point as shown in Fig. 4.3.2. This is represented by C^1 .

- 3. Second-order parametric continuity :** The second-order parametric continuity shows that both the first and second-order derivatives of the two curve pieces are the same at intersection as shown in Fig. 4.3.3. This is represented by C^2 .



Fig. 4.3.3. Second-order.

Que 4.4. Explain the characteristics of B-spline curve. How is it useful for interpolation ?

Answer

Characteristics of B-spline curve :

1. The sum of the B-spline basis functions for any parameter value is 1.
2. Each basis function is positive or zero for all parameter values.
3. Each basis function has precisely one maximum value, except for $k = 1$.
4. The maximum order of the curve is equal to the number of vertices of defining polygon.
5. The degree of B-spline polynomial is independent on the number of vertices of defining polygon.
6. The curve exhibits the variation diminishing property.
7. The curve generally follows the shape of defining polygon.

B-spline curve is useful for interpolation because :

1. The degree of B-spline polynomial is independent of the number of control points of defining polygon.
2. B-spline allows local control over the curve surface because each control point affects the shape of a curve only over a range of parameters values where its associated basis function is non-zero.

Que 4.5. Describe parametric representation of surfaces.

Answer

Parametric representation of surfaces means a continuous, vector-valued function $P(s, t)$ of two variables, or parameters s and t where the variables are allowed to range over connected region of the uv plane.

Parametric description :

1. The three equations for determining the coordinates of any point on the surface S are described in terms of parameters, say, s and t , and in parameter ranges $[a, b]$ and $[c, d]$, which may be infinite :

$$x = f(s, t), \quad a \leq s \leq b$$

$$S: y = g(s, t), \quad c \leq t \leq d$$

$$z = h(s, t)$$

- The coordinates of any point P on the surface have the form $[f(s, t), g(s, t), h(s, t)]$.
- Spherical surface in parametric form can be defined in terms of the angular parameters ϕ and θ :

$$x = r \cos \phi \cos \theta, \text{ for } -\pi/2 \leq \phi \leq \pi/2$$

$$y = r \cos \phi \sin \theta, \text{ for } -\pi \leq \theta \leq \pi$$

$$z = r \sin \phi$$
- Parametric representation for a torus is similar to those for an ellipse, except that the angle ϕ extends over 360° . Using latitude and longitude angles ϕ and θ , we can describe the torus surface as the set of points that satisfy

$$X = r_x \cos \phi \cos \theta, \text{ for } -\pi/2 \leq \phi \leq \pi/2$$

$$Y = r_y \cos \phi \sin \theta, \text{ for } -\pi \leq \theta \leq \pi$$

$$Z = r_z \sin \phi$$

Que 4.6. Write note on interpolation.

Answer

- Interpolation is a method of constructing new data points within the range of a discrete set of known data points.
- The number of data points obtained by sampling or experimentation represents the values of a function for a limited number of values of the independent variable.
- It is often required to interpolate, *i.e.*, estimate the value of that function for an intermediate value of the independent variable.
- A few data points from the original function can be interpolated to produce a simpler function which is still fairly close to the original. The resulting gain in simplicity may outweigh the loss from interpolation error.
- The main task in this process is to find the suitable mathematical expression for the known curve.
- Interpolation technique is used when we have to draw the curve by determining intermediate points between the known sample points.

Que 4.7. Explain the types of interpolation method.

Answer

Type of interpolation methods are :

1. IDW :

- a. The IDW (Inverse Distance Weighted) tool uses a method of interpolation that estimates cell values by averaging the values of sample data points in the neighbourhood of each processing cell.
- b. The closer a point is to the center of the cell being estimated the more influence or weight it has in the averaging process.
- c. A specified number of points or all points within a specified radius can be used to determine the output value of each location.

2. Kriging :

- a. Kriging is a geostatistical procedure that considers both the distance and the degree of variation between known data points when estimating values in unknown areas.
- b. This procedure generates an estimated surface from a scattered set of points with z -values.
- c. It should be done before we select the best estimation method for generating the output surface.

3. Natural neighbour :

- a. Natural neighbour interpolation finds the closest subset of input samples to a query point and applies weights to them based on proportionate areas to interpolate a value.
- b. It is also known as Sibson or “area-stealing” interpolation.

4. Spline : The spline tool uses an interpolation method that estimates values using a mathematical function that minimizes overall surface curvature, resulting in a smooth surface that passes exactly through the input points.**5. Spline with barriers :** The spline with barriers tool uses a method similar to the technique used in the Spline tool, with the major difference being that this tool honors discontinuities encoded in both the input barriers and the input point data.**6. Topo to raster :** It use an interpolation technique specifically designed to create a surface that more closely represents a natural drainage surface and better preserves stream networks from input contour data.**7. Trend :**

- a. Trend is a global polynomial interpolation that fits a smooth surface defined by a mathematical function (a polynomial) to the input sample points.
- b. The trend surface changes gradually and captures coarse-scale patterns in the data.

Que 4.8. Explain Bezier curves and properties of Bezier curves.

Answer

Bezier curves :

1. A Bezier curve section can be filled to any number of control points.
2. The number of control points to be approximated and their relative position determine the degree of Bezier polynomial.
3. Bezier curve can be specified with boundary conditions with a characterizing matrix or with blending functions.
4. For general Bezier curves, the blending function specification is most convenient.
5. Suppose we are given $n + 1$ control points position : $P_k = (x_k, y_k, z_k)$ with k varying from 0 to n .

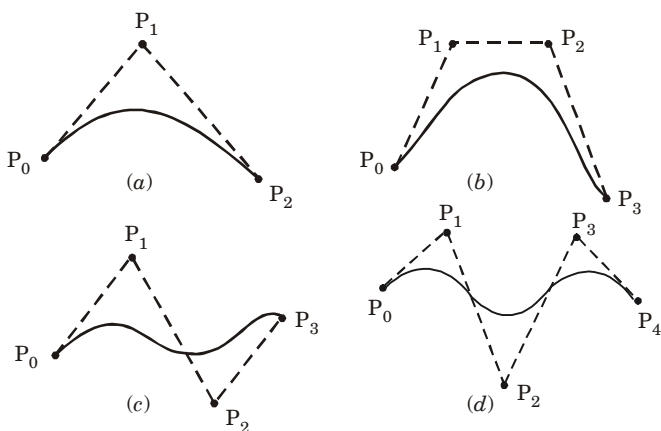


Fig. 4.8.1. Example of Bezier curves generated from three, four, five control points.

6. These coordinate point can be blended to produce the following position vector $P(u)$, which describes the path of an approximation Bezier polynomial function between P_0 and P_n .

$$P(u) = \sum_{k=0}^n P_k BEZ_{k,n}(u) \quad 0 \leq u \leq 1 \quad \dots(4.8.1)$$

Equation (4.8.1) represents a set of three parametric equations for individual coordinates :

$$x(u) = \sum_{k=0}^n x_k BEZ_{k,n}(u)$$

$$y(u) = \sum_{k=0}^n y_k BEZ_{k,n}(u)$$

$$z(u) = \sum_{k=0}^n z_k BEZ_{k,n}(u)$$

where, $BEZ_{k,n}(u) = c(n, k) \cdot u^k \cdot (1-u)^{n-k}$

Properties of Bezier curves :

1. Bezier curve always passes through the first and last control points *i.e.*, curve has same end points as the guiding polygon.
2. The degree of the polynomial defining the curve segment is one less than the number of defining polygon point. Therefore, for four control points, the degree of the polynomial is three, *i.e.*, cubic polynomial.
3. The direction of the tangent vector at the end points is the same as that of the vector determined by first and last segments.
4. The curve lies entirely within the convex hull formed by four control points.
5. The convex hull property for a Bezier curve ensures that the polynomial smoothly follows the control points.
6. The curve is invariant under an affine transformation.

Que 4.9. Construct the Beizer curve of order 3 with 4 polygon vertices $A(1, 1), B(2, 3), C(4, 3), D(6, 4)$.

Answer

The equation for the Bezier curve is given as :

$$p(u) = (1-u)^3 P_1 + 3u(1-u)^2 P_2 + 3u^2(1-u) P_3 + u^3 P_4 \quad \text{for } 0 \leq u \leq 1$$

where $p(u)$ is the point on the curve P_1, P_2, P_3, P_4 .

Let us take $u = 0, \frac{1}{4}, \frac{1}{2}, \frac{3}{4}$

$\therefore P(0) = (1, 1)$

$$\begin{aligned}

 &= \left[\frac{27}{64} \times 1 + \frac{27}{64} \times 2 + \frac{9}{64} \times 4 + \frac{1}{64} \times 6, \frac{27}{64} \times 1 \right. \\

 &\quad \left. + \frac{9}{64} \times 3 + \frac{27}{64} \times 3 + \frac{27}{64} \times 4 \right] \\
 &= \left[\frac{289}{64}, \frac{217}{64} \right] = (4.5156, 3.3906)
 \end{aligned}$$

$$P(1) = P_3 = (6, 4)$$

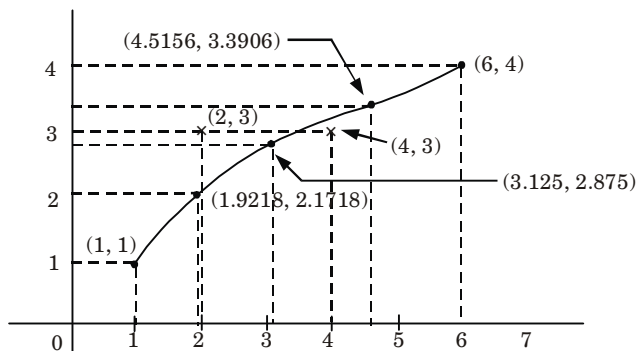


Fig. 4.9.1. Plotted Bezier curve.

Fig. 4.9.1 shows the calculated points of the Bezier curve and curve passing through it.

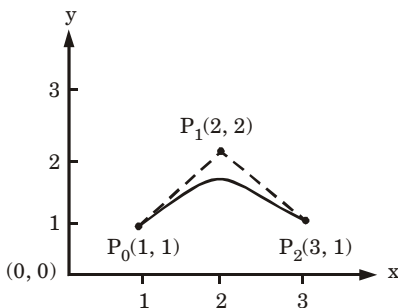

Algorithm for Bezier curve :

1. Get four control points say $A(x_A, y_A)$, $B(x_B, y_B)$, $C(x_C, y_C)$, $D(x_D, y_D)$.
2. Divide the curve represented by points A, B, C and D in two sections

$$x_{AB} = (x_A + x_B) / 2$$

$$y_{AB} = (y_A + y_B) / 2$$

$$x_{BC} = (x_B + x_C) / 2$$

$$y_{BC} = (y_B + y_C) / 2$$

$$x_{CD} = (x_C + x_D) / 2$$

$$y_{CD} = (y_C + y_D) / 2$$

$$x_{ABC} = (x_{AB} + x_{BC}) / 2$$

$$y_{ABC} = (y_{AB} + y_{BC}) / 2$$

$$x_{BCD} = (x_{BC} + x_{CD}) / 2$$

$$y_{BCD} = (y_{BC} + y_{CD}) / 2$$

3. Repeat the step 2 for section A, AB, ABC and $ABCD$ and section $ABCD, BCD, CD$ and D .
4. Repeat step 3 until we have sections so short that they can be replaced by straight lines.
5. Replace small sections by straight lines.
6. Stop.

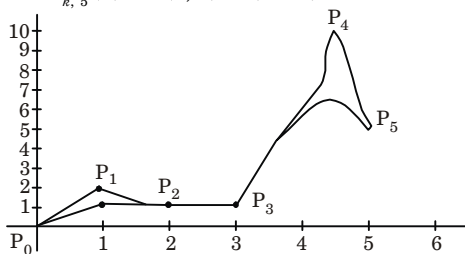

Que 5.1. Discuss back-face detection method.

Write back-face detection algorithm of hidden lines.

Answer

Back-face detection method :

1. Object surfaces that are orientated away from the viewer are called back-faces.
2. Algorithm used to detect the back-faces is known as back-face detection algorithm.
3. If any three points (x_1, y_1, z_1) , (x_2, y_2, z_2) and (x_3, y_3, z_3) on any plane surface are known, the unknown parameters A, B, C and D of the plane surface equation $Ax + By + Cz + D = 0$ can be found as follows :
 - i. All the three points (x_1, y_1, z_1) , (x_2, y_2, z_2) and (x_3, y_3, z_3) should satisfy the equation $Ax + By + Cz + D = 0$ as it lies on the surface.
Hence,
$$Ax_1 + By_1 + Cz_1 + D = 0$$
$$Ax_2 + By_2 + Cz_2 + D = 0$$
$$Ax_3 + By_3 + Cz_3 + D = 0$$

- ii. Also, any arbitrary point (x, y, z) lying on the surface should satisfy the equation of the desired surface

$$Ax + By + Cz + D = 0$$

- iii. A unique solution of equations for A, B, C and D can only be obtained if

- iv. Any plane with its inside and outside surfaces can be defined by three points and its normal vector.
- v. This normal vector can be calculated with three position vectors of three points (x_1, y_1, z_1) , (x_2, y_2, z_2) and (x_3, y_3, z_3) .
- vi. Using right hand thumb rule, the three points are considered in counter clockwise manner for calculating the unit normal directing outside the surface. Thus, the surface normal and equation of the plane are calculated.
- vii. Now, if any point $(x, y, \text{ or } z)$ lies inside the polygon surface, $Ax + By + Cz + D < 0$, and if it is along the line of sight to the surface, the polygon must be back-face.

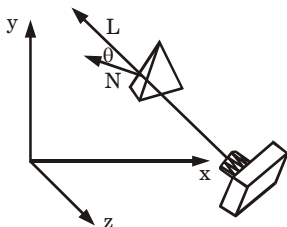


Fig. 5.1.1. (a) Geometry of camera vision.

- viii. If L is the line of sight or viewing vector (light vector in case of shadowing), perpendicular to the viewing plane originating from the eye or camera, N is the unit surface normal vector as shown in Fig. 5.1.1(a) and (b) the polygon is the back-face if $L \cdot N > 0$

- ix. On aligning the light vector to that of the view vector which is normally along negative z -axis for right-handed viewing system, that is

$$L = 0i + 0j + L_z k$$

$$L \cdot N = L_z K$$

- x. Hence, only z -component of normal vector N is required to be considered, and the sign of K is checked for negative value.
- xi. Thus, any polygon is a back-face if it has a surface normal with negative z -component value.

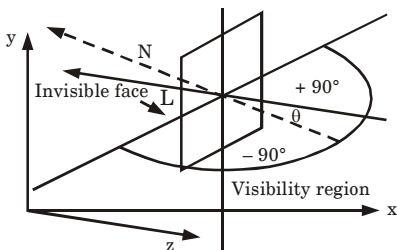


Fig. 5.1.1. (b) Invisible and visible vision.

Answer

z-buffer/Depth-buffer algorithm :

1. z-buffer is a simple extension of the frame buffer idea. A frame is used to store the intensity of each pixel in image space.
2. The z-buffer is a separate depth buffer used to store the z-coordinates or depth of every visible pixel in image space.
3. In this algorithm a buffer of the same size as the frame buffer, is set up which holds depth information.
4. Each element of the depth buffer corresponds to a pixel in the frame buffer and initially holds the maximum depth in the scene.
5. As each polygon is scan-converted, the depth at each pixel is calculated and compared with the corresponding depth in the depth buffer.
6. If the depth is less than that stored in the depth buffer (*i.e.*, nearer the viewer) then that pixel is set in the frame buffer with the polygon colour at that point and the depth buffer is set to the polygon depth.
7. If the polygon depth is greater (*i.e.*, farther away from the viewer) than the depth buffer at that point is not stored in the frame buffer.
8. The z- buffer algorithm can be stated as :

Step 1 : Initialize frame buffer to background colour.

Step 2 : Initialize z-buffer to minimum z value.

Step 3 : Scan-convert each polygon in arbitrary order.

Step 4 : For each (x, y) pixel, calculate depth 'z' at that pixel ($z(x, y)$).

Step 5 : Compare calculated new depth $z(x, y)$ with value previously stored in z-buffer at the location $z(x, y)$.

Step 6 : If $z(x, y) > z(x, y)$, then write the new depth value to z-buffer and update frame buffer.

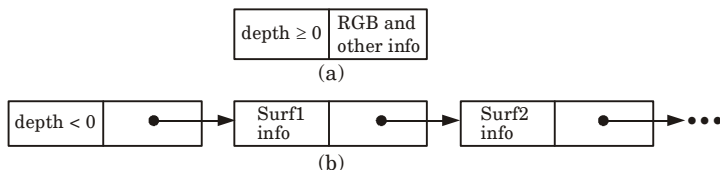
Step 7 : Otherwise, no action is taken.

Que 5.3. Discuss A-buffer method.

Answer

1. A-buffer method is a visibility detection method for the rendering system.
2. The A-buffer expands on the depth buffer method to allow transparency. The key data structure in the A-buffer is the accumulation buffer.

3. Each position in the A-buffer has two fields :
 - a. **Depth field** : It stores a positive or negative real number.
 - b. **Intensity field** : It stores surface intensity information or a pointer value.
4. If $\text{depth} \geq 0$, the number stored at that position is the depth of a single surface overlapping the corresponding pixel area.
5. The intensity field then stores the RGB components of the surface colour at that point and the percent of pixel coverage.

**Fig. 5.3.1.**

6. If $\text{depth} < 0$, it indicates multiple surface contributions to the pixel intensity.
7. The intensity field then stores a pointer to a linked list of surface data.
8. The surface buffer in the A-buffer includes :
 - a. RGB intensity components
 - b. Opacity parameter
 - c. Depth
 - d. Percent of area coverage
 - e. Surface identifier
9. The depth and opacity values are used to determine the final colour of a pixel.

Que 5.4. List the advantages and disadvantages of back-face detection and A-buffer method. Write the algorithm for back-face detection.

Answer

Advantages of back-face detection method :

1. It is fast.
2. It is a simple object space method.

Disadvantages of back-face detection method :

1. It can only be used on solid objects modeled as a polygon mesh.
2. It works fine for convex polyhedra but not necessarily for concave polyhedra.

Advantages of A-buffer method :

1. It is an extension of depth-buffer method.
2. More than one surface intensity can be taken into consideration at each pixel position.
3. It also anti-aliased the object edges.
4. In this, surfaces are sub-divided into a polygon mesh and clipped against the pixel boundaries.
5. The intensity of pixel is determined by considering opacity parameter and percentage of overlaps of the overlapping surface.

Disadvantages of A-buffer method :

1. This algorithm processes multiple objects at a time. The total number of polygons in a picture can be arbitrarily large.

Back-face detection algorithm : Refer Q. 5.1, Page 5-2C, Unit-5.

Que 5.5. Explain hidden surface removing of scanline method.

Answer

1. A scanline method of hidden surface removal is another approach of image space method.
2. It is an extension of the scanline algorithm, for filling polygon interiors.
3. This algorithm deals with multiple surfaces.
4. As each scanline is processed, all polygon surfaces intersecting that line are examined to determine which are visible.

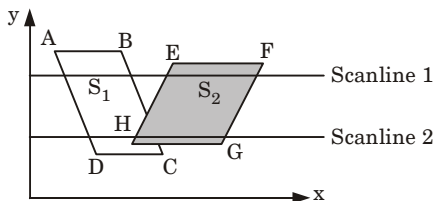
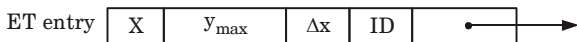


Fig. 5.5.1. Illustration of scanline method of hidden surface removal.

5. Across each scanline, depth calculations are made for each overlapping surface to determine which is nearest to the view plane.
6. When the visible surface has been determined, the intensity value for that position is entered into the frame buffer.
7. This algorithm maintains three table :
 - a. **Edge Table (ET) :** It contain the list of edge used in scanline algorithm.

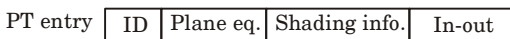
**Fig. 5.5.2.**

- b. Active Edge Table (AET) :** It contains only edges that cross the current scanline, stored in order of increasing x .

- c. Polygon Table (PT) :** Polygon Table (PT) that contains at least the following information for each polygon, in addition to ID :

- The coefficient of the plane equation.
 - Shading or colour information for the polygon.
 - An in-out Boolean flag, initialized to false and used during scanline processing.
- In addition, we define a flag for each surface that is set on or off to indicate whether a position along a scanline is inside or outside of the surface. Scanline is processed from left to right.
 - At the leftmost boundary of a surface, the surface flag is turned on, and at the rightmost boundary, it is turned off.

Que 5.6. Write a short note on visible surface detection or hidden surface elimination.

Answer

- Visible surface detection or hidden surface elimination is the procedure that removes any surfaces or lines which are not to be displayed in a 3D scene.
- A process may be developed which draws all parts of all objects in the scene, starting from the object which is farthest from the viewing plane to the nearest one.
- When we view a picture containing non transparent objects and surfaces, then we cannot see those objects that are viewed from behind the object. We must remove these hidden surfaces to get realistic screen image.
- The identification and removal of these surfaces is called the hidden-surface problem.
- Two approaches for visible surface detection are :

- a. **Object space method :** It compares objects and parts of objects to each other within the scene definition to determine which surfaces, as a whole, we should label as visible.
 - b. **Image space method :** Visibility of objects is decided point by point at each pixel position on the projection plane.
6. Scanline coherence method solves the hidden surface problem one scanline at a time from top to bottom.
 7. The simplest scanline algorithm is a one dimensional version of the depth buffer.
 8. In each scanline, depth calculations are made for each overlapping surface to determine which is nearest to the view plane.

Que 5.7. Explain the basic illumination models.

Answer

1. An illumination model is needed to calculate the intensity of light that we should see at a given point on the surface of an object.
2. An illumination model is also known as lighting model or shading model.

Various illumination models :

1. Ambient light :

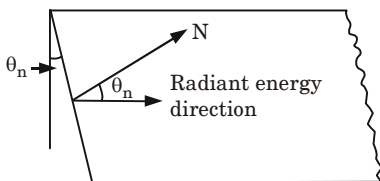
- i. In this model, the intensity of the reflected light for each surface depends on the optical properties of the surface.

- ii. Ambient light has no spatial or directional characteristics.
- iii. The amount of ambient light incident on each object surface is constant for all surfaces and over all directions.
- iv. The optical properties determine how much of the incident energy is to be reflected and how much absorbed.

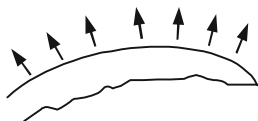
2. Diffuse reflection :

- i. In this model, light coming from all directions is reflected from the walls, floor, ceiling, etc.
- ii. Diffuse reflections are constant over each surface in a scene, independent of the viewing direction.
- iii. The amount of diffused reflected light for each surface in a scene can be set with parameter K_d .
- iv. For the surfaces which absorbs most of the incident light (black surfaces), the value of the diffuse reflection coefficient (K_d) is close to 0.
- v. If a surface is exposed to only ambient light, then the intensity of the diffuse reflection at any point on the surface is given by

$$I_{\text{ambdiffuse}} = K_d I_a$$

3. Phong model :

- i. According to the Phong model, the intensity of specular reflection is proportional to $\cos^n_s \theta$. The value of n , specular reflection parameter, is determined by the type of surface.
- ii. For very shiny surfaces, the value of n_s is large (more than 100) and for dull surfaces the value of n_s is close to 1. For a perfect reflector, the value of n_s is infinite.
- iii. The intensity of specular reflection depends on the angle of incidence, on the properties of the surface, colour of incident light and polarization.
- iv. The specular reflection coefficient $W(\theta)$, for each surface may be used to model the monochromatic specular intensity variation.
- v. We can write the Phong specular reflection model as

$$I_{\text{spec}} = W(\theta) I_l \cos^n \theta \quad \dots(5.7.1)$$

where I_l is intensity of light source, and θ is the viewing angle relative to specular reflection direction R .

- vi. In the case of opaque materials, the specular reflection rejection is almost constant for all incidence angles. Therefore, replacing $W(\theta)$ with a constant specular reflection coefficient K_s . Since V and R are unit vectors in the viewing and specular reflection directions, $\cos \theta = V.R$. We can rewrite the equation (5.7.1) as

$$I_{\text{spec}} = K_s I_l (V.R)^{n_s}$$

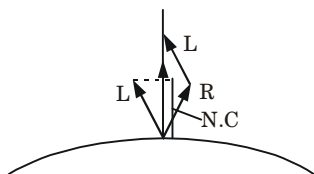


Fig. 5.7.2. Projection of L on to the direction of normal vector N .

Answer

Specular reflection :

1. Specular reflection is the result of total or near total reflection of the light in a concentrated region around the specular reflection angle.
2. When we see an illuminated shiny surface, like polished metal, shiny apple, or a pearl, then we observe a bright spot or a highlighted spot at a certain viewing direction.

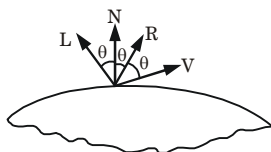


Fig. 5.8.1. (a) Specular reflection angle = Angle of incidence.

3. In the Fig. 5.8.1(a) the specular reflection angle, denoted by θ is the same as the angle of incident light and N is the unit normal surface vector, R is the unit vector in the direction of ideal specular reflection, L is the unit vector directed towards the point light source, and V is the unit vector pointing towards the viewer from the surface position.
4. Angle θ is the viewing angle relative to the specular reflection direction R .
5. In the case of an ideal reflector or perfect mirror, the incident light is reflected only in the specular reflection direction.
6. In this case, we would only see reflected light when vectors V and R coincide, i.e., $\theta = 0$. The objects other than ideal reflectors have specular reflection around vector R .

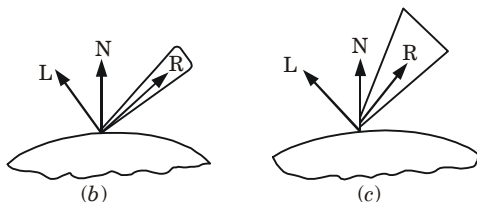


Fig. 5.8.1. (b) Shiny (c) Dull surface.

Various illumination methods : Refer Q. 5.7, Page 5-9C, Unit-5.

Advantages of illumination methods :

1. Fast
2. Acceptable results
3. Hardware support

Disadvantages of illumination methods :

1. Point light source
2. No interaction between objects
3. Adhoc, not based on model of light propagation

Different rendering methods :

1. Constant-intensity shading :

- a. In this method, a single intensity is calculated for each polygon and all points in the surface of polygon are displayed with the same intensity value.
- b. It is fast and simplest rendering method.
- c. Light sources illuminating the object and the viewing position is sufficiently far from the surface of polygon.

2. Gouraud shading :

- It represents a polygon surface by linearly interpolating intensity across the polygon surface.
- Intensity values for each polygon are matched with adjacent polygon along common edges.
- It eliminates the intensity discontinuity that can occur in constant-intensity shading.

3. Phong shading :

- Phong shading is method which interpolates normal vectors and then apply the illumination model to each surface point.
- This method interpolates the surface normal vector, instead of the intensity.
- It is used in 3D system.

4. Fast Phong shading :

- Fast Phong shading approximates the intensity calculations using a Taylor-series expansion and triangular surface patches.
- Surface rendering with Phong shading can be speeded up by using approximations in the illumination model calculations of normal vectors.

Advantages of rendering methods :

- It removes the intensity discontinuity.
- It can be combined with hidden surface algorithm to fill in the visible polygons along each scanline.
- It displays more realistic highlights on a surface.
- It gives more accurate results.

Disadvantages of rendering methods :

- It has a problem with specular reflections.
- It introduces anomalies known as Mach bands.
- It requires more calculations and increases the cost of shading steeply.

Que 5.10. Discuss combined diffuse and specular reflections with multiple light sources.

Answer

- For a single point light source, we can model the combined diffuse and specular reflections from a point on an illuminated surface as

$$\begin{aligned}
 I &= I_{\text{diff}} + I_{\text{spec}} \\
 &= K_a I_a + K_d I_l (N \cdot L) + K_s I_l (N \cdot H)^{n_s}
 \end{aligned}$$

- If we place more than one point source in a scene, we obtain the light reflection at any surface point by summing the contributions from the individual sources :

$$I = K_a I_a + \sum_{i=1}^n I_{li} [K_d (N.L_i) + K_s (N.H_i)^{n_s}]$$

3. To ensure that any pixel intensity does not exceed the maximum allowable value, we can apply some type of normalization procedure.
4. A simple approach is to set a maximum magnitude for each term in the intensity equation.
5. If any calculated term exceeds the maximum, we simply set it to the maximum value.
6. Another way to compensate for intensity overflow is to normalize the individual terms by dividing each by the magnitude of the largest term.
7. A more complicated procedure is first to calculate all pixel intensities for the scene, then the calculated intensities are scaled onto the allowable intensity range.

Explain Phong and Warn model for illumination.

Answer

Phong model : Refer Q. 5.7, Page 5–9C, Unit-5.

Warn model :

1. The Warn model provides a method for simulating studio lighting effects by controlling light intensity in different directions.
2. Light sources are modeled as points on a reflecting surface, using the Phong model for the surface points. Then, the intensity in different directions is controlled by selecting values for the Phong exponent.
3. In addition, light controls, such as “barn doors” and spotlighting, used by studio photographers can be simulated in the Warn model.
4. Flaps are used to control the amount of light emitted by a source in various directions.
5. Two flaps are provided for each of the x , y and z -directions.
6. Spotlights are used to control the amount of light emitted within a cone with apex at a point-source position.

Que 5.12. What do you mean by intensity attenuation ?

Answer

1. Intensity attenuation refers to any reduction in the strength of a signal.
2. It is relatively compared with the attenuation of peak ground acceleration that is used for engineering design.
3. Knowledge of intensity attenuation is useful in calibrating hazard models against historical experience.
4. Intensity attenuation equation is given by :
$$I = 3.31 + 1.28 ML - 1.22 \ln R$$
where
 I = Intensity
 ML = Local Magnitude
 R = Hypocentral distance
5. As radiant energy from a point light source travels through space, its amplitude is attenuated by the factor $1/d^2$, where d is the distance that the light has travelled.
6. This means that a surface close to the light source receives higher incident intensity from the source than a distant surface.

Que 5.13. Write a short note on colour considerations.

Answer

1. Most graphics displays of realistic scenes are in colour. To incorporate colour, we need to write the intensity equation as a function of the colour properties of the light sources and object surfaces.
2. For an RGB description, each colour in a scene is expressed in terms of red, green, and blue components.
3. We then specify the RGB components of light source intensities and surface colours, and the illumination model calculates the RGB components of the reflected light.

- One way to set surface colours is by specifying the reflectivity coefficients as three element vectors.
- The diffuse reflection coefficient vector would then have RGB components (K_{dR}, K_{dG}, K_{dB}) .
- If we want an object to have a blue surface, we select a non-zero value in the range from 0 to 1 for the blue reflectivity component, K_{dB} , while the red and green reflectivity components are set to zero ($K_{dR} = K_{dG} = 0$).
- Any non-zero red or green components in the incident light are absorbed, and only the blue component is reflected. The intensity calculation for this example reduces to the single expression

$$I_B = K_{dB} I_{aB} + \sum_{i=1}^n f_i(d) I_{iB} [K_{dB} (N \cdot L_i) + K_{sB} (N \cdot H_i)^{n_s}]$$

- Surfaces typically are illuminated with white light sources, and in general we can set surface colour so that the reflected light has non-zero values for all three RGB components.
- Calculated intensity levels for each colour component can be used to adjust the corresponding electron gun in an RGB monitor.

Que 5.14. Write short note on transparency and shadows.

Answer

Transparency :

- A transparent surface produces both reflected and transmitted light.
- The relative contribution of the transmitted light depends on the degree of transparency of the surface.
- When a transparent surface is to be modeled, the intensity equations must be modified to include contributions from light passing through the surface.
- Both diffuse and specular transmission can take place at the surfaces of a transparent object.
- Realistic transparency effects are modeled by considering light refraction.

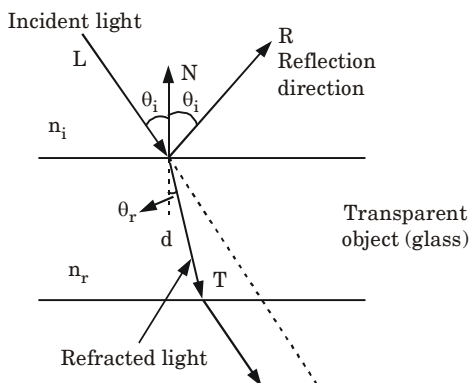


Fig. 5.14.1. Refraction light.

- When light is incident upon a transparent surface, it is reflected and refracted, because the speed of light is different in different mediums so it changes the direction as shown in Fig. 5.14.1.

where,

Refraction direction = T

Reflection direction = R

Angle of refraction = θ_r

Angle of incidence θ_i = angle of reflection

Distance travelled by light in transparent medium = d

Index of refraction of the refracting material = η_r

Index of refraction of the incidents material = η_i

By Snell's law, we have

$$\sin \theta_r = \frac{\eta_i}{\eta_r} \sin \theta_i$$

From Snell's law and Fig. 5.14.1 we can obtain the unit transmission vector T in the refraction direction θ_r as :

$$T = \left(\frac{\eta_i}{\eta_r} \cos \theta_i - \cos \theta_r \right) N - \frac{\eta_i}{\eta_r} L$$

where N is the unit normal vector on the surface and L is the unit vector in the direction of light source.

Shadows :

1. A shadowed object is one which is hidden from the light source.
2. It is possible to use hidden surface algorithms to locate the areas where light sources produce shadows.
3. In order to achieve this we have to repeat the hidden surface calculation using light source as the viewpoint.
4. This calculation divides the surfaces into shadowed and unshadowed groups.



Fig. 5.14.2. Objects modeled with shadow regions.

5. The surfaces that are visible from the light source are not in shadow; those that are not visible from the light source are in shadow.
6. Surfaces which are visible and which are also visible from the light source are shown with both the background illumination and the light-source illumination.

$$R_{\theta_y} \cdot R_{\theta_x} = \begin{bmatrix} \cos \theta_y & \sin \theta_y \sin \theta_x & \sin \theta_y \cos \theta_x & 0 \\ 0 & \cos \theta_x & -\sin \theta_x & 0 \\ -\sin \theta_y & \cos \theta_y \sin \theta_x & \cos \theta_y \cos \theta_x & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

Now, we multiply R_{θ_x} and R_{θ_y} , we get

$$R_{\theta_x} \cdot R_{\theta_y} = \begin{bmatrix} \cos \theta_y & 0 & \sin \theta_y & 0 \\ \sin \theta_x \sin \theta_y & \cos \theta_x & -\sin \theta_x \cos \theta_y & 0 \\ -\cos \theta_x \sin \theta_y & \sin \theta_x & \cos \theta_x \cos \theta_y & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

Therefore, $R_{\theta_x} \cdot R_{\theta_y}$ is not the same matrix, as $R_{\theta_y} \cdot R_{\theta_x}$. Thus, the order of rotation matrix is important.

1. a. Explain raster scan display device and random scan display device.

Ans. Raster scan display :

1. In raster scan displays, screen is scanned in horizontal and vertical direction and the information is stored in a buffer called frame buffer.
2. The frame buffer is used to store intensity values of all screen points.
3. It is suitable for displaying realistic scenes containing either complex shades or colour patterns.
4. Simple black and white display require only one bit per pixel while colour display systems require multiple bits per pixel.
5. Refreshing on raster scan displays is carried out at the rate of 60 to 80 frames per second.

Random scan display :

1. In random scan display, the definition of picture is stored as a collection of line of commands in an area of memory called refresh buffer or display program.
2. Random scan display draw a picture on line at a time and for this reason are also referred to as vector displays.
3. It is basically designed for line drawing and not suitable for complex natural scenes.
4. It refreshes at a rate of 30 to 60 frames per second.

b. Develop and write Bresenham's algorithm of line. Also predict the pixels on the line from (2, 2) to (12, 10) using this algorithm.

Ans. Bresenham's line drawing algorithm :

1. Input the two lines endpoints and store the left endpoint (x_0, y_0) .
2. Load (x_0, y_0) into frame buffer, i.e., plot the first point.
3. Calculate constants Δx , Δy , $2\Delta y$ and $2\Delta y - 2\Delta x$, and obtain the starting value for decision parameter as :

$$p_0 = 2\Delta y - \Delta x$$

4. At each x_k along the line, starting at $k = 0$, perform the following test :

a. If $p_k < 0$, the next point to plot is $(x_k + 1, y_k)$ and

$$p_{k+1} = p_k + 2\Delta y$$

5. Repeat step 4 Δx times.

Numerical :

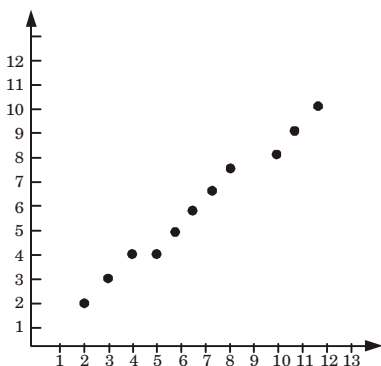

- c. Explain the parallel version of line algorithm by two methods.**

Ans. In the parallel version of line algorithm, pixel positions are calculated along a line path simultaneously by partitioning the computations

among the various processors available. Methods for parallel version of line algorithm are :

1. Bresenham's line algorithm :

- Given n_p processors, a parallel Bresenham's line algorithm can be used by subdividing the line path into n_p partitions and simultaneously generating line segments in each of the sub-intervals.
- For a line with slope $0 < m < 1$ and left endpoint coordinate (x_0, y_0) , the line is partitioned along the positive x -direction.
- The distance between beginning x positions of adjacent partitions is calculated as :

$$\Delta x_p = \frac{\Delta x + n_p - 1}{n_p}$$

where Δx is the width of the line and the value for partition width Δx_p is computed using integer division.

- The starting x coordinate is calculated for the k th partition as :

$$x_k = x_0 + k\Delta x_p$$

- At the k th partition, the starting y coordinate is :

$$y_k = y_0 + \text{round}(k\Delta y_p)$$

- The initial decision parameter for Bresenham's algorithm at the start of the k th sub interval is :

$$p_k = (k\Delta x_p)(2\Delta y) - \text{round}(k\Delta y_p)(2\Delta x) + 2\Delta y - \Delta x$$

2. In raster scan system :

- In raster systems we assign each processor to a particular group of screen pixel.
- For lines with a positive slope greater than 1, we reverse the value of x and y . *i.e.*, we sample at unit y intervals ($\Delta y = 1$) and calculate each succeeding x value as

$$x_{k+1} = x_k + \frac{1}{m}$$

- Lines are to be processed from the left endpoint to the right endpoint. If this processing is reversed, so that the starting endpoint is at the right, then either we have $\Delta x = -1$ and

$$y_{k+1} = y_k + m$$

or (when the slope is greater than 1) we have $\Delta y = -1$ with

$$x_{k+1} = x_k +$$

- Perpendicular distance d from the line in to pixel as shown in Fig. 2 with coordinates (x, y) is obtained with the calculation

$$d = Ax + By + C$$

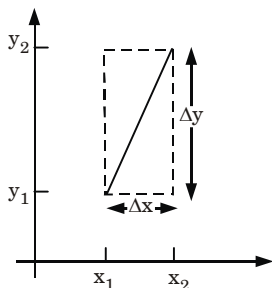

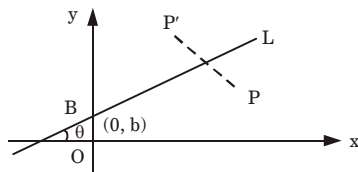

2. a. Establish the reflection transformation matrix about the line $y = mx + b$.

Ans. Let line $L(y = mx + b)$ have a y -intercept $(0, b)$ and an angle θ with respect to x -axis. The steps involved in reflection transformation are as follows :

1. Translate the intersection point B to the origin.
2. Rotate by $-\theta^\circ$ so that the line L aligns with the x -axis.
3. Mirror reflect about the x -axis.
4. Rotate back by θ° .
5. Translate B back to $(0, b)$.

**Fig. 3.** Reflection of point P about line L .

Therefore, we have

$$[M_L = T_V \cdot R_\theta \cdot M_x \cdot R_{-\theta} \cdot T_{-V}]$$

Where $V = bJ$

Ans. The Liang-Barsky algorithm :

1. Read two endpoint of the line say $P_1(x_1, y_1)$ and $P_2(x_2, y_2)$.
2. Read two corners (left-top and right-bottom) of the window, say ($x_{wmin}, y_{wmax}, x_{wmax}, y_{wmin}$).
3. Calculate the values of parameters p_i and q_i for $i = 1, 2, 3, 4$ such that

$$q_1 = x_1 - x_{wmin}$$

$$p_2 = \Delta x$$

$$q_2 = x_{wmax} - x_1$$

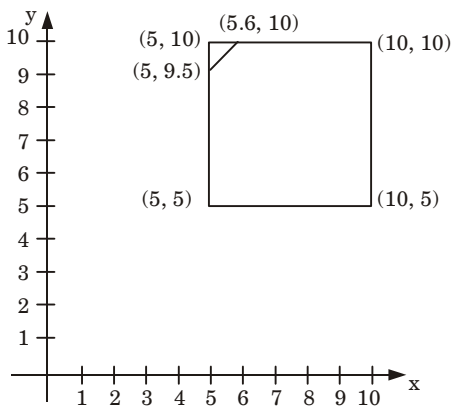

- c. **Write Sutherland-Hodgeman polygon clipping algorithm. Explain the modification given by Weiler and Atherton for concave polygon.**

Ans. **Sutherland-Hodgeman polygon clipping algorithm :**

1. Read coordinates of all vertices of the polygon.
2. Read coordinates of the clipping window.
3. Consider the left edge of the window.

4. Compare the vertices of each edge of the polygon, individually with the clipping plane.
5. Save the resulting intersections and vertices in the new list of vertices according to four possible cases between the edge and the clipping boundary.
6. Repeat the step 4 and 5 for remaining edges of the clipping window. Each time the resultant list of vertices is successively passed, move the process to the next edge of the clipping window.
7. Stop.

Weiler-Atherton polygon clipping :

1. In this algorithm, the vertex processing procedure is modified so that the concave polygons are displayed correctly.
2. This algorithm depends on identifying surfaces as shown in Fig. 5.

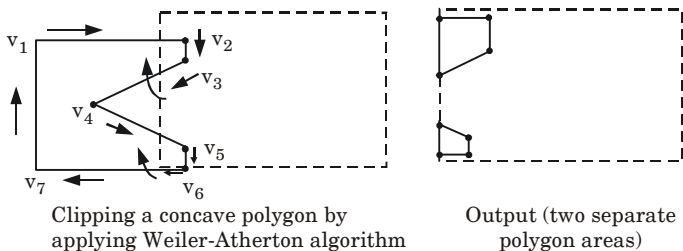

3. There are two directions (clockwise or anticlockwise) that exist to process the polygon vertices.
4. For clockwise processing of polygon vertices, we use the following rules :
 - a. For an outside to inside pair of vertices, follow the polygon boundary.
 - b. For an inside to outside pair of vertices, follow the window boundary in a clockwise direction.

3. a. Derive rotation about x-axis, y-axis and z-axis matrices in 3D. Also, prove that for any rotation matrix $R^{-1}(\theta) = R(-\theta)$.

Ans.

i. Rotation about x-axis (i.e. axis of rotation is x) :

$$x' = x$$

$$y' = r \cos (\alpha + \theta)$$

$$y' = r \cos \alpha \cos \theta - r \sin \alpha \sin \theta \quad \dots(1)$$

Since $r \cos \alpha = y$ and $r \sin \alpha = z$

Put the value in eq. (1) we get,

$$y' = y \cos \theta - z \sin \theta$$

$$z' = r \sin (\alpha + \theta)$$

or,

$$= r \sin \alpha \cos \theta + r \cos \alpha \sin \theta$$

$$= z \cos \theta + y \sin \theta$$

or, $R_{\theta,i} = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & 0 \\ 1 & \cos \theta & -\sin \theta \\ 0 & \sin \theta & \cos \theta \end{bmatrix}$

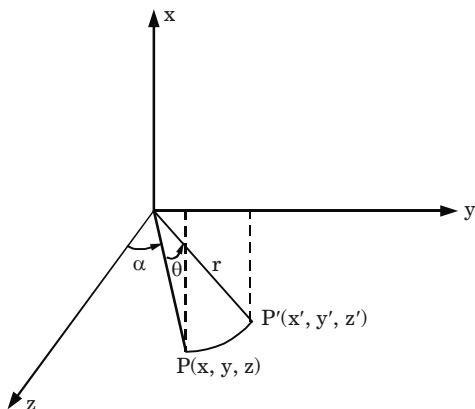


Fig. 6. Rotation when axis of rotation is x-axis.

The points after rotation can be calculated by the following equation :

Equation in the matrix form is given as :

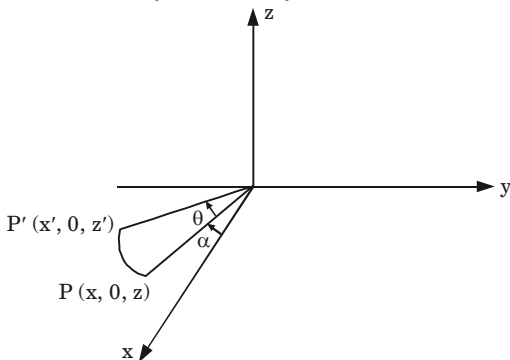

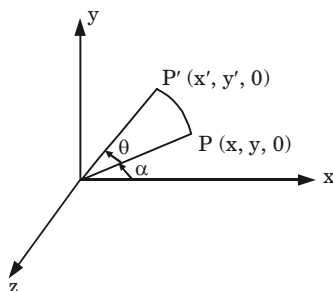

We have,

b. Derive oblique parallel projection and perspective projection matrices.

Ans. Derivation of oblique parallel projection :

1. An oblique projection is obtained by projecting points along parallel lines that are not perpendicular to the projection plane.
2. An oblique projection of a point $P(x, y, z)$ on the $z = 0$ plane is shown in Fig. 9.
3. $P_{ob}(x_p, y_p)$ is oblique projection of the point P and $P_{or}(x, y)$ is the orthographic projection of P on the $z = 0$ plane.
4. Let L be the length of the line joining points $P_{ob}(x_p, y_p)$ and $P_{or}(x, y)$, θ be the angle made by the line L with x -axis.
5. We can express the projection coordinates in terms of x, y, L and θ as

$$x_p = x + L \cos \theta$$

$$y_p = y + L \sin \theta$$

6. Length L depends on the angle α and the Z coordinate of the point to be projected

$$\tan \alpha = \frac{Z}{L} \Rightarrow L = \frac{Z}{\tan \alpha} = ZL_1 \quad \left(\text{where } L_1 = \frac{1}{\tan \alpha} \right)$$

when $Z = 1, L = L_1$

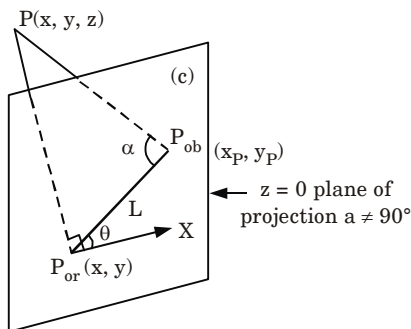

7. Now, we can write the oblique projection as

$$x_p = x + Z(L_1 \cos \theta)$$

$$y_p = x + Z(L_1 \sin \theta)$$

8. Considering $Z_p = 0$, we get

$$\begin{bmatrix} x_p \\ y_p \\ z_p \\ 1 \end{bmatrix} = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & L_1 \cos \theta & 0 \\ 0 & 1 & L_1 \sin \theta & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix} \begin{bmatrix} x \\ y \\ z \\ 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

Derivation of perspective projection matrix :

1. Let us consider the center of projection is at (x_c, y_c, z_c) and the point on object is (x_1, y_1, z_1) , then the parametric equation for the line containing these points can be given as

$$x_2 = x_c + (x_1 - x_c)u$$

$$y_2 = y_c + (y_1 - y_c)u$$

$$z_2 = z_c + (z_1 - z_c)u$$

where u is the parameter

2. For projected point z_2 is 0, therefore, the third equation can be written as

$$0 = z_c + (z_1 - z_c)u$$

$$\therefore u = -\frac{z_c}{(z_1 - z_c)}$$

3. Put this value of u in first two equations, we get

$$x_2 = x_c - \frac{z_c}{(z_1 - z_c)} (x_1 - x_c)$$

$$= \frac{x_c z_1 - x_c z_c - x_1 z_c + x_c z_c}{(z_1 - z_c)}$$

$$\therefore x_2 = \frac{x_c z_1 - x_1 z_c}{(z_1 - z_c)}$$

and

$$y_2 = y_c - \frac{z_c}{(z_1 - z_c)} (y_1 - y_c)$$

$$= \frac{y_c z_1 - y_c z_c - y_1 z_c + y_c z_c}{(z_1 - z_c)}$$

$$y_2 = \frac{y_c z_1 - y_1 z_c}{(z_1 - z_c)}$$

4. So, the homogeneous matrix can be written as

$$\begin{bmatrix} x_2 & y_2 & z_2 & 1 \end{bmatrix} = \begin{bmatrix} x_1 & y_1 & z_1 & 1 \end{bmatrix} \begin{bmatrix} -z_c & 0 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & -z_c & 0 & 0 \\ x_c & y_c & 0 & 1 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & -z_c \end{bmatrix}$$

c. Establish and write Cohen and Sutherland 3D line clipping algorithm.

Ans. Cohen-Sutherland line clipping algorithm :

1. In this algorithm, a rectangular window is considered whose coordinates are $(xw_{\min}, yw_{\min}, xw_{\max}, yw_{\max})$ as shown in Fig. 10.

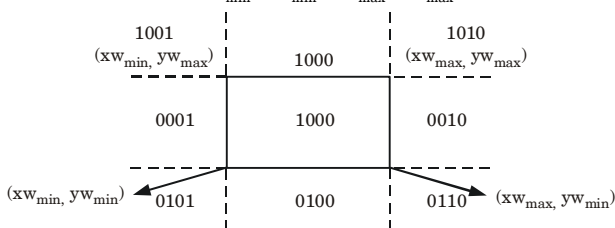

2. Every line end point is assigned a 4-digit binary code (region code) that identifies the location of the point corresponding to the boundaries of the clipping window.

3. The procedure for calculating the end point $p(x, y)$ code is as follow :

a. For bit 1

If $(y - yw_{\max}) < 0$ then

code = 0;

else

code = 1;

b. For bit 2

If $(yw_{\min} - y) < 0$ then

code = 0;

else

code = 1;

c. For bit 3

if $(x - xw_{\max}) < 0$ then

code = 0;

else

code = 1;

d. For bit 4

if $(xw_{\min} - x) < 0$ then

code = 0;

else

code = 1;

4. If the region code of both the end points of a line segment is 0000, the line is completely visible as it completely lies within the window.
5. If the region code of both the end points of the line segment is not 0000 then we calculate AND operation of both end points A and B.
6. If the result of AND operation is 0000, the line is partially visible and then find the point of intersection.

4. a. Write at least four properties of Bezier curves. Calculate and also, roughly trace the Bezier curve for three control points (1,1), (2,2) and (3,1).

Ans. Properties of Bezier curves :

1. Bezier curve always passes through the first and last control points *i.e.*, curve has same end points as the guiding polygon.
2. The degree of the polynomial defining the curve segment is one less than the number of defining polygon point. Therefore, for four control points, the degree of the polynomial is three, *i.e.*, cubic polynomial.
3. The direction of the tangent vector at the end points is the same as that of the vector determined by first and last segments.
4. The curve lies entirely within the convex hull formed by four control points.

Numerical :

Control functions for point (1, 1), (2, 2), (3, 1) are :

$$B_{0,2}(u) = {}^2C_0 u^0 (1-u)^{2-0} \\ = (1-u)^2$$

$$B_{1,2}(u) = {}^2C_1 u^1 (1-u)^{2-1} \\ = 2u(1-u)$$

$$B_{2,2}(u) = {}^2C_2 u^2 (1-u)^{2-2} \\ = u^2$$

Bezier curve, $C(u) = p_0 B_{0,2}(u) + p_1 B_{1,2}(u) + p_2 B_{2,2}(u)$

Dissolving curve in the x, y coordinate :

where,

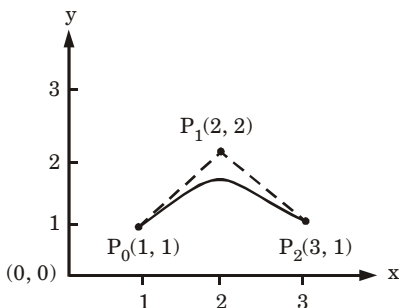

b. Explain specular reflection and Phong model.

Ans. Specular reflection :

1. Specular reflection is the result of total or near total reflection of the light in a concentrated region around the specular reflection angle.
2. When we see an illuminated shiny surface, like polished metal, shiny apple, or a pearl, then we observe a bright spot or a highlighted spot at a certain viewing direction.

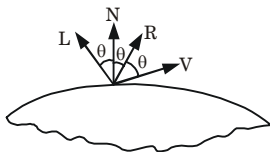


Fig. 12. (a) Specular reflection angle = Angle of incidence.

3. In the Fig. 12(a) the specular reflection angle, denoted by θ is the same as the angle of incident light and N is the unit normal surface vector, R is the unit vector in the direction of ideal specular reflection, L is the unit vector directed towards the point light source, and V is the unit vector pointing towards the viewer from the surface position.

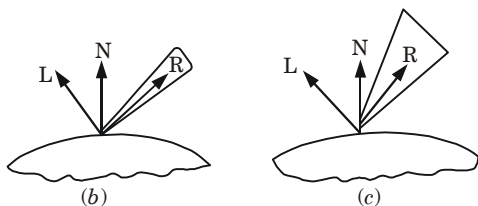


Fig. 12. (b) Shiny (c) Dull surface.

4. Angle θ is the viewing angle relative to the specular reflection direction R .
5. In the case of an ideal reflector or perfect mirror, the incident light is reflected only in the specular reflection direction.
6. In this case, we would only see reflected light when vectors V and R coincide, i.e., $\theta = 0$. The objects other than ideal reflectors have specular reflection around vector R .

Phong model :

1. According to the Phong model, the intensity of specular reflection is proportional to $\cos^{n_s} \theta$. The value of n , specular reflection parameter, is determined by the type of surface.
2. For very shiny surfaces, the value of n_s is large (more than 100) and for dull surfaces the value of n_s is close to 1. For a perfect reflector, the value of n_s is infinite.
3. The intensity of specular reflection depends on the angle of incidence, on the properties of the surface, colour of incident light and polarization.
4. The specular reflection coefficient $W(\theta)$, for each surface may be used to model the monochromatic specular intensity variation.
5. We can write the Phong specular reflection model as

$$I_{\text{spec}} = W(\theta) I_l \cos^{n_s} \theta \quad \dots(1)$$

where I_l is intensity of light source, and θ is the viewing angle relative to specular reflection direction R .

6. In the case of opaque materials, the specular reflection rejection is almost constant for all incidence angles. Therefore, replacing $W(\theta)$ with a constant specular reflection coefficient K_s . Since V and R are unit vectors in the viewing and specular reflection directions, $\cos \theta = V.R$. We can rewrite the equation (1) as

$$I_{\text{spec}} = K_s I_l (V.R)^{n_s}$$

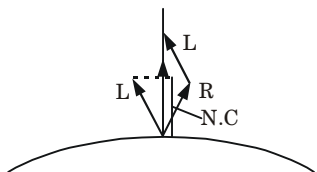


Fig. 13. Projection of L on to the direction of normal vector N .

c. Write back-face detection algorithm of hidden lines.**Ans. Back-face detection algorithm :**

- Object surfaces that are orientated away from the viewer are called back-faces.
- Algorithm used to detect the back-faces are known as back-face detection algorithm.
- If any three points (x_1, y_1, z_1) , (x_2, y_2, z_2) and (x_3, y_3, z_3) on any plane surface are known, the unknown parameters A , B , C and D of the plane surface equation $Ax + By + Cz + D = 0$ can be found as follows :

- All the three points (x_1, y_1, z_1) , (x_2, y_2, z_2) and (x_3, y_3, z_3) should satisfy the equation $Ax + By + Cz + D = 0$ as it lies on the surface.

Hence,

$$Ax_1 + By_1 + Cz_1 + D = 0$$

$$Ax_2 + By_2 + Cz_2 + D = 0$$

$$Ax_3 + By_3 + Cz_3 + D = 0$$

- Also, any arbitrary point (x, y, z) lying on the surface should satisfy the equation of the desired surface

$$Ax + By + Cz + D = 0$$

- A unique solution of equations for A , B , C and D can only be obtained if

$$\text{or } \begin{vmatrix} x_1 & y_1 & z_1 & 1 \\ x_2 & y_2 & z_2 & 1 \\ x_3 & y_3 & z_3 & 1 \\ x & y & z & 1 \end{vmatrix} = 0 \quad (\text{By Cramer's rule})$$

$$\text{or } \begin{vmatrix} x-x_1 & y-y_1 & z-z_1 & 0 \\ x_1-x_2 & y_1-y_2 & z_1-z_2 & 0 \\ x_2-x_3 & y_2-y_3 & z_2-z_3 & 0 \\ x & y & z & 1 \end{vmatrix} = 0$$

- vi. Using right hand thumb rule, the three points are considered in counterclockwise manner for calculating the unit normal directing outside the surface. Thus, the surface normal and equation of the plane are calculated.
- vii. Now, if any point $(x, y, \text{ or } z)$ lies inside the polygon surface, $Ax + By + Cz + D < 0$, and if it is along the line of sight to the surface, the polygon must be back face.

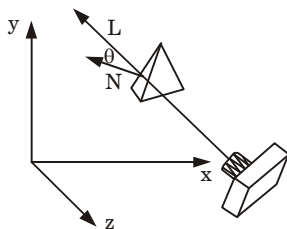


Fig. 14. (a) Geometry of camera vision.

- viii. If L is the line of sight or viewing vector (light vector in case of shadowing), perpendicular to the viewing plane originating from the eye or camera, N is the unit surface normal vector as shown in Fig. 14(a) and Fig. 14(b) the polygon is the back face if $L \cdot N > 0$

- ix. On aligning the light vector to that of the view vector which is normally along negative z -axis for right-handed viewing system, that is

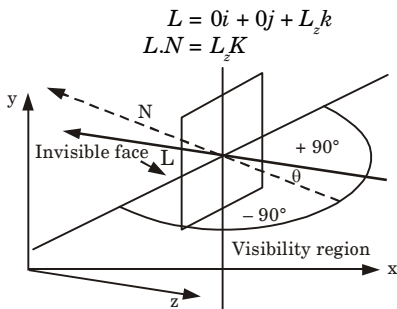


Fig. 14. (b) Invisible and visible vision.

Ans. Frame buffer :

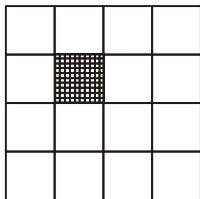
1. Frame buffer is a special area of memory in raster displays which is dedicated to graphics.
2. It holds the set of intensity values for all the screen points.
3. The stored intensity values are retrieved from frame buffer and displayed on the screen one row (scan line) at the time.
4. Each screen point is referred to as a pixel or pel (shortened forms of picture element).
5. Each pixel on the screen can be specified by its row and column number. Thus, by specifying row and column number we can specify the pixel position on the screen.

Video basics :

1. Video, or moving image in general, is created from a sequence of small images called frames.
2. By recording and then playing back frames in quick succession, an illusion of movement is created.
3. Video can be edited by removing some frames and combining sequences of frames, called clips, together in a timeline.

Pixel :

1. Pixel is the smallest part of the screen.
2. Each pixel has its own intensity, name or address by which we can control it.

Aspect ratio :

1. An aspect ratio is an attribute that describes the relationship between the width and height of an image.
2. Aspect ratio is expressed by the symbolic notation *i.e.*, $x : y$.

Resolution :

1. Resolution is defined as the number of pixels on the horizontal axis and vertical axis.

2. The sharpness of the image on the display depends on the resolution and size of the monitor.

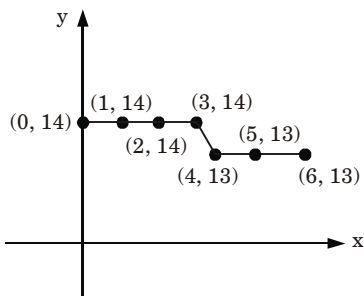

c. Explain the parallel version of line algorithm by two methods.

Ans. In the parallel version of line algorithm, pixel positions are calculated along a line path simultaneously by partitioning the computations among the various processors available. Methods for parallel version of line algorithm are :

1. Bresenham's line algorithm :

- Given n_p processors, a parallel Bresenham's line algorithm can be used by subdividing the line path into n_p partitions and simultaneously generating line segments in each of the sub-intervals.
- For a line with slope $0 < m < 1$ and left endpoint coordinate (x_0, y_0) , the line is partitioned along the positive x -direction.
- The distance between beginning x positions of adjacent partitions is calculated as :

$$\Delta x_p = \frac{\Delta x + n_p - 1}{n_p}$$

where Δx is the width of the line and the value for partition width Δx_p is computed using integer division.

- The starting x coordinate is calculated for the k th partition as :

$$x_k = x_0 + k\Delta x_p$$

- At the k th partition, the starting y coordinate is :

$$y_k = y_0 + \text{round}(k\Delta y_p)$$

- The initial decision parameter for Bresenham's algorithm at the start of the k th sub interval is :

$$p_k = (k\Delta x_p)(2\Delta y) - \text{round}(k\Delta y_p)(2\Delta x) + 2\Delta y - \Delta x$$

2. In raster scan system :

- In raster systems we assign each processor to a particular group of screen pixel.
- For lines with a positive slope greater than 1, we reverse the value of x and y . i.e., we sample at unit y intervals ($\Delta y = 1$) and calculate each succeeding x value as

$$x_{k+1} = x_k + \frac{1}{m}$$

- Lines are to be processed from the left endpoint to the right endpoint. If this processing is reversed, so that the starting endpoint is at the right, then either we have $\Delta x = -1$ and

$$y_{k+1} = y_k + m$$

or (when the slope is greater than 1) we have $\Delta y = -1$ with

$$x_{k+1} = x_k +$$

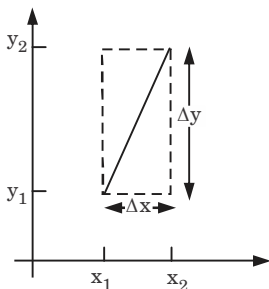

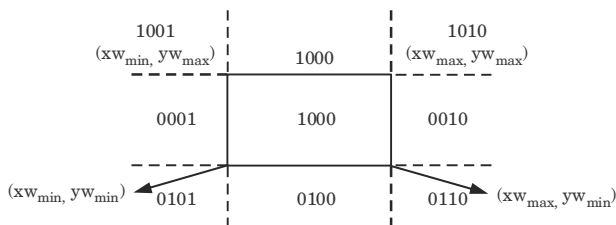

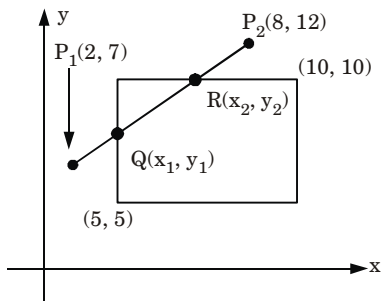

2. Every line end point is assigned a 4-digit binary code (region code) that identifies the location of the point corresponding to the boundaries of the clipping window.
3. The procedure for calculating the end point $p(x, y)$ code is as follow :
 - a. **For bit 1**

 code = 0;
 else
 code = 1;
 - b. **For bit 2**
 If $(yw_{\min} - y) < 0$ then

4. If the region code of both the end points of a line segment is 0000, the line is completely visible as it completely lies within the window.

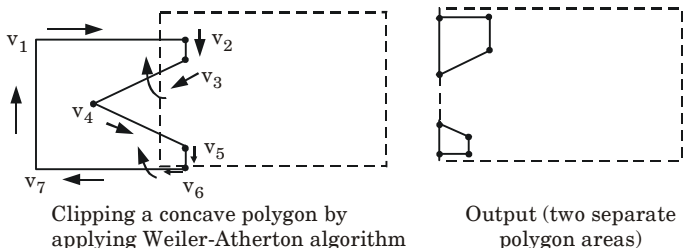

Ans. Sutherland-Hodgeman polygon clipping algorithm :

1. Read coordinates of all vertices of the polygon.
2. Read coordinates of the clipping window.
3. Consider the left edge of the window.
4. Compare the vertices of each edge of the polygon, individually with the clipping plane.
5. Save the resulting intersections and vertices in the new list of vertices according to four possible cases between the edge and the clipping boundary.
6. Repeat the step 4 and 5 for remaining edges of the clipping window. Each time the resultant list of vertices is successively passed, move the process to the next edge of the clipping window.
7. Stop.

Weiler-Atherton polygon clipping :

1. In this algorithm, the vertex processing procedure is modified so that the concave polygons are displayed correctly.
2. This algorithm depends on identifying surfaces as shown in Fig. 6.

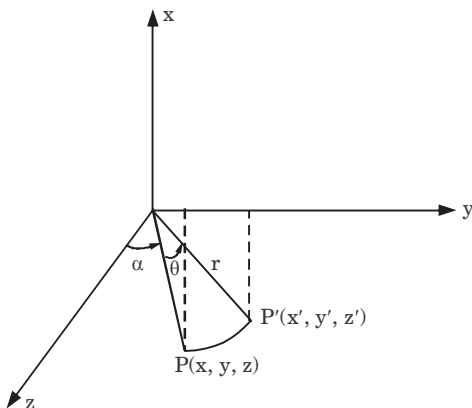

3. There are two directions (clockwise or anticlockwise) that exist to process the polygon vertices.
4. For clockwise processing of polygon vertices, we use the following rules :
 - a. For an outside to inside pair of vertices, follow the polygon boundary.
 - b. For an inside to outside pair of vertices, follow the window boundary in a clockwise direction.

Ans.

- i. **Rotation about x-axis (i.e. axis of rotation is x) :**

$$\begin{aligned}
 x' &= x \\
 y' &= r \cos(\alpha + \theta) \\
 y' &= r \cos \alpha \cos \theta - r \sin \alpha \sin \theta \quad \dots(1)
 \end{aligned}$$

Since $r \cos \alpha = y$ and $r \sin \alpha = z$

Put the value in eq. (1) we get,

$$\begin{aligned}
 y' &= y \cos \theta - z \sin \theta \\
 z' &= r \sin(\alpha + \theta) \\
 &= r \sin \alpha \cos \theta + r \cos \alpha \sin \theta \\
 &= z \cos \theta + y \sin \theta
 \end{aligned}$$

or,

$$R_{\theta,i} = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & \cos \theta & \sin \theta \\ 0 & -\sin \theta & \cos \theta \end{bmatrix}$$

The points after rotation can be calculated by the following equation :

$$p'(x', y', z') = R_{\theta,i} P(x, y, z)$$

Equation in the matrix form is given as :

$$\begin{bmatrix} x' \\ y' \\ z' \\ 1 \end{bmatrix} = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & \cos \theta & \sin \theta & 0 \\ 0 & -\sin \theta & \cos \theta & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix} \begin{bmatrix} x \\ y \\ z \\ 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

ii. Rotation about y-axis (i.e., y-axis is axis of rotation) :

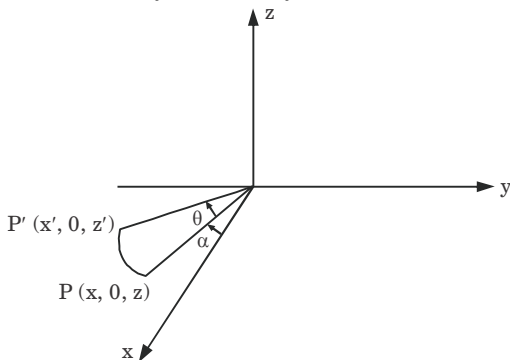

 x' &= x \cos \theta + z \sin \theta \\
 y' &= y \\
 z' &= -x \sin \theta + z \cos \theta
 \end{aligned}$$

or,

$$R_{\theta,i} = \begin{bmatrix} \cos \theta & 0 & \sin \theta \\ 0 & 1 & 0 \\ -\sin \theta & 0 & \cos \theta \end{bmatrix}$$

Equation in the matrix form is given as :

iii. Rotation about the z-axis (i.e., z-axis is axis of rotation)

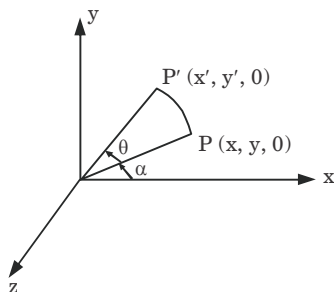

or,

$$R_{\theta, k} = \begin{bmatrix} \cos \theta & -\sin \theta & 0 \\ \sin \theta & \cos \theta & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

Equation in the matrix form is given as :

$$\begin{bmatrix} x' \\ y' \\ z' \\ 1 \end{bmatrix} = \begin{bmatrix} \cos \theta & -\sin \theta & 0 & 0 \\ \sin \theta & \cos \theta & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix} \begin{bmatrix} x \\ y \\ z \\ 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

Numerical :

Let

$$R(\theta) = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & \cos \theta & -\sin \theta & 0 \\ 0 & \sin \theta & \cos \theta & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

Put $\theta = (-\theta)$, we get

$$R(-\theta) = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & \cos(-\theta) & -\sin(-\theta) & 0 \\ 0 & \sin(-\theta) & \cos(-\theta) & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

Since $\cos(-\theta) = \cos(\theta)$, $\sin(-\theta) = -\sin \theta$, we have

$$R(-\theta) = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & \cos \theta & \sin \theta & 0 \\ 0 & -\sin \theta & \cos \theta & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

Now,

$$\begin{aligned} R(-\theta) * R(\theta) &= \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & \cos \theta & \sin \theta & 0 \\ 0 & -\sin \theta & \cos \theta & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix} * \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & \cos \theta & -\sin \theta & 0 \\ 0 & \sin \theta & \cos \theta & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix} \\ &= \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 1 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix} = I \end{aligned}$$

We have,

$$R(-\theta) \cdot R(\theta) = I$$

Multiply $R^{-1}(\theta)$ both sides,

$$R(-\theta) \cdot R(\theta) \cdot R^{-1}(\theta) = I \cdot R^{-1}(\theta)$$

$$R(-\theta) = R^{-1}(\theta)$$

Hence proved.

b. Derive oblique parallel projection and perspective projection matrices.

Ans. Derivation of oblique parallel projection :

1. An oblique projection is obtained by projecting points along parallel lines that are not perpendicular to the projection plane.
2. An oblique projection of a point $P(x, y, z)$ on the $z = 0$ plane is shown in Fig. 10.
3. $P_{ob}(x_p, y_p)$ is oblique projection of the point P and $P_{or}(x, y)$ is the orthographic projection of P on the $z = 0$ plane.

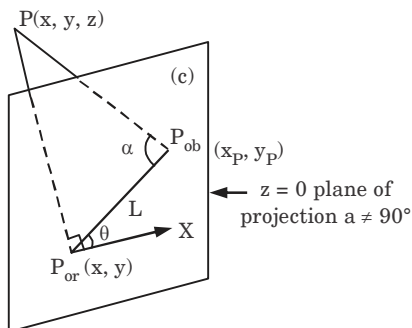


Fig. 10.

- Let L be the length of the line joining points $P_{ob}(x_p, y_p)$ and $P_{or}(x, y)$, θ be the angle made by the line L with x -axis.
- We can express the projection coordinates in terms of x, y, L and θ as

$$\begin{aligned}x_p &= x + L \cos \theta \\y_p &= y + L \sin \theta\end{aligned}$$

- Length L depends on the angle α and the Z coordinate of the point to be projected

$$\tan \alpha = \frac{Z}{L} \Rightarrow L = \frac{Z}{\tan \alpha} = ZL_1 \quad \left(\text{where } L_1 = \frac{1}{\tan \alpha} \right)$$

when $Z = 1, L = L_1$

- Now, we can write the oblique projection as

$$\begin{aligned}x_p &= x + Z(L_1 \cos \theta) \\y_p &= x + Z(L_1 \sin \theta)\end{aligned}$$

- Considering $Z_p = 0$, we get

$$\begin{bmatrix} x_p \\ y_p \\ z_p \\ 1 \end{bmatrix} = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & L_1 \cos \theta & 0 \\ 0 & 1 & L_1 \sin \theta & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix} \begin{bmatrix} x \\ y \\ z \\ 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

Derivation of perspective projection matrix :

- Let us consider the center of projection is at (x_c, y_c, z_c) and the point on object is (x_1, y_1, z_1) , then the parametric equation for the line containing these points can be given as

$$\begin{aligned}x_2 &= x_c + (x_1 - x_c)u \\y_2 &= y_c + (y_1 - y_c)u \\z_2 &= z_c + (z_1 - z_c)u\end{aligned}$$

where u is the parameter

- For projected point z_2 is 0, therefore, the third equation can be written as

$$0 = z_c + (z_1 - z_c)u$$

$$\therefore u = -\frac{z_c}{(z_1 - z_c)}$$

- Put this value of u in first two equations, we get

$$\begin{aligned}x_2 &= x_c - \frac{z_c}{(z_1 - z_c)} (x_1 - x_c) \\&= \frac{x_c z_1 - x_c z_c - x_1 z_c + x_c z_c}{(z_1 - z_c)}\end{aligned}$$

$$\therefore x_2 = \frac{x_c z_1 - x_1 z_c}{(z_1 - z_c)}$$

$$\begin{aligned} \text{and } y_2 &= y_c - \frac{z_c}{(z_1 - z_c)} (y_1 - y_c) \\ &= \frac{y_c z_1 - y_c z_c - y_1 z_c + y_c z_c}{(z_1 - z_c)} \\ y_2 &= \frac{y_c z_1 - y_1 z_c}{(z_1 - z_c)} \end{aligned}$$

4. So, the homogeneous matrix can be written as

$$[x_2 \ y_2 \ z_2 \ 1] = [x_1 \ y_1 \ z_1 \ 1] \begin{bmatrix} -z_c & 0 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & -z_c & 0 & 0 \\ x_c & y_c & 0 & 1 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & -z_c \end{bmatrix}$$

c. Establish and write Cyrus-Beck 3D line clipping algorithm.

Ans.

1. Cyrus-Beck algorithm is applicable to an arbitrary convex region.
2. This algorithm uses a parametric equation of line segment to find the intersection points of a line with the clipping edges.
3. The parametric equation of a line segment from P_1 to P_2 is

$$P(t) = P_1 + (P_2 - P_1)t \quad ; 0 \leq t \leq 1$$

where t is a parameter, $t = 0$ at P_1 and $t = 1$ at P_2 .

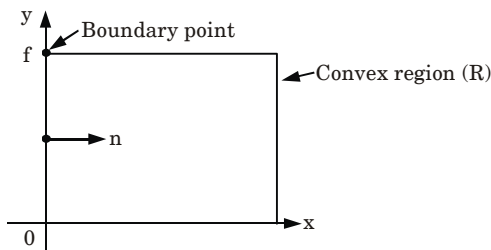


Fig. 11. Convex region, boundary point and inner normal.

4. Consider a convex clipping region R , f is a boundary point of the convex region R and n is an inner normal for one of its boundaries, as shown in Fig. 11.

5. We evaluate the dot product $n \cdot [P(t) - f]$, and check the following condition as :

- a. If dot product is negative, i.e.,

$$n \cdot [P(t) - f] < 0$$

Then the vector $P(t) - f$ is pointed away from the interior of R .

- b. If dot product is zero, *i.e.*,

$$n \cdot [P(t) - f] = 0$$

Then $P(t) - f$ is pointed parallel to the plane containing f and perpendicular to the normal.

- c. If dot product is positive, *i.e.*,

$$n \cdot [P(t) - f] > 0$$

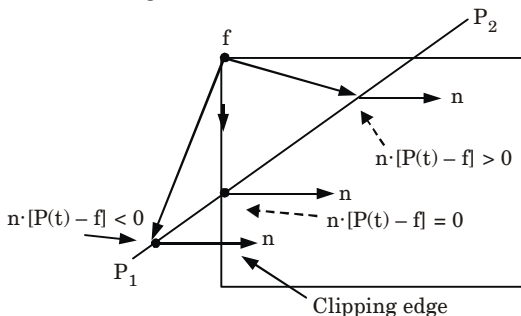


Fig. 12. Dot product for three inside, outside and on the boundary of the clipping region.

Then the vector $P(t) - f$ is pointed towards the interior of R , as shown in Fig. 12.

Cyrus-Beck line clipping algorithm :

1. Read two endpoints of the line, P_1 and P_2 .
2. Read vertex coordinates of the clipping window.
3. Calculate $D = P_2 - P_1$.
4. Assign boundary point (f) with particular edge.
5. Find inner normal vector for corresponding edge.
6. Calculate $D \cdot n$ and $W = P_1 - f$.
7. If $D \cdot n > 0$.

$$t_L = - \frac{W \cdot n}{D \cdot n}$$

else

$$t_U = - \frac{W \cdot n}{D \cdot n}$$

end if

8. Repeat steps 4 to 7 for each edge of the clipping window.
9. Find maximum lower limit and minimum upper limit.
10. If maximum lower limit and minimum upper limit do not satisfy condition $0 \leq t \leq 1$ then ignore the line.
11. Calculate the intersection points by substituting values of maximum lower limit and minimum upper limit in the parametric equation of the line P_1P_2 .
12. Draw the line segment $P(t_L)$ to $P(t_U)$.
13. Stop.

4. Attempt any **two** parts of the following : (6 × 2 = 12)
a. Write at least four properties of Bezier curves. Calculate and roughly trace the Bezier curve for three control points (1, 1), (2, 2) and (3, 1).

Ans. Properties of Bezier curves :

1. Bezier curve always passes through the first and last control points *i.e.*, curve has same end points as the guiding polygon.
2. The degree of the polynomial defining the curve segment is one less than the number of defining polygon point. Therefore, for four control points, the degree of the polynomial is three, *i.e.*, cubic polynomial.
3. The direction of the tangent vector at the end points is the same as that of the vector determined by first and last segments.
4. The curve lies entirely within the convex hull formed by four control points.

Numerical :

Control functions for point (1, 1), (2, 2), (3, 1) are :

$$B_{0,2}(u) = {}^2C_0 u^0 (1-u)^{2-0} \\ = (1-u)^2$$

$$B_{1,2}(u) = {}^2C_1 u^1 (1-u)^{2-1} \\ = 2u(1-u)$$

$$B_{2,2}(u) = {}^2C_2 u^2 (1-u)^{2-2} \\ = u^2$$

Bezier curve, $C(u) = p_0 B_{0,2}(u) + p_1 B_{1,2}(u) + p_2 B_{2,2}(u)$

Dissolving curve in the x, y coordinate :

$$x(u) = x_0 B_{0,2}(u) + x_1 B_{1,2}(u) + x_2 B_{2,2}(u)$$

$$y(u) = y_0 B_{0,2}(u) + y_1 B_{1,2}(u) + y_2 B_{2,2}(u)$$

where,

$$x_0 = 1 \qquad y_1 = 1$$

$$x_1 = 2 \qquad y_2 = 2$$

$$x_2 = 3 \qquad y_3 = 1$$

$$x(u) = 1(1-u)^2 + 2[2u(1-u)] + 3u^2 \\ = 1 + u^2 - 2u + 4u - 4u^2 + 3u^2 \\ = 1 + 2u$$

$$y(u) = 1(1-u)^2 + 2 \times [2u(1-u)] + 1u^2 \\ = 1 + u^2 - 2u + 4u - 4u^2 + u^2 \\ = 1 + 2u - 2u^2$$

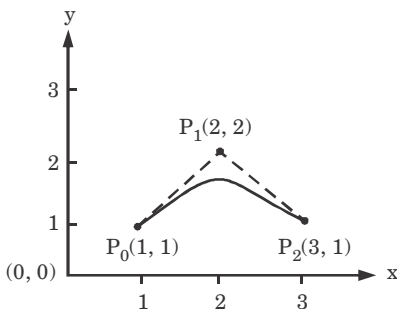

b. Explain specular reflection and Phong model.

Ans. Specular reflection :

1. Specular reflection is the result of total or near total reflection of the light in a concentrated region around the specular reflection angle.
2. When we see an illuminated shiny surface, like polished metal, shiny apple, or a pearl, then we observe a bright spot or a highlighted spot at a certain viewing direction.

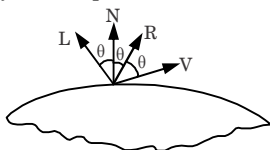


Fig. 14. (a) Specular reflection angle = Angle of incidence.

3. In the Fig. 14(a) the specular reflection angle, denoted by θ is the same as the angle of incident light and N is the unit normal surface vector, R is the unit vector in the direction of ideal specular reflection, L is the unit vector directed towards the point light source, and V is the unit vector pointing towards the viewer from the surface position.
4. Angle θ is the viewing angle relative to the specular reflection direction R .
5. In the case of an ideal reflector or perfect mirror, the incident light is reflected only in the specular reflection direction.

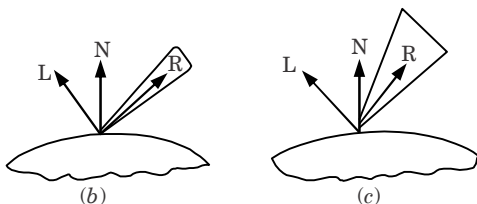


Fig. 14. (b) Shiny (c) Dull surface.

6. In this case, we would only see reflected light when vectors V and R coincide, i.e., $\theta = 0$. The objects other than ideal reflectors have specular reflection around vector R .

Phong model :

1. According to the Phong model, the intensity of specular reflection is proportional to $\cos^{n_s} \theta$. The value of n_s , specular reflection parameter, is determined by the type of surface.
2. For very shiny surfaces, the value of n_s is large (more than 100) and for dull surfaces the value of n_s is close to 1. For a perfect reflector, the value of n_s is infinite.
3. The intensity of specular reflection depends on the angle of incidence, on the properties of the surface, colour of incident light and polarization.
4. The specular reflection coefficient $W(\theta)$, for each surface may be used to model the monochromatic specular intensity variation.
5. We can write the Phong specular reflection model as

$$I_{\text{spec}} = W(\theta) I_l \cos^{n_s} \theta \quad \dots(1)$$

where I_l is intensity of light source, and θ is the viewing angle relative to specular reflection direction R .

6. In the case of opaque materials, the specular reflection rejection is almost constant for all incidence angles. Therefore, replacing $W(\theta)$ with a constant specular reflection coefficient K_s . Since V and R are unit vectors in the viewing and specular reflection directions, $\cos \theta = V.R$. We can rewrite the equation (1) as

$$I_{\text{spec}} = K_s I_l (V.R)^{n_s}$$

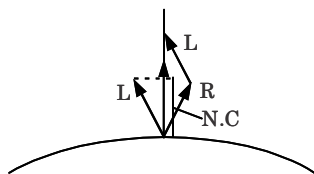


Fig. 15. Projection of L on to the direction of normal vector N .

c. Write Depth-buffer method algorithm of hidden lines.

Ans. Depth-buffer method or z-buffer algorithm :

1. Depth-buffer method is a simple extension of the frame buffer idea. A frame is used to store the intensity of each pixel in image space.
2. The depth-buffer method is used to store the z -coordinates or depth or every visible pixel in image space.
3. In this algorithm a buffer of the same size as the frame buffer, is set up which holds depth information.

4. Each elements of the depth buffer corresponds to a pixel in the frame buffer and initially holds the maximum depth in the scene.
5. As each polygon is scan-converted, the depth at each pixel is calculated and compared with the corresponding depth in the depth buffer.
6. If the depth is less than that stored in the depth buffer (*i.e.*, nearer the viewer) then that pixel is set in the frame buffer with the polygon colour at that point and the depth buffer is set to the polygon depth.
7. If the polygon depth is greater (*i.e.*, further away from the viewer) than the depth buffer at that point is not stored in the frame buffer.
8. The depth-buffer algorithm can be stated as :

Step 1 : Initialize frame buffer to background colour.

Step 2 : Initialize depth-buffer to minimum z value.

Step 3 : Scan-convert each polygon in arbitrary order.

Step 4 : For each (x, y) pixel, calculated depth ' z ' at that pixel ($z(x, y)$).

Step 5 : Compare calculated new depth $z(x, y)$ with value previously stored in depth-buffer at the location $z(x, y)$.

Step 6 : If $z(x, y) > z(x, y)$, then write the new depth value to depth-buffer and updated frame buffer.

Step 7 : Otherwise, no action is taken.

Ans. Merits of LCD :

- i. It produces very bright images due to high peak intensity.
- ii. It produce lower electric, magnetic and electromagnetic fields than CRTs.
- iii. It has no geometric distortion at the native resolution. Minor distortion can occur for other resolutions.
- iv. It consumes less electricity than a CRT and produce little heat.

Demerits of LCD :

- i. The aspect ratio and resolution are fixed.
- ii. It is not good at producing black and very dark grays levels.
- iii. It has lower contrast than CRTs due to a poor black-level.
- iv. Images are satisfactory, but not accurate as colour saturation is reduced at low intensity levels due to a poor black-level.

Resolution of screen = 195 * 247 pixels (or dots)

- i. Memory location of P1 = Base address + (195*200 + 25) = 39125
- ii. Memory location of P2 = Base address + (195*75 + 45) = 14770

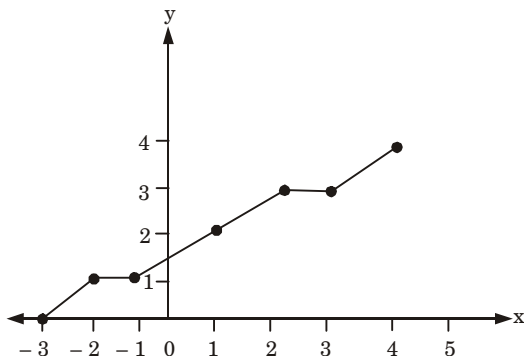

Ans. **Bresenham's line drawing algorithm :**

1. Input the two lines endpoints and store the left endpoint (x_0, y_0) .
2. Load (x_0, y_0) into frame buffer, *i.e.*, plot the first point.
3. Calculate constants Δx , Δy , $2\Delta y$ and $2\Delta y - 2\Delta x$, and obtain the starting value for decision parameter as :

$$p_0 = 2\Delta y - \Delta x$$

4. At each x_k along the line, starting at $k = 0$, perform the following test :

- a. If $p_k < 0$, the next point to plot is $(x_k + 1, y_k)$ and

$$p_{k+1} = p_k + 2\Delta y$$
- b. If $p_k > 0$, the next point to plot is $(x_k + 1, y_k + 1)$ and

$$p_{k+1} = p_k + 2\Delta y - 2\Delta x$$
5. Repeat step 4 Δx times.

b. Explain the Sutherland-Cohen line clipping algorithm.

Ans. Cohen and Sutherland algorithm :

1. In this algorithm, a rectangular window is considered whose coordinates are $(xw_{\min}, yw_{\min}, xw_{\max}, yw_{\max})$ as shown in Fig. 2.

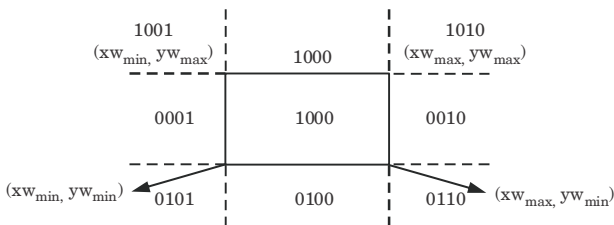

2. Every line end point is assigned a 4-digit binary code (region code) that identifies the location of the point corresponding to the boundaries of the clipping window.
3. The procedure for calculating the end point $p(x, y)$ code is as follow :
 - a. For bit 1**
 If $(y - yw_{\max}) < 0$ then
 code = 0;
 else
 code = 1;
 - b. For bit 2**
 If $(yw_{\min} - y) < 0$ then
 code = 0;
 else
 code = 1;
 - c. For bit 3**
 if $(x - xw_{\max}) < 0$ then
 code = 0;
 else
 code = 1;
 - d. For bit 4**
 if $(xw_{\min} - x) < 0$ then
 code = 0;
 else
 code = 1;
4. If the region code of both the end points of a line segment is 0000, the line is completely visible as it completely lies within the window.

5. If the region code of both the end points of the line segment is not 0000 then we calculate AND operation of both end points A and B .
6. If the result of AND operation is 0000, the line is partially visible and then find the point of intersection.

c. Differentiate between raster and vector graphics.

Ans.

S. No.	Raster graphics	Vector graphics
1.	In raster graphics, the beam is moved all over the screen.	In random (vector) graphics, the beam is moved between the end points of the graphics primitive.
2.	Scan conversion is required.	Scan conversion is not required.
3.	It display smooth lines by approximating them with pixels on the raster grid.	It draws a continuous and smooth line.

3. Answer any two parts of the following : (6 × 2 = 12)

a. Explain Phong and Warn model for illumination.

Ans. Phong model :

1. According to the Phong model, the intensity of specular reflection is proportional to $\cos^{n_s} \theta$. The value of n_s , specular reflection parameter, is determined by the type of surface.
2. For very shiny surfaces, the value of n_s is large (more than 100) and for dull surfaces the value of n_s is close to 1. For a perfect reflector, the value of n_s is infinite.
3. The intensity of specular reflection depends on the angle of incidence, on the properties of the surface, colour of incident light and polarization.
4. The specular reflection coefficient $W(\theta)$, for each surface may be used to model the monochromatic specular intensity variation.
5. We can write the Phong specular reflection model as

$$I_{\text{spec}} = W(\theta) I_l \cos^{n_s} \theta \quad \dots(1)$$
 where I_l is intensity of light source, and θ is the viewing angle relative to specular reflection direction R .
6. In the case of opaque materials, the specular reflection rejection is almost constant for all incidence angles. Therefore, replacing $W(\theta)$ with a constant specular reflection coefficient K_s . Since V and R are

unit vectors in the viewing and specular reflection directions,
 $\cos \theta = V.R$. We can rewrite the equation (1) as

$$I_{\text{spec}} = K_s I_l (V.R)^{ns}$$

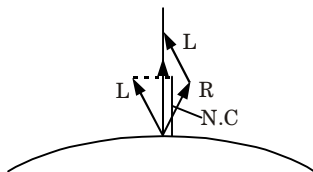


Fig. 3. Projection of L on to the direction of normal vector N.

Warn model :

1. The Warn model provides a method for simulating studio lighting effects by controlling light intensity in different directions.
2. Light sources are modeled as points on a reflecting surface, using the Phong model for the surface points. Then, the intensity in different directions is controlled by selecting values for the Phong exponent.
3. In addition, light controls, such as “barn doors” and spotlighting, used by studio photographers can be simulated in the Warn model.
4. Flaps are used to control the amount of light emitted by a source in various directions.
5. Two flaps are provided for each of the x , y and z -directions.
6. Spotlights are used to control the amount of light emitted within a cone with apex at a point-source position.

Ans. Given points : $P_0 (0, 0)$, $P_1 (1, 2)$, $P_2 (2, 1)$, $P_3 (3, 1)$, $P_4 (4, 10)$ and $P_5 (5, 5)$

$$\begin{aligned} u &= 0.5 \\ n + 1 &= 6 \\ n &= 5 \end{aligned}$$

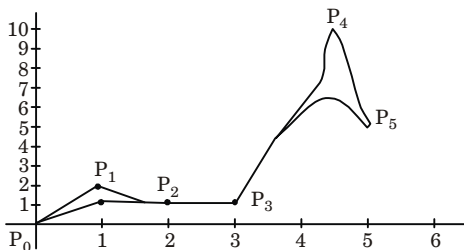

- c. Explain various types of quadratic surfaces with their equation and blobby objects.**

Ans. Various types of quadratic surfaces :

1. Sphere :

- a. A sphere with a radius r is defined as the set of points (x, y, z) that satisfies the following equations :

$$x^2 + y^2 + z^2 = r^2$$

- b. The parametric equations for spherical surfaces are :

$$x = r \cos \theta_1 \cos \theta_2$$

$$y = r \sin \theta_1 \cos \theta_2$$

$$z = r \sin \theta_2$$

where $-\frac{\pi}{2} \leq \theta_2 \leq \frac{\pi}{2}$ and $-\pi \leq \theta_1 \leq \pi$

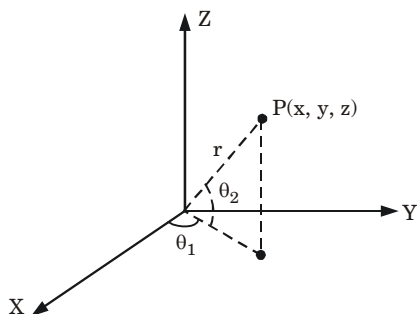


Fig. 5. Parametric coordinate position (r, θ_1, θ_2) on the surface of a sphere.

2. Ellipsoid :

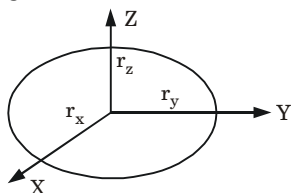


Fig. 6. An ellipsoid with three mutually perpendicular radii r_x , r_y and r_z , centred on the coordinate origin.

- An ellipsoid surface is the extension of a spherical surface. There are three mutually perpendicular radii that have different values as shown in Fig. 6.

- In the Cartesian coordinate system, the ellipsoid centered at the origin can be defined as :

$$\left(\frac{x}{r_x}\right)^2 + \left(\frac{y}{r_y}\right)^2 + \left(\frac{z}{r_z}\right)^2 = 1$$

- The parametric equations are :

$$x = r_x \cos \theta_1 \cos \theta_2$$

$$y = r_y \sin \theta_1 \cos \theta_2$$

$$z = r_z \sin \theta_2$$

where, $-\pi/2 \leq \theta_1 \leq \pi/2$ and $-\pi \leq \theta_2 \leq \pi$

3. Torus :

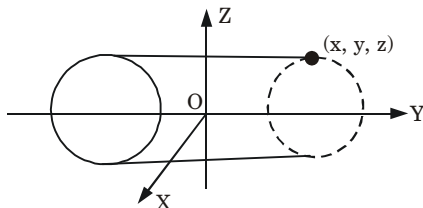


Fig. 7. Torus

- A doughnut-shaped object as shown in Fig. 7 is called a torus.

This can be generated by rotating a conic object like a circle about a specified axis.

- b. In cartesian coordinates, equations for points over the surface of a torus is given as

$$\left[r - \sqrt{\left(\frac{x}{r_x}\right)^2 + \left(\frac{y}{r_y}\right)^2} \right]^2 + \left(\frac{z}{r_z}\right)^2 = 1$$

- c. The parametric representations for a torus can be given as

$$\begin{aligned} x &= r_x (r + \cos\phi) \cos\theta, & -\pi \leq \phi \leq \pi \\ y &= r_y (r + \cos\phi) \sin\theta, & -\pi \leq \theta \leq \pi \\ z &= r_z \sin\phi \end{aligned}$$

Bloppy objects :

1. Bloppy objects do not maintain a fixed shape and change their surface characteristics in certain motions or when they come in contact with other objects.
2. Molecular structures, melting objects, water droplets, muscle shapes in the human body, etc., are examples of bloppy objects.
3. As objects show a certain degree of fluidity and bloopiness, these objects are simply known as bloppy objects.



Fig. 8. Molecular bonding as two molecules move away from each other, the surface shape stretch, snap and finally contract into spheres.

- a. **What do you understand by the term “Concatenation of transformations”? What are its advantages? If A and B are two different transformations, illustrate with suitable example that $A \cdot B \neq B \cdot A$.**

Ans. Concatenation of transformation :

1. Composite transformation can be achieved by concatenation of transformation matrices to obtain a combined transformation matrix.
2. A combined matrix is given by :

$$[T][X] = [X][T_1][T_2][T_3][T_4] \dots [T_n]$$
3. A composite transformation is two or more transformations performed one after the other.
4. If a transformation of the plane T_1 is followed by a second plane transformation T_2 , then the result itself may be represented by a single transformation T which is the composition of T_1 and T_2 taken in that order and written as :

$$T = T_1.T_2$$

5. The change in the order of transformation would lead to different results, as in general matrix multiplication is not commutative, i.e., $[A] \cdot [B] \neq [B] \cdot [A]$ and the order of multiplication.

Advantages of concatenation of transformation :

More complex geometric and coordinate transformation are formed through process of concatenation of matrices.

For example,

$$A = \begin{pmatrix} s & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & s & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{pmatrix} \quad B = \begin{pmatrix} 1 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 1 & 0 \\ h & k & 1 \end{pmatrix}$$

$$A \cdot B = \begin{pmatrix} s & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & s & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{pmatrix} \begin{pmatrix} 1 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 1 & 0 \\ h & k & 1 \end{pmatrix} = \begin{pmatrix} s & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & s & 0 \\ h & k & 1 \end{pmatrix}$$

$$B \cdot A = \begin{pmatrix} 1 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 1 & 0 \\ h & k & 1 \end{pmatrix} \begin{pmatrix} s & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & s & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{pmatrix} = \begin{pmatrix} s & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & s & 0 \\ hs & ks & 1 \end{pmatrix}$$

$$A \cdot B \neq B \cdot A$$

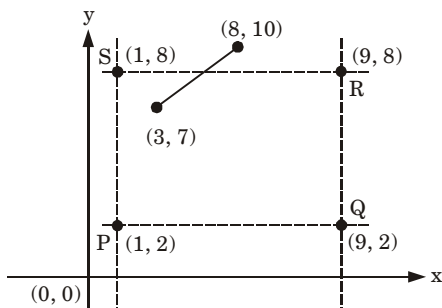

Ans. Role of pixel : A pixel is a smallest size object or colour spot that can be displayed or addressed on a monitor. They represent the smallest controllable element of a picture on the screen.

Role of frame buffer : Picture definition is stored in a memory area called the refresh buffer or frame buffer. It holds the set of intensity values for all the screen points.

b. What do you understand by the video controller ?

Ans. Video controller is one of the components of an interactive raster scan system. It is used to control the operation and intensity information of each pixel from frame buffer and displays them on screen.

c. Justify the composite transformation.

Ans.

1. A composite transformation is two or more transformations performed one after the other.
2. If a transformation of the plane T_1 is followed by a second plane transformation T_2 , then the result itself may be represented by a single transformation T which is the composition of T_1 and T_2 taken in that order.
3. This is written as $T = T_1.T_2$.
4. Composite transformation can be achieved by concatenation of transformation matrices to obtain a combined transformation matrix.

d. What is specular reflection ?

Ans. Specular reflection is the phenomenon of reflection of incident light in a concentrated region around the specular reflection angle.

e. Write the properties of B-Spline curve.

Ans. Properties of B-spline curves are :

- i. The polynomial curve has degree $d-1$ and C^{d-2} continuity over the range of 4.
- ii. For $n+1$ control points, the curve is described with $n+1$ blending functions.

f. What do you understand by the raster scan display ?

Ans. Raster scan display is a method of displaying images on the CRT screen. In this, the horizontal and vertical deflection signals are generated to move the beam all over the screen in a pattern.

g. Write the rotation matrix about x , y and z -axis in 3D.

Ans.

$$R_x(\theta) = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & \cos \theta & -\sin \theta & 0 \\ 0 & \sin \theta & \cos \theta & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}, R_y(\theta) = \begin{bmatrix} \cos \theta & 0 & \sin \theta & 0 \\ 0 & 1 & 0 & 0 \\ -\sin \theta & 0 & \cos \theta & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

h. Write the Bresenham's algorithm of a line.

Ans. Bresenham's line drawing algorithm :

1. Input the two lines end points and store the left end point (x_0, y_0) .
2. Load (x_0, y_0) into frame buffer, *i.e.*, plot the first point.
3. Calculate constants Δx , Δy , $2\Delta y$ and $2\Delta y - 2\Delta x$, and obtain the starting value for decision parameter as :

$$p_0 = 2\Delta y - \Delta x$$

4. At each x_k along the line, starting at $k = 0$, perform the following test :
 - a. If $p_k < 0$, the next point to plot is $(x_k + 1, y_k)$ and

$$p_{k+1} = p_k + 2\Delta y$$

$$p_{k+1} = p_k + 2\Delta y - 2\Delta x$$
5. Repeat step 4 Δx times.

i. Give window to viewport transformation matrix.

Ans.

$$\begin{bmatrix} S_x = \frac{V_{x \max} - V_{x \min}}{W_{x \max} - W_{x \min}} & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & S_y = \frac{V_{y \max} - V_{y \min}}{W_{y \max} - W_{y \min}} & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

j. What is the persistence of phosphor ?

Ans. Persistence is defined as the time taken by the emitted light from the screen to decay to one-tenth of its original intensity. A phosphor with low persistence is useful for animation; a high persistence phosphor is useful for displaying highly complex, static pictures.

Ans.

b. **Write a procedure for rotation. Derive reflection metrics for reflection about X axis.**

Ans. **Procedure for rotation :** Rotation can be done in the following order :

Step 1 : Translate the object or body at the origin (translation).

Step 2 : Rotate by any angle as given (rotation).

Step 3 : Translate back to its original location (inverse translation).

In matrix form, it can be shown as

$$[T] = [T_R] [R_\theta] [T_R]^{-1}$$

where $T_R \rightarrow$ Translation matrix

$R_\theta \rightarrow$ Rotation matrix by an angle θ°

$[T_R]^{-1} \rightarrow$ Inverse translation matrix

Reflection metrics : For reflection about x -axis, x coordinate is not changed and sign of y coordinate is changed. Thus if we reflect point (x, y) in the x -axis, we get $(x, -y)$

i.e., $x' = x$

$y' = -y$

So, the transformation matrix for reflection about x -axis or $y = 0$ axis is,

$$\begin{pmatrix} 1 & 0 \\ 0 & -1 \end{pmatrix}$$

and the transformation is represented as

$$\begin{pmatrix} x' \\ y' \end{pmatrix} = \begin{pmatrix} 1 & 0 \\ 0 & -1 \end{pmatrix} \begin{pmatrix} x \\ y \end{pmatrix}$$

- c. Consider two raster systems with resolutions of 640×480 and 1280×1024 . How many pixels could be accessed per second in each of these systems by a display controller that refreshes the screen at a rate of 60 frames per second ?

Ans. Number of pixel in our frame (resolution) = Number of column (width) $\times$ number of row (height)

Number of frame in one second = 60 frames

So, number of pixel in 60 frames = resolution $\times$ 60

Hence, for resolution 640×480 ,

$$\begin{aligned} \text{Number of pixels} &= 640 \times 480 \times 60 \\ &= 18432000 \text{ pixels} \end{aligned}$$

For resolution 1280×1024 ,

$$\begin{aligned} \text{Number of pixels} &= 1280 \times 1024 \times 60 \\ &= 78643200 \text{ pixels} \end{aligned}$$

- d. Write an algorithm for Cohen-Sutherland line clipping algorithm. Compare it with Liang-Barsky line clipping algorithm.

Ans. Cohen-Sutherland algorithm :

1. In this algorithm, a rectangular window is considered whose coordinates are $(xw_{\min}, yw_{\min}, xw_{\max}, yw_{\max})$ as shown in Fig. 1.

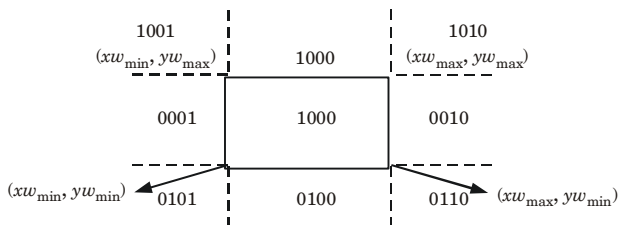

2. Every line end point is assigned a 4-digit binary code (region code) that identifies the location of the point corresponding to the boundaries of the clipping window.
3. The procedure for calculating the end point $p(x, y)$ code is as follow :
 - a. **For bit 1**
 If $(y - yw_{\max}) < 0$ then
 code = 0;
 else
 code = 1;
 - b. **For bit 2**
 If $(yw_{\min} - y) < 0$ then
 code = 0;
 else
 code = 1;
 - c. **For bit 3**
 if $(x - xw_{\max}) < 0$ then
 code = 0;
 else
 code = 1;
 - d. **For bit 4**
 if $(xw_{\min} - x) < 0$ then
 code = 0;
 else
 code = 1;
4. If the region code of both the end points of a line segment is 0000, the line is completely visible as it completely lies within the window.
5. If the region code of both the end points of the line segment is not 0000 then we calculate AND operation of both end points A and B.
6. If the result of AND operation is 0000, the line is partially visible and then find the point of intersection.

Comparison :

S. No.	Cohen Sutherland line clipping algorithm	Liang-Barsky line clipping algorithm
1.	It is not the most efficient but efficient when most of the lines to be clipped are either rejected or accepted.	It is more efficient than Cohen Sutherland since intersection calculations are reduced.

- e. **What is window to view point coordinate transformation ? What are the issues related to multiple windowing ?**

Ans. **Window to view point coordinate transformation :**

1. Window to viewport / view point Transformation is the process of transforming a 2D world-coordinate objects to device coordinates.
2. Objects inside the world or clipping window are mapped to the viewport which is the area on the screen where world coordinates are mapped to be displayed.
3. Window to viewport mapping or transformation is done in following three steps :

Step 1 : The object together with its window is translated until the lower-left corner of the window is at the origin.

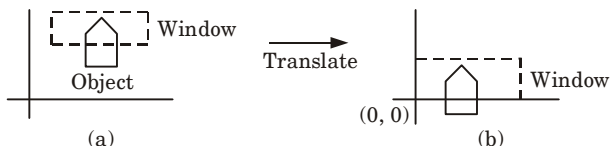

Step 2 : The object and the window are then scaled until the window has the dimension same as viewport. In other words, we are converting the object into image and window in viewport.

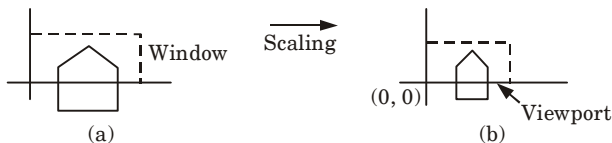

Step 3 : The final transformation step is another translation to move the viewport to its correct position on the screen.

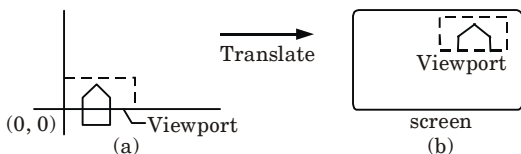

Issues related to multiple windowing :

1. A key problem in multi-windowing is how to automatically assign windows to the relevant areas within an image.
2. More difficult to work with several applications at once.

- f. **Explain parallel and perspective projection. Justify the depth curing projection for 3D display methods.**

Ans.**1. Parallel projection :**

- In a parallel projection, coordinate positions are transformed to the view plane along parallel lines.
- These are linear transforms that are useful in blueprints to produce scale drawings of three dimensional objects.

2. Perspective projection :

- In a perspective projection, object positions are transformed to the view plane along lines that converge to a point called the center of projection.
- The projected view of an object is determined by calculating the intersection of the projection lines with the view plane.

Depth cueing projection :

- In depth cueing, we include the depth information in the displayed object.
- The depth of an object can be represented by the intensity of the image.
- Depth cueing is applied by choosing maximum and minimum intensity values.
- The parts of the objects closest to the viewing position are displayed with the highest intensities and objects farther away are displayed with decreasing intensities.
- Reason to use depth cueing projection for 3D display method:
 - To create realistic view of an object.
 - To easily identify the particular viewing direction of displayed object.
- A simple method for indicating depth is using wireframe display.

g. What are the criteria that should be satisfied by a good line drawing algorithm ? Explain in detail.**Ans. Criteria for good line drawing algorithm :****1. Lines should appear straight :**

- Lines generated parallel to the x -axis or y -axis or at 45° are plotted correctly with point plotting techniques.
- Line may not pass through other addressable points in between.

2. Lines should terminate accurately :

- If lines are not plotted accurately, they may terminate at wrong places.
- This may lead to a small gap between endpoints of one line and the starting point of the next as shown in Fig. 5.

**Fig. 5.****3. Line should have constant density :**

- To maintain the constant density throughout the line, dots should be equally spaced.

- b. The line density is proportional to the number of dots displayed divided by the length of the line.
- c. Dots are equally spaced only in lines parallel to the x -axis or y -axis or at 45° to the axis as given in Fig. 6.

4. **Line brightness independent of slope and line length :** This requires a high resolution of the device along with a high refresh rate.
5. **Lines should be drawn rapidly :** In interactive applications, lines should appear rapidly on the screen, that is, minimum computation is desired to draw the line.

Ans. Advantages of back-face detection :

1. It is fast.
2. It is a simple object-space method.

Disadvantages of back-face detection :

1. It can only be used on solid objects modeled as a polygon mesh. This is the most general modeling construct for scan line graphics systems.
2. It works fine for convex polyhedra but not necessarily for concave polyhedra.

Advantages of A-buffer method :

- i. It is an extension of the ideas in the depth-buffer method.
- ii. More than one surface intensity can be taken into consideration at each pixel position.
- iii. It also antialiased the object edges.
- iv. It has two fields—depth field and intensity field.
- v. In this, surfaces are sub-divided into a polygon mesh and clipped against the pixel boundaries.
- vi. The intensity of pixel determined by considering opacity parameter and percentage of overlaps of the overlapping surface.

Disadvantages of A-buffer method :

- i. Since the algorithm processes multiple objects at a time, the total number of polygons in a picture can be arbitrarily large.

Back-face detection algorithm :

1. Object surfaces that are orientated away from the viewer are called back-faces.
2. Algorithm used to detect the back-faces is known as back-face detection algorithm.
3. If any three points (x_1, y_1, z_1) , (x_2, y_2, z_2) and (x_3, y_3, z_3) on any plane surface are known, the unknown parameters A , B , C and D of the plane surface equation $Ax + By + Cz + D = 0$ can be found as follows :
 - i. All the three points (x_1, y_1, z_1) , (x_2, y_2, z_2) and (x_3, y_3, z_3) should satisfy the equation $Ax + By + Cz + D = 0$ as it lies on the surface. Hence,

$$Ax_1 + By_1 + Cz_1 + D = 0$$

$$Ax_2 + By_2 + Cz_2 + D = 0$$

$$Ax_3 + By_3 + Cz_3 + D = 0$$
 - ii. Also, any arbitrary point (x, y, z) lying on the surface should satisfy the equation of the desired surface

$$Ax + By + Cz + D = 0$$
 - iii. A unique solution of equations for A , B , C and D can only be obtained if

$$\text{or } \begin{vmatrix} x_1 & y_1 & z_1 & 1 \\ x_2 & y_2 & z_2 & 1 \\ x_3 & y_3 & z_3 & 1 \\ x & y & z & 1 \end{vmatrix} = 0 \quad (\text{By Cramer's rule})$$

$$\text{or } \begin{vmatrix} x-x_1 & y-y_1 & z-z_1 & 0 \\ x_1-x_2 & y_1-y_2 & z_1-z_2 & 0 \\ x_2-x_3 & y_2-y_3 & z_2-z_3 & 0 \\ x & y & z & 1 \end{vmatrix} = 0$$

$$\text{or } \begin{vmatrix} x-x_1 & y-y_1 & z-z_1 \\ x_1-x_2 & y_1-y_2 & z_1-z_2 \\ x_2-x_3 & y_2-y_3 & z_2-z_3 \end{vmatrix} = 0$$

$$\text{or } (x-x_1) \begin{vmatrix} y_1-y_2 & z_1-z_2 \\ y_2-y_3 & z_2-z_3 \end{vmatrix} - (y-y_1) \begin{vmatrix} x_1-x_2 & z_1-z_2 \\ x_2-x_3 & z_2-z_3 \end{vmatrix} + (z-z_1) \begin{vmatrix} x_1-x_2 & y_1-y_2 \\ x_2-x_3 & y_2-y_3 \end{vmatrix} = 0$$

$$\text{or } \begin{vmatrix} y_1-y_2 & z_1-z_2 \\ y_2-y_3 & z_2-z_3 \end{vmatrix} x + \begin{vmatrix} z_1-z_2 & x_1-x_2 \\ z_2-z_3 & x_2-x_3 \end{vmatrix} y + \begin{vmatrix} x_1-x_2 & y_1-y_2 \\ x_2-x_3 & y_2-y_3 \end{vmatrix} z - \begin{vmatrix} x_1 & y_1 & z_1 \\ x_2 & y_2 & z_2 \\ x_3 & y_3 & z_3 \end{vmatrix} = 0$$

which is in the form of $Ax + By + Cz + D = 0$, giving the equation of the plane passing through the three points

- iv. Any plane with its inside and outside surfaces can be defined by three points and its normal vector.
- v. This normal vector can be calculated with three position vectors of three points (x_1, y_1, z_1) , (x_2, y_2, z_2) and (x_3, y_3, z_3) .
- vi. Using right hand thumb rule, the three points are considered in counter clockwise manner for calculating the unit normal directing

outside the surface. Thus, the surface normal and equation of the plane are calculated.

- vii. Now, if any point $(x, y, \text{ or } z)$ lies inside the polygon surface, $Ax + By + Cz + D < 0$, and if it is along the line of sight to the surface, the polygon must be back-face.

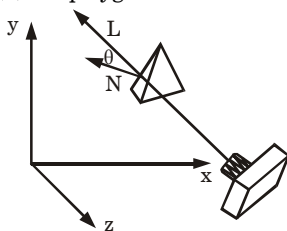


Fig. 7. (a) Geometry of camera vision.

- viii. If L is the line of sight or viewing vector (light vector in case of shadowing), perpendicular to the viewing plane originating from the eye or camera, N is the unit surface normal vector as shown in Fig. 7(a) and (b) the polygon is the back-face if $L \cdot N > 0$

- ix. On aligning the light vector to that of the view vector which is normally along negative z -axis for right-handed viewing system, that is

$$L = 0i + 0j + L_z k$$

$$L \cdot N = L_z K$$

- x. Hence, only z -component of normal vector N is required to be considered, and the sign of K is checked for negative value.
- xi. Thus, any polygon is a back-face if it has a surface normal with negative z -component value.

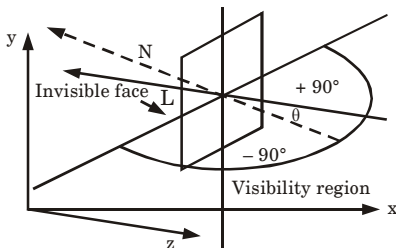


Fig. 7. (b) Invisible and visible vision.

Ans. Various illumination models :

1. **Ambient light :**

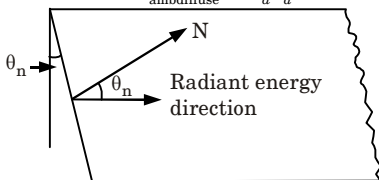
- i. In this model, the intensity of the reflected light for each surface depends on the optical properties of the surface.
- ii. Ambient light has no spatial or directional characteristics.

- iii. The amount of ambient light incident on each object surface is constant for all surfaces and over all directions.
- iv. The optical properties determine how much of the incident energy is to be reflected and how much absorbed.

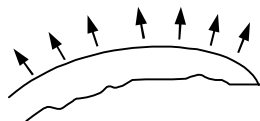
2. Diffuse reflection :

- i. In this model, light coming from all directions is reflected from the walls, floor, ceiling, etc.
- ii. Diffuse reflections are constant over each surface in a scene, independent of the viewing direction.
- iii. The amount of diffused reflected light for each surface in a scene can be set with parameter K_d .
- iv. For the surfaces which absorbs most of the incident light (black surfaces), the value of the diffuse reflection coefficient (K_d) is close to 0.
- v. If a surface is exposed to only ambient light, then the intensity of the diffuse reflection at any point on the surface is given by

$$I_{\text{ambdiffuse}} = K_d I_a$$

3. Phong model :

- i. According to the Phong model, the intensity of specular reflection is proportional to $\cos^n_s \theta$. The value of n , specular reflection parameter, is determined by the type of surface.
- ii. For very shiny surfaces, the value of n_s is large (more than 100) and for dull surfaces the value of n_s is close to 1. For a perfect reflector, the value of n_s is infinite.
- iii. The intensity of specular reflection depends on the angle of incidence, on the properties of the surface, colour of incident light and polarization.
- iv. The specular reflection coefficient $W(\theta)$, for each surface may be used to model the monochromatic specular intensity variation.
- v. We can write the Phong specular reflection model as

$$I_{\text{spec}} = W(\theta) I_l \cos^n_s \theta \quad \dots(1)$$

where I_l is intensity of light source, and θ is the viewing angle relative to specular reflection direction R .

- vi. In the case of opaque materials, the specular reflection rejection is almost constant for all incidence angles. Therefore, replacing $W(\theta)$ with a constant specular reflection coefficient K_s . Since V and R are

unit vectors in the viewing and specular reflection directions, $\cos \theta = V.R$. We can rewrite the equation (1) as

$$I_{\text{spec}} = K_s I_l (V.R)^{n_s}$$

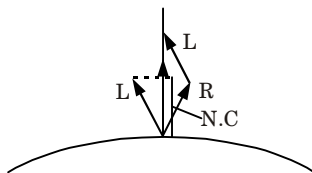


Fig. 9. Projection of L on to the direction of normal vector N.

Advantages of illumination methods :

1. Fast
2. Acceptable results
3. Hardware support

Disadvantages of illumination methods :

1. Point light source
2. No interaction between objects
3. Adhoc, not based on model of light propagation

Different rendering methods :

1. Constant-intensity shading :

- a. In this method, a single intensity is calculated for each polygon and all points in the surface of polygon are displayed with the same intensity value.
- b. It is fast and simplest rendering method.
- c. Light sources illuminating the object and the viewing position is sufficiently far from the surface of polygon.

2. Gouraud shading :

- a. It represents a polygon surface by linearly interpolating intensity across the polygon surface.
- b. Intensity values for each polygon are matched with adjacent polygon along common edges.
- c. It eliminates the intensity discontinuity that can occur in constant-intensity shading.

3. Phong shading :

- a. Phong shading is method which interpolates normal vectors and then apply the illumination model to each surface point.
- b. This method interpolates the surface normal vector, instead of the intensity.
- c. It is used in 3D system.

4. Fast Phong shading :

- a. Fast Phong shading approximates the intensity calculations using a Taylor-series expansion and triangular surface patches.
- b. Surface rendering with Phong shading can be speeded up by using approximations in the illumination model calculations of normal vectors.

Advantages of rendering methods :

- i. It removes the intensity discontinuity.
- ii. It can be combined with hidden surface algorithm to fill in the visible polygons along each scanline.
- iii. It displays more realistic highlights on a surface.
- iv. It gives more accurate results.

Disadvantages of rendering methods :

- i. It has a problem with specular reflections.
- ii. It introduces anomalies known as Mach bands.
- iii. It requires more calculations and increases the cost of shading steeply.

5. Compare and contrast among spline, B-spline and Bezier algorithms for curve generation and write the algorithm for Bezier curve generation.

Ans. Algorithm for Bezier curve :

1. Get four control points say $A(x_A, y_A)$, $B(x_B, y_B)$, $C(x_C, y_C)$, $D(x_D, y_D)$.
2. Divide the curve represented by points A, B, C and D in two sections

$$x_{AB} = (x_A + x_B) / 2$$

$$y_{AB} = (y_A + y_B) / 2$$

$$x_{BC} = (x_B + x_C) / 2$$

$$y_{BC} = (y_B + y_C) / 2$$

$$x_{CD} = (x_C + x_D) / 2$$

$$y_{CD} = (y_C + y_D) / 2$$

$$x_{ABC} = (x_{AB} + x_{BC}) / 2$$

$$y_{ABC} = (y_{AB} + y_{BC}) / 2$$

$$x_{BCD} = (x_{BC} + x_{CD}) / 2$$

$$y_{BCD} = (y_{BC} + y_{CD}) / 2$$

$$x_{ABCD} = (x_{ABC} + x_{BCD}) / 2$$

$$y_{ABCD} = (y_{ABC} + y_{BCD}) / 2$$

3. Repeat the step 2 for section A, AB, ABC and $ABCD$ and section $ABCD, BCD, CD$ and D .
4. Repeat step 3 until we have sections so short that they can be replaced by straight lines.
5. Replace small sections by straight lines.
6. Stop.

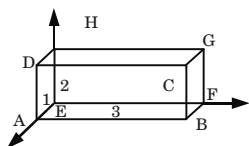

Ans. **Aspect ratio :**

1. An aspect ratio is an attribute that describes the relationship between the width and height of an image.
2. Aspect ratio is expressed by the symbolic notation *i.e.*, $x : y$.

Types of retracing : There are two types of retracing :

1. Vertical retracing
2. Horizontal retracing

d. What is tilting tranformation ? Does the order of performing the rotation matter ?

Ans. Tilting is a transformation, where the object first rotate about x -axis and then about y -axis. We can find the required tranformation by composing two rotation matrices, *i.e.*,

$$R_{\theta_x} = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & \cos \theta_x & -\sin \theta_x & 0 \\ 0 & \sin \theta_x & \cos \theta_x & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}, R_{\theta_y} = \begin{bmatrix} \cos \theta_y & 0 & \sin \theta_y & 0 \\ 0 & 1 & 0 & 0 \\ -\sin \theta_y & 0 & \cos \theta_y & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

Multiply R_{θ_y} and R_{θ_x} , we get

$$R_{\theta_y} \cdot R_{\theta_x} = \begin{bmatrix} \cos \theta_y & \sin \theta_y \sin \theta_x & \sin \theta_y \cos \theta_x & 0 \\ 0 & \cos \theta_x & -\sin \theta_x & 0 \\ -\sin \theta_y & \cos \theta_y \sin \theta_x & \cos \theta_y \cos \theta_x & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

Now, we multiply R_{θ_x} and R_{θ_y} we get

$$R_{\theta_x} \cdot R_{\theta_y} = \begin{bmatrix} \cos \theta_y & 0 & \sin \theta_y & 0 \\ \sin \theta_x \sin \theta_y & \cos \theta_x & -\sin \theta_x \cos \theta_y & 0 \\ -\cos \theta_x \sin \theta_y & \sin \theta_x & \cos \theta_x \cos \theta_y & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

Therefore, $R_{\theta_x} \cdot R_{\theta_y}$ is not the same matrix, as $R_{\theta_y} \cdot R_{\theta_x}$. Thus, the order of rotation matrix is important.

e. What do you understand by match band effect and transparency ?

Ans. Mach band effect : The linear intensity interpolation can result bright or dark intensity streaks to appear on the surface. These bright or dark intensity streaks, are called mach bands. The mach band effect can be reduced by breaking the surface into a greater number of smaller polygons.

Transparency :

1. Transparency is a phenomenon in which the object in the way of light ray does not obstruct light.
2. It means that if the light source is behind the object and the object is transparent, then the viewer can see the light through the object.

f. Explain other transformation that can be applied on 2D objects ?

Ans. Basic operations performed by geometric transformation are :

- i. Translation
- ii. Rotation
- iii. Scaling

g. Define blobby objects and types of coherence.

Ans. Blobby objects : Blobby objects do not maintain a fixed shape and change their surface characteristics in certain motions or when they come in contact with other objects.

a. Why do we need video controller ? Also define the architecture of raster scan system ?

Ans. Need of video controller : A video controller, often referred to as a video or graphics card, is a key hardware component that

allows computers to generate graphic information to any video display devices, such as a monitor or projector.

Architecture of raster scan system :

1. In a raster scan system, the electron beam is swept across the screen, one row at a time from top to bottom.
2. As the electron beam moves across each row, the beam intensity is turned on and off to create a pattern of illuminated spots.
3. Picture definition is stored in a memory area called the refresh buffer or frame buffer.

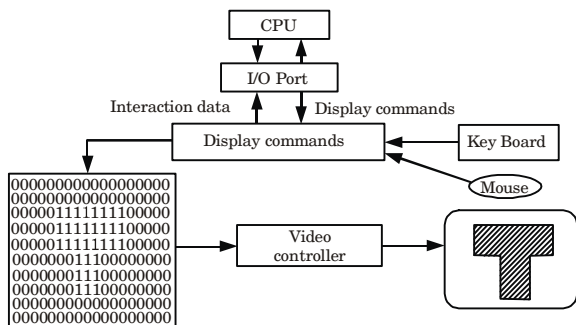

4. It holds the set of intensity values for all the screen points.
5. The stored intensity values are retrieved from frames buffer and displayed on the screen one row (scan line) at a time.
6. Each screen point is referred to as a pixel.
7. Each pixel on the screen can be specified by its row and column number. Thus by specifying row and column number we can specify the pixel position on the screen.
8. The capability of a raster scan system to store intensity information for each screen point makes it well suited for the realistic display, it consists of display controller, CPU, video controller, refresh buffer, keyboard, mouse and the CRT.

- b. Translate the square $ABCD$ whose coordinates are $A(0, 0)$, $B(3, 0)$, $C(3, 3)$, and $D(0, 3)$ by 2 unit in both directions and then scale it by 1.5 units in x -direction and 0.5 unit in y -direction.

Ans. Here, first operation is translate and second operation is scaling.

$$T_x = 2 \text{ and } T_y = 2$$

$$\text{Translation matrix} = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 1 & 0 \\ T_x & T_y & 1 \end{bmatrix} = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 1 & 0 \\ 2 & 2 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

$$\text{Square } ABCD \text{ in matrix form} = \begin{bmatrix} 0 & 0 & 1 \\ 3 & 0 & 1 \\ 3 & 3 & 1 \\ 0 & 3 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

Performing translation operation, we get

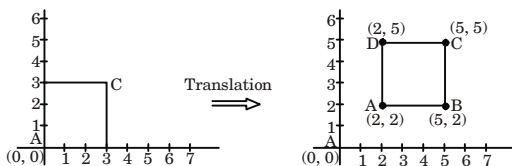

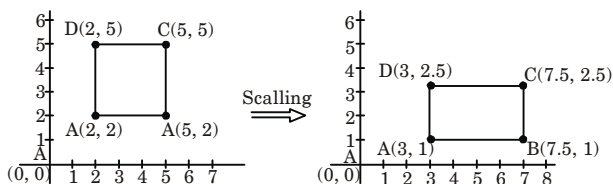
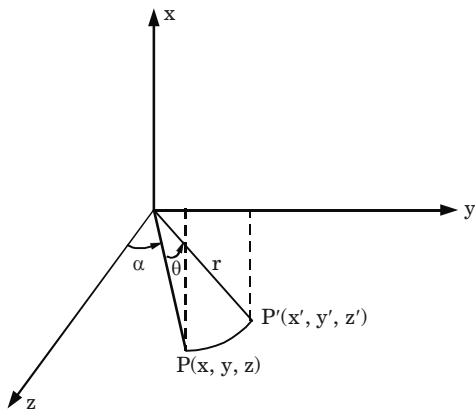

Ans.**i. Rotation about x-axis (i.e., axis of rotation is x) :****Fig. 4.** Rotation when axis of rotation is x-axis.

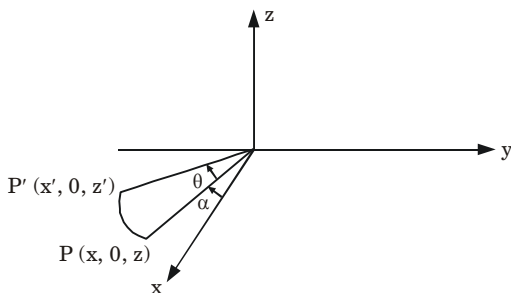

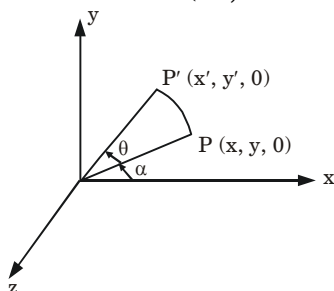

d. Discuss RGB and CMY colour model in detail.

Ans. RGB colour model :

1. Most graphics displays of realistic scenes are in colour. To incorporate colour, we need to write the intensity equation as a function of the colour properties of the light sources and object surfaces.
2. For an RGB description, each colour in a scene is expressed in terms of red, green, and blue components.
3. We then specify the RGB components of light source intensities and surface colours, and the illumination model calculates the RGB components of the reflected light.
4. One way to set surface colours is by specifying the reflectivity coefficients as three element vectors.
5. The diffuse reflection coefficient vector would then have RGB components (K_{dR}, K_{dG}, K_{dB}) .
6. If we want an object to have a blue surface, we select a non-zero value in the range from 0 to 1 for the blue reflectivity component, K_{dB} , while the red and green reflectivity components are set to zero ($K_{dR} = K_{dG} = 0$).
7. Any non-zero red or green components in the incident light are absorbed, and only the blue component is reflected. The intensity calculation for this example reduces to the single expression

$$I_B = K_{dB} I_{aB} + \sum_{i=1}^n f_i(d) I_{iB} [K_{dB} (N \cdot L_i) + K_{sB} (N \cdot H_i)^{n_s}]$$

8. Surfaces typically are illuminated with white light sources, and in general we can set surface colour so that the reflected light has non-zero values for all three RGB components.
9. Calculated intensity levels for each colour component can be used to adjust the corresponding electron gun in an RGB monitor.

CMY colour model :

1. In CMY model, cyan, magenta and yellow are the primary colours and red, green and blue are the secondaries.
2. This model is useful for describing colour output to hard-copy devices.
3. Unlike video monitors, which produce a colour pattern by combining light from the screen phosphors hard-copy devices such as plotters produce a colour picture by coating a paper with colour pigments.
4. Cyan is formed by adding blue and green light. When white light is reflected from cyan coloured ink, the reflected light must have no red component *i.e.*, red light is absorbed by the ink.
5. Magenta ink subtracts green components from incident light and yellow subtracts the blue components.
6. Printing process with CMY model produces collection of four ink dots, whereas RGB monitor uses a collection of three phosphor dots.
7. One dot is used for each of the primary colors (cyan, yellow and magenta) *i.e.*, one dot is black. Since the combination of 3 primary

colours produces a dark gray instead of black, so black must be included.

- e. **Explain the true-curve generation algorithm. Also list the problems in this algorithm.**

Ans. True-curve generation algorithm :

1. This is the true curve generation method. Read the line endpoint (x_1, y_1) and (x_2, y_2)

2.
$$\Delta x = |x_2 - x_1|$$

$$\Delta y = |y_2 - y_1|$$

3. If $(\Delta x \geq \Delta y)$ then

$$\text{length} = \Delta x$$

Where sign function makes the algorithm work in all quadrants. It returns $-1, 0, 1$ depending on whether its argument is $< 0, = 0, > 0$ respectively.

The factor 0.5 makes it possible to round the values in the integer function rather than truncating them.

Now plot the points

Problem in true-curve generation algorithm :

1. To specify a curve, we need more information than just its endpoints. This may mean that a different display-file structure should be used.
2. In transformations, a line segment when scaled is still a line segment but other curves may behave differently. For example, a circle when scaled in only one direction becomes an ellipse.
3. If we wished to clip arcs to some window boundary, a new clipping algorithm would have to be developed.

 a. **What are the disadvantages of DDA algorithm ? Also write Bresenham's line drawing algorithm for negative slope.**

Ans. Bresenham's line algorithm :

1. Input the two lines endpoints and store the left endpoint (x_0, y_0) .
2. Load (x_0, y_0) into frame buffer, *i.e.*, plot the first point.
3. Calculate constants Δx , Δy , $2\Delta y$ and $2\Delta y - 2\Delta x$, and obtain the starting value for decision parameter as :

$$p_0 = 2\Delta y - \Delta x$$

4. At each x_k along the line, starting at $k = 0$, perform the following test :

- a. If $p_k < 0$, the next point to plot is $(x_k + 1, y_k)$ and

$$p_{k+1} = p_k + 2\Delta y$$

- b. If $p_k > 0$, the next point to plot is $(x_k + 1, y_k + 1)$ and

$$p_{k+1} = p_k + 2\Delta y - 2\Delta x$$

5. Repeat step 4 Δx times.

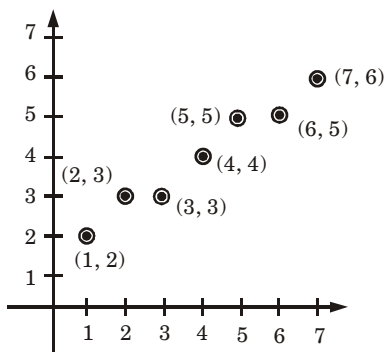

Disadvantages of DDA algorithm :

1. Floating point arithmetic in DDA algorithm is time consuming.
2. Precision loss due to rounding off.
3. Pixel drifts farther apart if line is relatively large.
4. Rounding off in DDA is time consuming.
5. End point accuracy is poor.

Bresenham's line drawing algorithm for negative slope :

For negative slopes, the procedure is similar, except that one coordinate decreases as the other increases.

b. Explain window-to-viewport transformation in detail.

Ans. Window to view point coordinate transformation :

1. Window to viewport / view point Transformation is the process of transforming a 2D world-coordinate objects to device coordinates.
2. Objects inside the world or clipping window are mapped to the viewport which is the area on the screen where world coordinates are mapped to be displayed.
3. Window to viewport mapping or transformation is done in following three steps :

Step 1 : The object together with its window is translated until the lower-left corner of the window is at the origin.

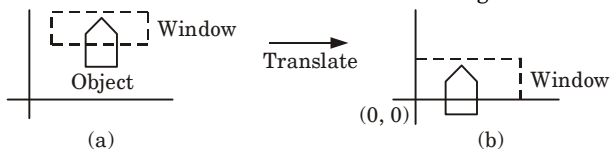

Step 2 : The object and the window are then scaled until the window has the dimension same as viewport. In other words, we are converting the object into image and window in viewport.

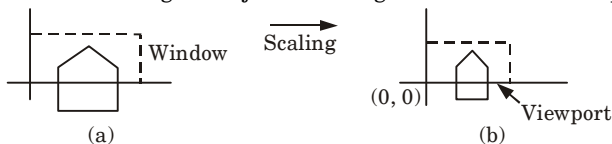

Step 3 : The final transformation step is another translation to move the viewport to its correct position on the screen.

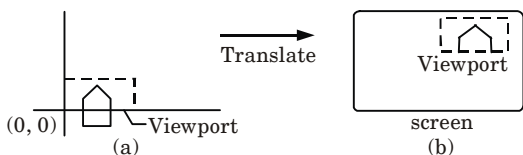

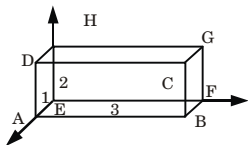

$$\text{So, } \begin{bmatrix} 0 & 0 & 1 & 1 \\ 3 & 0 & 1 & 1 \\ 3 & 2 & 1 & 1 \\ 0 & 2 & 1 & 1 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \\ 3 & 0 & 0 & 1 \\ 3 & 2 & 0 & 1 \\ 0 & 2 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix} \begin{bmatrix} 0 & 0 & 1 & 0 \\ 0 & 1 & 0 & 0 \\ -1 & 0 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix} = \begin{bmatrix} -1 & 0 & 0 & 1 \\ -1 & 0 & 3 & 1 \\ -1 & 2 & 3 & 1 \\ -1 & 2 & 0 & 1 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 3 & 1 \\ 0 & 2 & 3 & 1 \\ 0 & 0 & 0 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$

Rotation matrix about x -axis by angle 90° is given as

b. What do you understand by projection ? Differentiate between parallel projection and perspective projection.

Ans. Projection : Projection is a process of representing a three dimensional object or scene into two dimensional medium *i.e.*, projection is a shadow of the object.

Difference :

S. No.	Parallel projection	Perspective projection
1.	In parallel projection, parallel lines from each vertex on the object are extended until they intersect the view plane.	Perspective projection produces realistic view.
2.	Lines of projection are parallel.	Lines of projection are not parallel.
3.	These are linear transform.	These are non-linear transform.
4.	In parallel projection, the center of projection is at infinity.	In perspective projections, the center of projection is at a point.

a. Construct the Bezier curve of order 3 and with 4 polygon vertices A(1, 1), B(2, 3), C(4, 3), D(6, 4).

Ans. The equation for the Bezier curve is given as :

$p(u) = (1-u)^3 P_1 + 3u(1-u)^2 P_2 + 3u^2(1-u) P_3 + u^3 P_4$ for $0 \leq u \leq 1$
where $p(u)$ is the point on the curve P_1, P_2, P_3, P_4 .

Let us take $u = 0, \frac{1}{4}, \frac{1}{2}, \frac{3}{4}$

$$\therefore P(0) = (1, 1)$$

$$\begin{aligned} \therefore P\left(\frac{1}{4}\right) &= \left(1 - \frac{1}{4}\right)^3 P_1 + 3 \frac{1}{4} \left(1 - \frac{1}{4}\right)^2 P_2 \\ &\quad + 3 \left(\frac{1}{4}\right)^2 \left(1 - \frac{1}{4}\right) P_3 + \left(\frac{1}{4}\right)^3 P_4 \\ &= \frac{27}{64} (1, 1) + \frac{27}{64} (2, 3) + \frac{9}{64} (4, 3) + \frac{1}{64} (6, 4) \\ &= \left[\frac{27}{64} \times 1 + \frac{27}{64} \times 2 + \frac{9}{64} \times 4 + \frac{1}{64} \times 6, \frac{27}{64} \times 1 \right. \\ &\quad \left. + \frac{27}{64} \times 3 + \frac{9}{64} \times 3 + \frac{1}{64} \times 4 \right] \\ &= \left[\frac{123}{64}, \frac{139}{64} \right] = (1.9218, 2.1718) \end{aligned}$$

$$\begin{aligned} \therefore P\left(\frac{1}{2}\right) &= \left(1 - \frac{1}{2}\right)^3 P_1 + 3 \frac{1}{2} \left(1 - \frac{1}{2}\right)^2 P_2 \\ &\quad + 3 \left(\frac{1}{2}\right)^2 \left(1 - \frac{1}{2}\right) P_3 + \left(\frac{1}{2}\right)^3 P_4 \\ &= \frac{1}{8} (1, 1) + \frac{3}{8} (2, 3) + \frac{3}{8} (4, 3) + \frac{1}{8} (6, 4) \\ &= \left[\frac{1}{8} \times 1 + \frac{3}{8} \times 2 + \frac{3}{8} \times 4 + \frac{1}{8} \times 6, \frac{1}{8} \times 1 \right. \\ &\quad \left. + \frac{3}{8} \times 3 + \frac{3}{8} \times 3 + \frac{1}{8} \times 4 \right] \\ &= \left[\frac{25}{8}, \frac{23}{8} \right] = (3.125, 2.875) \end{aligned}$$

$$\begin{aligned} \therefore P\left(\frac{3}{4}\right) &= \left(1 - \frac{3}{4}\right)^3 P_1 + 3 \frac{3}{4} \left(1 - \frac{3}{4}\right)^2 P_2 \\ &\quad + 3 \left(\frac{3}{4}\right)^2 \left(1 - \frac{3}{4}\right) P_3 + \left(\frac{3}{4}\right)^3 P_4 \\ &= \frac{1}{64} P_1 + \frac{9}{64} P_2 + \frac{27}{64} P_3 + \frac{27}{64} P_4 \\ &= \frac{1}{64} (1, 1) + \frac{9}{64} (2, 3) + \frac{27}{64} (4, 3) + \frac{27}{64} (6, 4) \\ &= \left[\frac{1}{64} \times 1 + \frac{9}{64} \times 2 + \frac{27}{64} \times 4 + \frac{27}{64} \times 6, \frac{1}{64} \times 1 \right. \\ &\quad \left. + \frac{9}{64} \times 3 + \frac{27}{64} \times 3 + \frac{27}{64} \times 4 \right] \end{aligned}$$

$$P(1) = P_3 = (6, 4)$$

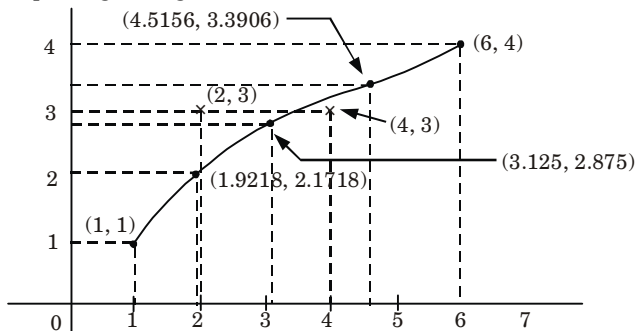


Fig. 12. Plotted Bezier curve.

Fig. 12 shows the calculated points of the Bezier curve and curve passing through it.

b. Write the properties of B-spline curves. Also write advantages of B-spline curves on Bezier curves.

Ans. Properties of B-splines curves :

1. The polynomial curve has degree $d-1$ and C^{d-2} continuity over the range of u .
2. For $n + 1$ control points, the curve is described with $n + 1$ blending functions.
3. Each blending function $B_{k,d}$ is defined over d subintervals of the total range of u , starting at knot value u_k .
4. The range of parameter u is divided into $n + d$ subinterval by the $n + d + 1$ values specified in the knot vector.
5. Each section of spline curve is influenced by d control points.
6. Any one control point can affect the shape of atmost d curve sections.
7. For any value of u in the interval from knot value u_{d-1} to u_{n+1} the sum over all basic function is 1 :

$$\sum_{k=0}^n B_{k,d}(u) = 1$$

Advantages of B-spline curves over Bezier curves :

1. The degree of B-spline polynomial can be set independently of the number of control points.
 2. B-spline allows local control over the shape of a spline curve or surface.

- a. Explain depth buffer method and compare it with A-buffer method.**

Ans. Depth buffer :

1. z-buffer is a simple extension of the frame buffer idea. A frame is used to store the intensity of each pixel in image space.
2. The z-buffer is a separate depth buffer used to store the z-coordinates or depth of every visible pixel in image space.
3. In this algorithm a buffer of the same size as the frame buffer, is set up which holds depth information.
4. Each element of the depth buffer corresponds to a pixel in the frame buffer and initially holds the maximum depth in the scene.
5. As each polygon is scan-converted, the depth at each pixel is calculated and compared with the corresponding depth in the depth buffer.
6. If the depth is less than that stored in the depth buffer (*i.e.*, nearer the viewer) then that pixel is set in the frame buffer with the polygon colour at that point and the depth buffer is set to the polygon depth.
7. If the polygon depth is greater (*i.e.*, farther away from the viewer) than the depth buffer at that point is not stored in the frame buffer.
8. The z- buffer algorithm can be stated as :

Step 1 : Initialize frame buffer to background colour.

Step 2 : Initialize z-buffer to minimum z value.

Step 3 : Scan-convert each polygon in arbitrary order.

Step 4 : For each (x, y) pixel, calculate depth 'z' at that pixel ($z(x, y)$).

Step 5 : Compare calculated new depth $z(x, y)$ with value previously stored in z-buffer at the location $z(x, y)$.

Step 6 : If $z(x, y) > z(x, y)$, then write the new depth value to z-buffer and update frame buffer.

Step 7 : Otherwise, no action is taken.

Comparison of depth buffer method with A-buffer method :

1. The depth buffer (or Z Buffer) method can only be used for opaque object but not for transparent object, the A-buffer method can be used for both objects.
2. A buffer method is slightly costly than depth buffer method because it requires more memory in comparison to the depth buffer method.
3. A buffer method provides anti-aliasing while depth buffer does not.

b. Why is Gouraud shading also referred to as interpolation shading ? Also discuss its advantages and disadvantages.

Ans. Gouraud shading :

- a. It represents a polygon surface by linearly interpolating intensity across the polygon surface.
- b. Intensity values for each polygon are matched with adjacent polygon along common edges.
- c. It eliminates the intensity discontinuity that can occur in constant-intensity shading.

- d. Gouraud shading is a trick whereby values for lighting, fog, and so forth are computed at the vertex level. These values are then linearly interpolated across the face of the polygon.
- e. Due to the use of linear interpolation Gouraud shading is also referred to as interpolation shading.

Advantage :

- i. Gouraud shading can be combined with a hidden surface algorithm to fill in the visible polygons along each scan line.
- ii. It removes the intensity discontinuities exists in constant shading model.

Disadvantages :

- i. Highlights on the surface are sometimes displayed with anomalous shapes.
- ii. The mach band effect can be reduced by breaking the surface into a greater number of smaller polygons.
- iii. Sharp drop of intensity values on the polygon surface cannot be displayed.
